#### **March LLI Forum**

Ernst Cultural Center (CE), NOVA Annandale Campus Wednesday, March 7, 2018, at 10 a.m. (Social Time at 9:30 a.m.)

What Do Wind-Sculpted Sand Dunes on Mars Tell Us About How Mars Formed and Developed? Did Mars Lose Much of Its Atmosphere? Smithsonian Scientist Dr. Jim Zimbelman Analyzes the Latest Findings from NASA Rover Missions to Mars.

r. Jim Zimbelman is a planetary geologist who loves to share his knowledge and enthusiasm with general audiences. His lectures are like a virtual space ride to the planets and stars. For more than 28 years Dr. Zimbelman has been with the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum (NASM), where

he has been involved in the analysis of high-resolution spacecraft imaging and geophysical data of the Earth and terrestrial planets and the geologic mapping of Mars and Venus. Similar to Mars and Venus, Earth has many types of sand dunes found throughout, including in the Sahara Desert, the Bahama Islands, Zion National Park, and in Mexico. Geologists study these dunes to learn much about how climate and other environmental factors have affected the history of Earth. Now scientists are able to compare and contrast types of dunes on Earth and Mars. At NASM, Dr. Jim Zimbelman served as the chairman of the Center for Earth and Planetary Studies. He has expertise in physics and mathematics, an M.S. in geophysics and space physics from the University of California at Los Angeles, and a Ph.D. in geology from Arizona State University. He is co-editor of the book Environmental Effects on Volcanic Eruptions From Deep Oceans to Deep Space, co-author of Dunes Worlds, and has written more than 90 papers

### President's Message

 welcomed Catherine Aselford, Event Services Manager of the Ernst Cultural Center, to our January Forum. The two-fold purpose was to acquaint Ms. Aselford with LLI programs and to inform her of the difficulty our membership has hearing from the rear of the room. LLI has acknowledged that the limited audio speakers in the front and center of the Forum room are only part of the problem. We recognize that some of our speakers project better than others and some members, like myself, are borderline in needing hearing aids. I learned during a hearing test this past summer that borderline is defined as hearing someone speak with understanding while in the same room, but probably not understanding when speaking from the next room.

Following the Forum meeting, Ms. Aselford contacted the college audio experts and discussed possible options. Redirecting the center speakers to face more to the rear would create a "hole" in the center. Installing additional speakers in the rear, even portable speakers, would require a wire lead down the center of the room and would be a hazard, even if taped down. There is an added concern that there may not be enough power for added speakers. Equally important, if the guest speaker does not speak into the microphone properly, adding speakers will not help. What we will try is an "over the ear" microphone which will position the mike for better speaker transmission. We will continue to monitor progress on this key issue.



#### Baltimore Museum of Art (BMA) - Admission is free; Museum open 10:00 am - 5:00 pm

The BMA's internationally renowned collection of 95,000 objects encompasses more than 1,000 works by Henri Matisse anchored by the famed Cone Collection of modern art, as well as one of the nation's finest holdings of prints, drawings, and photographs. The galleries showcase an exceptional collection of art from Africa; important works by established and emerging contemporary artists; outstanding European and American paintings, sculpture, and decorative arts; ancient Antioch mosaics; and exquisite textiles from around the world.

#### The Walters Art Museum - Admission is free; Museum open 10:00 am - 5:00 pm

The Walters Art Museum is one of only a few museums in the world to present a panorama of art from the third millennium B.C. to the early 20th century. The thousands of treasures range from mummies to arms and armor, from old master paintings to Art Nouveau jewelry. The Walters' Egyptian, Greek, Roman, Byzantine, Ethiopian and Western Medieval art collections are among the finest in the nation, as are the museum's holdings of Renaissance and Asian art and a spectacular reserve of illuminated manuscripts and rare books. # **Tiny Foods...Big Effort**



#### **Gettysburg & Eisenhower Farm**

#### Thursday, June 7, 2018

After several years' absence, we are going back to Gettysburg, Pennsylvania where the greatest battle in the United States was fought, beginning on July 1, 1863, and lasting for only three days. During that time, over 40,000 soldiers lost their lives. The epic struggle began when a small Confederate scouting party, under the command of General Robert E. Lee, entered the town of Gettysburg looking for shoes.

Our tour starts with a short film at the Visitor's Center, followed by an explanation of the restored Cyclorama map of the battle and will end with a licensed battlefield guide, who will conduct a tour of the battlefield from our bus. After lunch, we will tour the home of General and President Dwight D. Eisenhower and his wife, Mamie, which is designated a National Historic Site. The interior and furnishings of the farmhouse are circa 1950's, and 90% of the contents belonged to the Eisenhowers.

**PRICE:** \$145.00 per person includes deluxe motor coach transportation, a morning snack, driver tip, all admissions, buffet lunch and a guided tour of the battlefield. Our buffet lunch will be at the historic Dobbin House Tavern, Gettysburg's oldest and most historic building.
