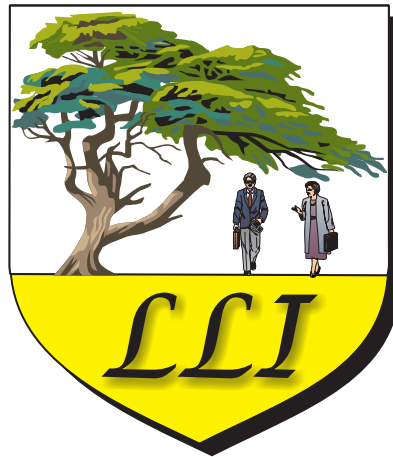

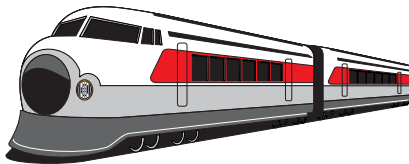
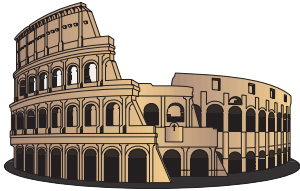

General Information

What Is LLI?

Sponsored by Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA), the Lifetime Learning Institute of Northern Virginia (LLI/NOVA) is a non-profit, member-run organization dedicated to providing continuing educational opportunities to older adults of all backgrounds and income levels. LLI/NOVA is a member of the Elderhostel Institute Network (EIN) and benefits from the services EIN provides in program development.

LLI membership is especially attractive to individuals 50 years old or older (retired or semi-retired), who are interested in pursuing intellectual enrichment and enjoying social interaction with their peers.

LLI:

- is governed and financed by members
- is supported by member-led planning, administration, and instruction
- provides non-credit, non-degree courses
- offers educational, cultural, and social events
- recognizes that physical and mental health are major elements of vital aging.

What Do We Have to Offer?

- Participation in courses and special interest groups throughout the year, usually without charge.
- Participation in day and overnight trips at the special membership rate.
- Participation in the group overseas Study/Travel program.
- Attendance at social events such as the annual picnic and winter holiday luncheon.
- Monthly newsletter.
- And hopefully, new friendships.

In addition, affiliation with both NOVA and EIN means that, as a member of LLI/NOVA, you are entitled to a Community Patron card, obtained from the NOVA library by showing a picture ID. This entitles members to use the NOVA library, located on the third floor of the Godwin Building. Up to three books can be charged out for three weeks; they can be renewed online for an additional period. Go to <http://www.nvcc.edu/library> for more information. There is no cost for the card.

How Are the Courses Organized?

Courses generally consist of one to ten 90-minute sessions, are informal, and frequently include group discussion. They are taught by outside faculty and by your fellow LLI members. Most courses are free to members, but some include assigned reading and purchase of a textbook, or require a small materials fee.

When Are the Classes and Where?

Classes are offered throughout the year, subdivided into Winter/Spring, Summer, and Fall semesters. They are typically held on weekdays between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. The courses are held on the NOVA Annandale campus and off-campus in churches, community centers and other suitable locations.

How Do I Become a Member and What Is the Cost?

Complete a membership application form found on pages 21 and 23, and mail with your check to the address shown. The current annual membership fee is \$110. The membership period is for 12 months beginning with the month in which dues are paid.

How Do I Register for Courses and Tours?

Complete a course registration form found on pages 17 and 19, listing the courses you wish to attend *in order of preference*. Mail to the LLI office with a self-addressed, stamped envelope and any applicable fees as soon as possible; **registration for courses closes Wednesday, June 6, 2012**. Registration forms received after that date will be considered only if there are spaces remaining in the courses you select. Your registration form will be mailed back to you in your self-addressed envelope shortly after the closing date, but in advance of the first class, indicating whether you have been accepted, wait-listed, or whether the class has been canceled. **As a courtesy to other LLI members, please call the Coordinator listed in the specific course description if you will not be able to attend part or all of a course after you have been accepted. This will give members on a waiting list an opportunity to attend.**

LLI courses are open only to those LLI members who have registered and been accepted into the course unless otherwise specified. **Please note that if you are wait-listed for a course, you are not “accepted” unless notified. The next time the course is offered, you must re-register but will be given priority acceptance.**

What Is the Monthly Forum?

Members and non-members are warmly welcomed as guests to attend the Speakers Program and Open House Forum. The Forum is held monthly (except December and during the summer) at 10:00 a.m. in the Richard J. Ernst Community Cultural Center (see map on page 4) on the NOVA Annandale Campus (see page 5 for schedule). Persons attending these Forums should park in the garage on Center Drive next to the Ernst Center. There is a \$1.00 per hour charge to park in the garage.

Class Cancellations

For Classes: If the Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) cancel school for the day due to inclement weather or other emergency, all LLI classes, Forums, and other activities, **(except for Trips/Travel—see below)**, are cancelled regardless of class location. 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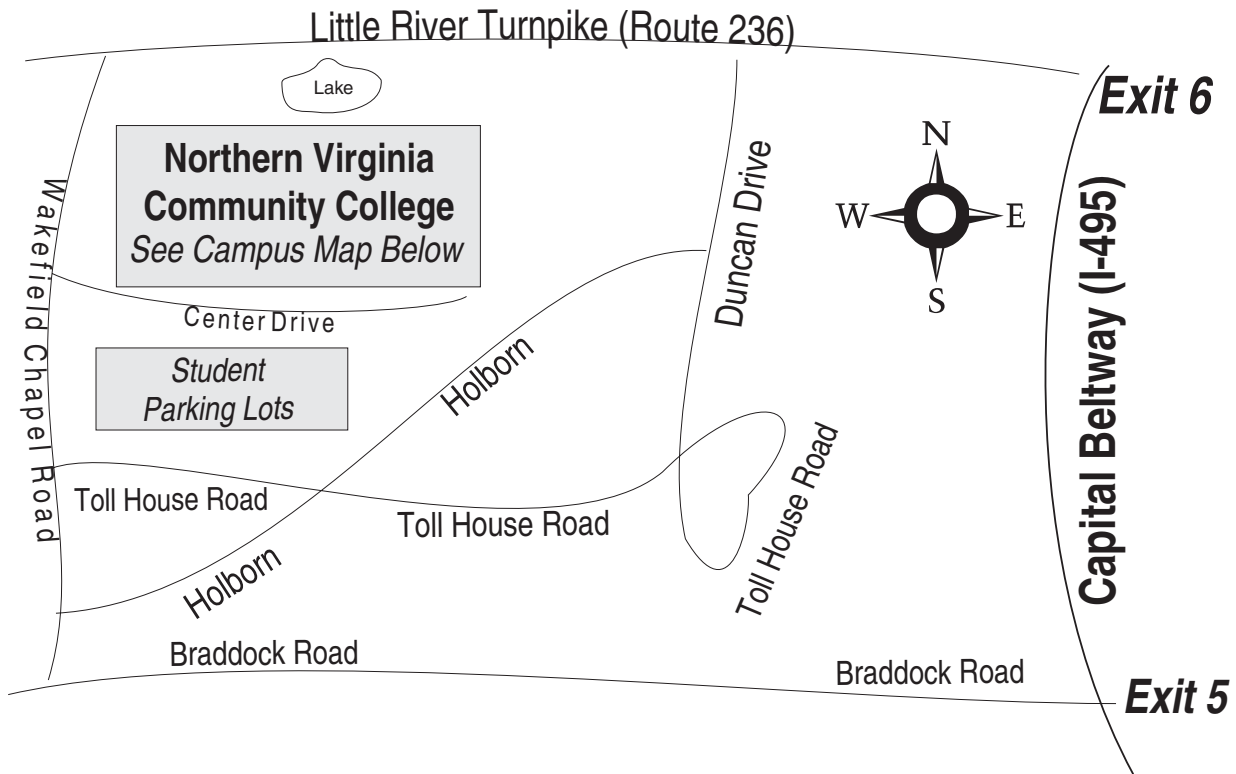
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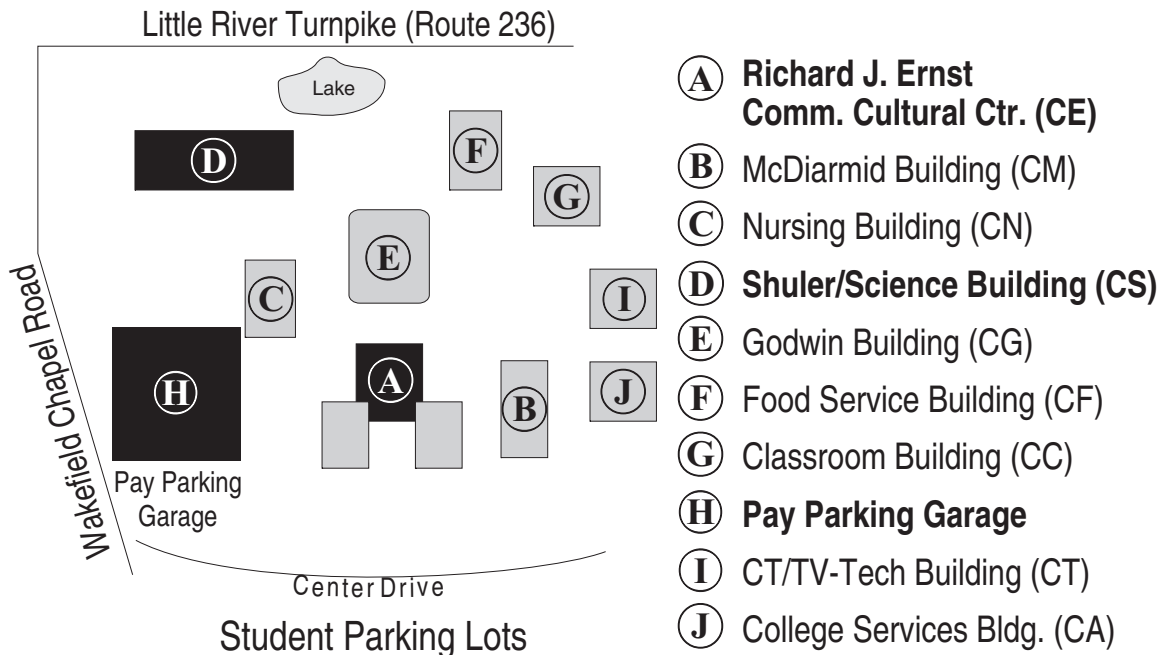
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NOVA Campus Maps

Course 12S01A Museum Masterpieces: The Metropolitan Museum of Art (3 Sessions)

This is a continuation of the course given during the Fall 2011 and Winter/Spring 2012 semesters; attendance at these courses is not a prerequisite. In these Great Courses lectures, Yale-educated Art Professor Richard Brettell covers European sculpture, the arts of Africa and Oceania, the Ancient New World (pre-Columbian), Musical Instruments and Arms and Armor, Costumes and Textiles, and American Art: 1650-1865. The range of works illustrates one of Brettell's main themes about the Met: the breadth of art displayed there is unparalleled in any other single museum.

Course 12S08A The New Reality of Aging—Growing Older in a Post-Boomer World (1 Session)

America, like the world, is aging. For the first time in history, long life isn't a rarity. Two-thirds of all the people who have ever reached the age of 65 are alive today. And, 65 is no longer considered “old”—most

of us can count on living another 18-20 years after that, and more than half will live well into our 90's. We are in the midst of an aging revolution that is changing what it means to grow old. As Richard Hobbs of the American Institute of Architects has observed, "Just as the baby boom flooded maternity wards, ignited school construction and made 'youth' the cultural icon of the 1950's, '60's and '70's, the 'senior boom' of this century will shape the 2010's, '20's and '30's." At the same time, changes in technology and digital communication are dramatically changing our world at an alarming rate. In this session, we will explore the new reality of aging in the 21st century and the implications for issues such as health, housing, financial security and long-term care.

Course 12S09P "Around the World in 80 Days" (2 Sessions)

Join us as world travelers Lorrin and Ann Garson relate the adventures of their recent fabulous trip! First, we'll hear about the 7,487-mile flight the Garsons took in the Spring of 2011 to Auckland, New Zealand, to commence a 23,000 nautical mile trip around the world. Join them and escape to New Zealand and Australia on the first leg of this epic voyage. New Zealand ports of call included Auckland, Tauranga, Napier, Wellington, Christchurch (11 days before the recent major earthquake), Dunedin, Stewart Island and Fjordland National Park. They continued on to historic Tasmania, visiting both Hobart and Port Arthur. These locations include much variety, cosmopolitan cities, charming towns, indigenous cultures, and jaw-dropping beautiful scenery.

In the second session, the Garsons will begin with Sydney and Cairns, Australia, and then take us to Asian ports: Manila (the cosmopolitan capital of the Philippines); Hong Kong; Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam (locals still call it Saigon); and Singapore (an affluent city with a medley of Chinese, Malay and Indian influences). Blended together are natural wonders, ancient sites, and modern marvels. The Asian destinations exhibit a fascinating mix of East and West as well as famed antiquities and thoroughly modern cities.

This is a continuation of the course given in the Winter/Spring 2012 semester during which Dr. Wallace Hutcheon covered several aspects of the war, including its causes, invasions during 1812 sea battles, and various conflicts through 1813. Join Christopher Zimmerman, Conductor of the Fairfax Symphony Orchestra, as we cover the beginnings of symphonic music and formation of a “classical” language: the music of Hayden, Mozart and Beethoven. CHRISTOPHER ZIMMERMAN, BA in Music, Yale University; MA, University of Michigan; currently Conductor of the Fairfax Symphony Orchestra; has conducted numerous renowned symphony and chamber orchestras in the United States, Europe and China; has had a diverse operatic conducting repertoire and is a champion of contemporary music; was announced as the first prize winner of the “American Conducting Prize” in the professional orchestra category in 2011.

Course 12S15P The Universe: The Search For Life (2 Sessions)

This is a continuation of the course given during the Fall 2011 semester. Utilizing lectures by Professor Neil Tyson (Hayden Planetarium; Princeton University) from The Great Courses DVD lectures on “My Favorite Universe,” combined with The History Channel’s (HC’s) “The Universe,” we will look at efforts to discover whether there is life out there, going from the creation of life on Earth, to evidence of past life on Mars, to life on the Jupiter and Saturn moons, as well as the likelihood of some form of life on planets in our Milky Way Galaxy, or on planets in more distant galaxies in the Universe. The first session will cover Prof. Tyson’s lecture on “The Search for Life in the Universe,” and the HC’s “Life Beyond the Sun,” dealing with the possibility of life in our solar system, particularly Mars, and beyond. The second session will cover two of HC’s presentations, including “Astrobiology,” looking at the formation of life on Earth, the search for past life on Mars and beyond to other planets in our galaxy and in the Universe, and “The Search for ET,” speculating on life on Jupiter’s moon, Europa, and Saturn’s moon, Titan, as well as exploration of distant planets in the Universe through computerized artificial intelligence.

August 2 Before the war: *Ship of Fools* was based on a novel by Katherine Anne Porter. It involves passengers on a German ship in 1933 sailing from

South America to Hamburg, representing many levels, social and moral, among the German passengers and a few Americans, English disabled and Jews. The cast is Oscar studded: Vivien Leigh, Simone Signoret, Jose Ferrer, Lee Marvin and Oskar Werner. As people face the return to a new Nazi state, they reveal themselves psychologically.

August 9

During the war: *Bridge on the River Kwai* won the best picture Oscar in 1958. It focuses on the building of a railroad bridge by English prisoners of war in a Burmese jungle. Its central characters are the rigid Japanese commandant, who represents some of the worst characteristics of the Japanese wartime mentality, pitted against the highest ranking English soldier, who has many of the same values, but who runs things by charm and insight. The outstanding cast includes Oscar winners Alec Guinness and William Holden.

August 16

After the war: *Judgment at Nuremberg* was made in the early 1960's and stars Spencer Tracy, Marlene Dietrich, Judy Garland, Burt Lancaster, Montgomery Clift and Maximilian Schell. The story centers on the trial of high ranking Nazi war criminals in 1947, and reveals the sufferings of a wide spectrum of German society.

There are two Fairfax Medical Center buildings here. You want the one on the street, not the one (Building II) in the back. Park on either side of the building or in one of the spaces in front of the building. Take the elevator to the third floor and follow the signs to Suite 304.

Goodwin House, 3440 South Jefferson Street, Falls Church.

Directions from Bailey's Crossroads (intersection of Columbia Pike and Leesburg Pike/Route 7)

Go east on Leesburg Pike/Route 7. Turn left at the traffic light at South Jefferson Street. South Jefferson is located between two shopping centers, "Crossroads Place" and "Leesburg Pike Plaza." As a landmark, look for the *Olive Garden* restaurant on your left as you turn onto South Jefferson. Follow South Jefferson Street. Go through one traffic light, and go to the Goodwin House entry driveway. Go to the right and follow the circular drive back toward the left. A number of visitors' and handicapped parking spots are available there; a larger number are available along the side of the building.

Greenspring Village, 7440 Spring Village Drive, Springfield.

Directions from the Beltway toward Richmond

Take Exit 169-B toward Old Keene Mill Road. Bear right at the Brandon Avenue exit and turn left onto Bland Street. Then turn left onto Amherst Avenue. Amherst will become South Backlick Road. Continue on Backlick Road to the exit for the Springfield/Franconia Parkway West (Route 7900). Turn right at the first traffic light onto Spring Village Drive into the entrance to Greenspring Village.

Advise the guard station attendant that you are going to be attending a "Lifetime Learning Institute" class. Follow signs to Village Square. You will need to sign a guest register at the reception desk. The receptionist will give you directions to your classroom.

Directions from the Fairfax County Parkway (Route 7100)

Going east toward Springfield, continue to Spring Village Drive and turn left into Greenspring Village.

Advise the guard station attendant that you are going to be attending a "Lifetime Learning Institute" class. Follow signs to Village Square. You will need to sign a guest register at the reception desk. The receptionist will give you directions to your classroom.

James Lee Community Center, 2855 Annandale Road, Falls Church.

Directions from the Beltway

Take Arlington Boulevard (Route 50) toward Falls Church to Annandale Road. Turn left on Annandale Road (going toward the center of Falls Church) to the traffic light at James Lee Street. Turn right into the parking lot. Please enter the building on the parking lot side and take an immediate right to the classrooms.

Little River United Church of Christ, 8410 Little River Turnpike, Annandale.

Directions from the Beltway

Go west on Little River Turnpike (Route 236) to the second traffic light (you will see the NOVA campus on the left). Turn right at the light and follow the road to the church parking lot.

Directions from Wakefield Chapel Road

Turn right onto Little River Turnpike (Route 236) and get into the left lane. Turn left at the first traffic light and follow the road to the church parking lot.

Mason District Governmental Center, 6507 Columbia Pike, Annandale.

Directions from the Beltway

Go east on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Turn left onto John Marr Drive (next light after passing Giant Food on the left). Turn right at the next light, which is Columbia Pike. Go through several traffic lights. Following the traffic light at the intersection with Whispering Lane, there is a sign in the median reading "Fairfax County Police Station." Proceed a short distance and turn right into the parking lot of the Center.

NOVA Campus Buildings
(Refer to campus map on p. 4.)

Parking for all Campus Classes and Activities. PLEASE PARK IN THE PAY PARKING GARAGE NEXT TO THE CULTURAL CENTER. THERE IS A \$1.00 PER HOUR CHARGE TO PARK IN THE GARAGE.

Ernst Community Cultural Center (CE), also called the NOVA Cultural Center, Annandale Campus, building marked "A" on the map. The

Forum is the large open space (with fireplace) on the mezzanine level. Seminar rooms are on the mezzanine level adjacent to the Forum.

Shuler/Science Building (CS), Annandale Campus, is marked "D" on the map. It is recommended that you park on Level 3 of the parking garage. After exiting the garage at Level 3, walk straight ahead past the CN (Nursing) Building to the main entrance of the CS Building where there is a lobby. The rooms at this level are in the 200 series. The classrooms assigned to LLI are in the 100 series and are down one level.

To reach Room CT-131 by stairs, turn left after entering the building, walk to the end of the corridor and take the stairs on the left side of the corridor. Turn right at the bottom of the stairs to CT-131, which is on the right side of the corridor.

To reach Room CT-131 by elevator, turn right after entering the building, walk to the end of the corridor, and turn left. The elevator is on the right immediately after entering this corridor. Upon exiting the elevator, turn left and then right to CT-131, which will be on the left side of the corridor.

To reach Room CT-138 by stairs, turn right after entering the building, walk to the end of the corridor, turn left and walk to the end of this corridor. Turn left and you will immediately see the stairs on the right side of the corridor. Turn left at the bottom of the stairs and take an immediate right. Room CT-138 is the first door on the right side of the corridor.

To reach Room CT-138 by elevator, turn right after entering the building, walk to the end of the corridor, and turn left. The elevator is on the right immediately after entering this corridor. Upon exiting the elevator, turn right to Room CT-138, which is on the left side of the corridor.

St. Matthew's United Methodist Church, 8617 Little River Turnpike, Annandale.

Directions from the Beltway

Drive west on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Pass the NOVA campus and Wakefield Chapel Road (second and third traffic lights). Take the next left (which does not have a traffic light) onto Wakefield Drive; immediately turn right and then left into the church parking lot. Park in spaces near the left-hand side of the church since you will be entering the building through a basement door on the left side.

Directions from Braddock Road going East

Turn left onto Wakefield Chapel Road. Continue for approximately 1.3 miles (passing NOVA on the

right) and turn left onto Virginia Avenue. At the stop sign turn right onto Wakefield Drive and then turn left into the church parking lot.

The Virginian, 9229 Arlington Boulevard (Route 50), Fairfax.

Directions from the Beltway and Little River Turnpike (Route 236)

Drive west on Little River Turnpike to Pickett Road. Turn right on Pickett Road and drive to Arlington Boulevard. Turn right onto Arlington Boulevard and then turn right at the first traffic light which will take you into The Virginian's driveway. Parking is permitted in any vacant slot that is not designated as handicapped or employee parking.

Directions from the Beltway and Arlington Boulevard (Route 50)

Drive west on Arlington Boulevard. Turn left at the first traffic light** after Nutley Street into The Virginian's driveway. Parking is permitted in any vacant slot that is not designated as handicapped or employee parking.

**Landmark at this traffic light: Stonehurst Drive is on the right. Be sure to take a left at the traffic light into The Virginian complex.

The Woodlands, 4320 Forest Hill Drive, Fairfax.

Directions from the Beltway

Take the Braddock Road West exit and go west on Braddock Road (approximately 7 miles) to Shirley Gate Road (Route 655). Turn right onto Shirley Gate Road and proceed to the first traffic light at Lee Highway. Turn left onto Lee Highway and then turn left at the next traffic light (Forest Hill Road). Continue to the second entrance on your right at The Woodlands sign.

Parking is permitted at The Woodlands as well as at the first building, The Gardens, next door. If both parking lots are full, street parking is permitted on Forest Hill Drive.

Directions from I-66

Take I-66 to the exit for Route 50 East (Fairfax). Go right at the first traffic light (Waples Mill Road). Turn right onto Lee Highway, and then turn left at the first light (Forest Hill Drive). Take the second entrance on the right into The Woodlands on the left.

Parking is permitted at The Woodlands as well as at the first building, The Gardens, next door. If both parking lots are full, street parking is permitted on Forest Hill Drive.
