
Dr. Saperstone holds BS and MS degrees in Physical Education and received her Doctorate of Arts from George Mason University. She has been at the Annandale Campus of Northern Virginia Community College for 32 years, beginning as an adjunct (part-time) faculty member in Physical Education. In addition to teaching, she served as Assistant Chair of Physical Education, Dean of the Liberal Arts Division, and, currently, Provost of the Annandale Campus.

As part of our interface with the college, the Forum program will include presenting the scholarship winners and hearing from these outstanding students. We will also from hear Dr. Bruce Mann, who has worked closely with us on the scholarship program.

Additionally, we will hold our annual business meeting in which we present the budget for next year and elect the new board members and officers.

Our June food collection, the last collection until the September Forum, will be donated to the ACCA Food Pantry. In addition to the Food Pantry, ACCA (Annandale Christian Community for Action) operates several other programs for low-income families, including furniture distribution, emergency financial assistance for families in crisis, transportation to medical appointments for elderly and disabled, and a developmental day care center. Volunteers run all programs except for the Child Development Center. Twenty-six churches in the Annandale/Bailey's Crossroads area collaborate to operate ACCA, which is now in its 45th year. In addition to the member churches, food is donated by various community organizations, such as local schools and the Boy Scouts. Although any non-perishable food is welcome, there is a special need this month for spaghetti sauce, jelly, and cereal. Betty Lee Thatcher or Carol Weber will deliver this food collection to ACCA.

Thanks to our members for making the May food collection one of the best we have had in a number of years. With four overflowing carts of food and other supplies, we had to call on a number of volunteers to help us get the food outside for pick-up. The Annandale Food Assistance Site at Immanuel United Methodist Church was very grateful for this donation. Thank you for your continuing generosity; your monthly donations to our outreach programs benefit many low-income families in Northern Virginia.

"Hokusai": Thirty-Six Views of Mount Fuji "by Katsushika Hokusai and "Masters of Mercy: Buddha's Amazing Disciples" by Kano Kazunobu. Both of these exhibitions are in the Sackler Gallery. First, however, we will meet at the Freer Gallery to begin our docent-led tour by taking a quick look at two Hokusai paintings/drawings there before proceeding to the Sackler for these exhibitions.

The Hokusai exhibition, a series of renowned prints by Japan's most famous artist, includes "Beneath the Wave off Kanagawa," better known as "The Great Wave at Kanagawa." There are also some rare early printings. The Kano paintings reflect a popular theme in Edo art — the lives and deeds of Buddha's legendary disciples — and features selections from the artist's 100 painting series created for the Pure Land Buddhist Temple, Zojoi.

This is a rare opportunity for us to see the work of these two artists together at one time. Due to time constraints, our tour will be an overview and an invitation for further individual research and learning.

Nothing is currently planned for July or August.

Sept. 2012: "Slavery at Jefferson's Monticello" at the Smithsonian Museum of American History. Paradox of Liberty — Using objects from museum collections and archaeological excavations, this landmark exhibition examines slavery through the lens of Jefferson's plantation and the experiences of six families living at Monticello. This exhibit may be of particular interest to members who sign up for the October trip to Charlottesville that will be announced in the near future. Watch for details!



2012 LLI Scholarship Winners

THE SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE is pleased and privileged to introduce the winners of this year's LLI scholarships. As in the past, the committee was impressed with the achievements of these fine young people whose further studies are facilitated by our members' generous donations.

Leadership Scholarships

Ayman Nahra is awarded LLI's prestigious Knox Singleton Leadership Scholarship of \$2,000, which will help him reach his goal of becoming a medical doctor. Ayman volunteers on-campus in tutoring, fund-raising and leading many activities. Off-campus, he volunteers at INOVA Hospital and plays flute and piano at community events. In spite of these many activities and working 20 hours a week, Ayman has admirably maintained a 4.0 GPA.

Ha Le is awarded a \$1,000 Leadership Scholarship. Ha has been studying Computer Science at NOVA to become a software engineer. She was honored to be selected as a student ambassador for NOVA, representing the school within the community and state. She is also a campus leader and participant in many events, including helping students with social and academic concerns, and tutoring in the Math Laboratory.

Jae Seon Shim is awarded a \$1,000 Leadership Scholarship. Jae Seon has earned a 3.8 GPA and works in NOVA's International Student Office, where he provides guidance and assistance to other foreign students. He volunteers at a hospital helping pediatric patients, and offers his time at his church where he helps members improve their English skills. Jae Seon plans to continue his education with a degree in pharmacy.

Academic Scholarships

Tara Burke is awarded a \$2,000 Academic Scholarship. Tara is studying Russian/Eurasian languages with the hope of working for either the State Department or Central Intelligence Agency. An outstanding student and effective communicator, Tara has been able to achieve a 3.8 GPA while working and being a single mother of four children. After leaving NOVA, she plans to continue with a Liberal Arts degree at George Mason University.

Claire Meyers is awarded a \$1,000 Academic Scholarship. Claire has achieved a 3.8 GPA while working 20-plus hours a week and taking a full load of courses. From her current status as a student in NOVA's Nursing Program, Claire will continue at George Mason University to earn a B.S. in nursing in order to become a Nurse Practitioner. Eventually she would like to attend medical school.

Directions and More

From the Beltway: Driving the Beltway outer loop to Alexandria — take Exit 177A-B, Alexandria/Fort Belvoir (the exit immediately after Telegraph Road). Stay to your left on the exit ramp toward Old Town/Alexandria. At the traffic signal, go right onto Franklin Street. Follow Franklin Street to the next traffic signal at South Washington Street. Go right (south) onto South Washington Street, which becomes the George Washington Parkway, and follow the Parkway south for 5 miles; exit to the right at the sign marked "FORT HUNT ROAD/FORT HUNT PARK."

From Ft. Belvoir: Go North on Route 1 (Richmond Highway) and turn right onto Mt. Vernon Memorial Highway (across from the entrance to Woodlawn Plantation). When you get to Mt. Vernon, go around the circle onto the George Washington Parkway North. Approximately 3 miles from the circle follow the right exit to Ft. Hunt. At the second stop sign turn left toward the Park.

Parking: Look for Area A (Pavilion) parking lot (the first one you will see). There's parking for 150 cars and easy ground level pedestrian access from the parking lot to the Pavilion. There is handicapped parking up close to the Pavilion.

General Information: Because we have the use of the large roof-covered Pavilion, the picnic will be held rain or shine. If the weather forecast is for hot and humid conditions, consider bringing insect repellent, but we have found in past years that there is generally a good breeze which helps keep the temperature down, especially in the pavilion. We will be eating at park picnic tables with bench seats.

don't think our kids know what an apron is. The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath, because she only had a few. It was easier to wash aprons than dresses and they used less material.

But along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven. It was

wonderful for drying children's tears, and on occasion, was even used for cleaning out dirty ears.

From the chicken coop, the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven.

When company came, those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kids.

And when the weather was cold, Grandma wrapped it around her arms.

Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove.

Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron; from the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas were hulled, it carried out the hulls.

In the fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds.

When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men folks knew it was time to come in from the fields for dinner

It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that "old-time apron" that served so many purposes.

Remember Grandma used to set her hot baked apple pies on the window sill to cool. Her granddaughters set theirs on the window sill to thaw. They would go crazy now trying to figure out how many germs were on that apron. I don't think I ever caught anything from an apron.
