What Is The Expanding Role Of The Community College In Higher Education?

Dr. Robert Templin, President of the Ten Campuses and Centers of Northern Virginia Community College will Address Current College Issues and Answer your Questions.

Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA) is Virginia's largest institution of higher learning and one of the nation's largest community colleges. How has NOVA been coping with the surging growth of students and the demand for a new and changing curriculum? Improve Your Physical Fitness and General Health

Did you know that NVCC offers an adult physical fitness and health education program designed for seniors that is outside of our LLI curriculum? Sixty Plus, offered in the fall and spring semesters as part of Continuing Education, is a one-on-one intergenerational fitness and wellness program. Working one-on-one with an NVCC student majoring in physical fitness or rehabilitative therapy, and under the leadership of faculty member Sue Thompson, seniors have an opportunity to improve their health and fitness through a wide variety of exercise and education sessions customized for their needs, limitations and preferences. Offerings include group games, pickle ball, aerobics, balance, flexibility, strength training and individualized exercise. The class meets for 10 weeks on Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 10:00 — 11:30 in the Ernst Cultural Center; the cost is only \$40.00 for 20 sessions. You may register in the Continuing Education office on the upper level of the Ernst Cultural Center Building (up the few stairs from the Forum) starting in September. Our June food collection will go to the Annandale Neighborhood Food Site. This is the first time we have helped this program, which has operated for almost two years. Two churches in the Annandale area have joined together to provide a supplemental feeding program for families in this neighborhood. Each Thursday evening, members of the community can come to the site for perishable and non-perishable donated food. In addition to the two involved churches, donations come from the community. Donation recipients are working poor and/or immigrants and are very appreciative of the food. This is the only site in Annandale that assists people on a walk-in basis, no referrals required. With the economic downturn, the number of clients has grown from about 15 weekly to 75, and it is now difficult for this small group to provide sufficient food. The greatest need is for non perishable food items, as well as paper products and personal need products such as toilet paper, soap, dishwashing liquid, laundry soap, toothpaste and brushes, shampoo, deodorant, and diapers. Carol Weber will deliver the food. This will be the last food collection until September. We have had a very successful year for food donations and your generous contributions have been much appreciated and much needed.

2011 LLI Scholarship Winners

n April, the scholarship committee interviewed 16 students selected from 42 applications for leadership and academic scholarships. Your generosity enabled us to award \$10,000 in scholarship money, to these wonderful, bright, caring, hardworking, and very financially needy applicants.

TAYLOR CLARK, winner of the \$2,000 Knox Singleton Leadership Scholarship, demonstrated a high interest in service on and off campus and internationally. She volunteered at the Children's National Medical Center and at Keene Mill Elementary School, and provided dedicated critical care and tutoring services to a family with a mentally challenged teenager for the past two years. She headed fundraising for the Student Government Association in 2009-2010, organized a major toy drive, and raised \$1,000 for the American Cancer Society as Committee Chair for the Relay for Life team. She is currently Secretary of Phi Theta Kappa and the National Society of Collegiate Scholars. In the summer of 2010, she interned at Projects Abroad Human Rights Law Office in Cape Town, South Africa, where her experience as a student leader enabled her to head the team of interns as they worked on domestic violence workshops for young people in impoverished townships. Taylor's interest in human rights law and her strong motivation toward community and international service infuse her future career goals as she transfers to a four-year university.

DAVID MAMBU, winner of a \$1,000 Leadership Scholarship, is from a rural area of Sierra Leone, and from a poor, uneducated family. Through perseverance and determination, he achieved membership in Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society. He was elected a Senator in the Student Government Association, where he speaks to students about their problems and concerns. He successfully worked on a student concern regarding limited library hours, and got a petition signed that resulted in extended library hours during examinations. He is Treasurer of the African and Caribbean Student Association and a valuable player on the Annandale Campus Men's Soccer Team. David's longtime, unwavering goal is to become a physician and he is persistent in pursuing this career objective. He completed 100 hours of volunteer service at the Emergency Department of Inova Alexandria Hospital, currently volunteers at the Erickson Retirement Community pharmacy and

is taking medical school prerequisite courses at NVCC.

HUNG NGUYEN, also a \$1,000 Leadership Scholarship winner, was selected as one of five student ambassadors from the Annandale campus who serve as leaders and role models for students, promote NVCC to visitors, and conduct special tours for university administrators and foreign officials. He also serves as a volunteer Senator with the Student Government Association. Hung is President of the Vietnamese Students Association and he organized a Mid-Autumn Festival, with lanterns and moon cakes, to introduce the culture of his homeland, Vietnam, to NVCC. A science major, he is a Math Lab Tutor and successfully formed the NVCC Math Club to encourage science students to engage more rigorously in mathematics. Hung is vice president of Scholarship for Phi Theta Kappa, and has done community service at the Northern Virginia Training Center. His dream to become a biochemistry researcher is what led Hung to the United States. He is now ready to transfer to a four-year institution

LINH THAN, winner of the \$2,000 Academic Scholarship, first came to the United States two years ago on a visitor's visa as a Cultural Ambassador for the Asia Foundation. From 3000 students who participated in an essay-writing contest, Linh was one of three representatives of Vietnam Youth selected to visit the U.S. It instilled in her the desire to come here for her education. She was granted a student visa and is now a star student at NVCC. She has a 3.9 GPA, is a member of the National Society of Collegiate Scholars, and is a Presidential Scholar. Majoring in criminal justice, her goal is to work for Homeland Security management. Immigration is a passion for her because the United States has given her opportunities she would never have had in Vietnam and she shows great promise as a future US citizen.

KYLE STEVENSON, a \$1,000 Academic Scholarship winner, spent a significant part of his youth in the foster care system, living in group homes and moving from one family to another until his sister was old enough to take over guardianship. When he turned 18, he was deemed independent and, immediately after graduating high school, began to work to help offset the household costs of his sister, a single parent with two young children. He was finally able to attend college three years later through student loans. He still works full time while maintaining a 3.9 GPA. Kyle, a general studies major, has chosen to study political science and conflict resolution for his bachelor's degree. His goal is to work with the U.S. State Department in international relations. His dream is to make the world a better and safer place and to be a part of the effort that brings peace and stability to struggling areas of the world.

ABBAS ALI, another \$1,000 Academic Scholarship winner, also had to put off college for many years due to financial circumstances. He works full time and is the sole supporter of his family, while holding down a 3.94 GPA. He is a member of Phi Theta Kappa and a Presidential Scholar. Abbas is earning his degree in Information Technology; he has attained academic achievement not only in programming, software design and database systems classes but also in classes such as American Literature and Western Civilization, where he displays strong writing skills. He hopes to secure a summer internship position in an information technology department and plans to attend George Mason University in Fall 2011. His goal is a bachelor's degree in cyber security to enable him to obtain a national security position; he wants to be in the first line of defense for his fellow citizens' security.

EMMANUEL BAGUMIRA, also a winner of a \$1,000 Academic Scholarship, is a poor boy from Rwanda who very recently shook hands with the President of the United States! Born in Rwanda, where a formal education is unavailable to most, he soon realized that he needed to turn his life around. He completed his primary education, and while serving as a young translator, he met his financial sponsor, who gave him a chance to study in the United States. Here, he has taken advantage of every opportunity to learn. He is on the Dean's List and a Presidential Scholar. At present his sponsor can no longer help him financially, so Emmanuel is working in the Office of the Dean of Students on the Manassas campus of NVCC to help his four siblings stay in school back in Africa. His job is greeting campus visitors, and as the Dean says "It is a pleasure knowing and working with an individual with as high a level of ethical standards, morals, and values as Emmanuel." His career goals are to become a CPA and a litigation expert witness. His long-term dream is to return to Rwanda, open his own law firm, and fulfill his political ambitions in his home country.

The Scholarship Committee also recognizes two other outstanding applicants via a merit scholarship of a smaller amount.

JENNIFER ABBOTT is the winner of a \$500 Merit Scholarship. Her desire to become a physician and work with the poor was triggered by her experience three years ago working on a medical mission in a clinic in Haiti. When she returned, she enrolled in premed classes at NVCC. She volunteered in the Emergency Department at Georgetown University, worked as a blood donor phlebotomist, and gained EMT and CPR certification. For the last year and half, working as a medical scribe at Inova Fairfax Hospital, she shadows emergency department physicians to write histories, place orders, chart progress, and discharge patients. She also volunteers at the Free Clinic in Arlington, working with poor patients. At NVCC, she maintains a 3.857 GPA and is a member of Phi Theta Kappa and the National Society of Collegiate Scholars. This summer, Jennifer will hold an NIH research internship; then she aims to take more advanced science courses and set up an independent study program between Inova and NVCC. Her goal is to to start medical school in 2012.

ESTHER NAMUBIRU is also the recipient of a \$500 Merit Scholarship. With a 4.0 GPA, she has been called by one of her professors as "easily one of the best and brightest students of the semester." She joined Phi Theta Kappa and is social chair of the National Society of Collegiate Scholars. Esther is from Uganda and desires to be a journalist. To gain work experience, in Kampala she volunteered to work with the New Vision newspaper, and co-wrote an article critiquing the Ugandan government's way of dealing with religious disputes. She wishes to give a voice to vulnerable groups in her country, such as disadvantaged children. She is a Communications Studies major at NVCC because of her belief that there is a real need for excellent communicators with a genuine interest in improving the lot of the disadvantaged. Her goal is to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Communications to fulfill her dream of becoming an effective journalist.
