HOW SCIENCE WORKS: ITS PROCESSES, NATURE AND LIMITS

Dr. Jay Labov will speak about initiatives to promote science ed-

ucation and, specifically, to confront challenges to the teaching of evolution in the nation's public schools.

Coincidentally, a new four-star documentary dramatizes several of Dr. Labov's main concerns. The movie, "Jim Allison: Breakthrough," tells the story of the Texas immunologist who was awarded the Nobel Prize in 2018 for his pioneering breakthrough in cancer therapy research. Allison is shown in tiny Alice, Texas, where as a boy he has the courage and temerity to challenge creationism in his public school. Washington Post movie critic Ann Hornaday (who was an earlier LLI/NOVA Forum speaker) reviewed the docu-

mentary in early October, gave it a four-star rating, and says this movie is "a captivating homage to scientific discovery and an enduring portrait of a modest, quietly driven genius."

While our speaker is not associated with Hollywood, he does share some characteristics with Allison. Through interactive discussions, Dr. Labov will explain how scientific hypotheses can contribute to the development of scientific theories. He also will discuss new trends in science education in Virginia and elsewhere to help students actually do science rather than merely memorizing a lot of scientific facts and jargon.

Jay Labov spent 18 years as a member of the biology faculty at Colby College in Maine. He then spent 23 years at the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine, where he was senior advisor for education and communication. He has directed or contributed to more than 30 National Academies reports on improving science and engineering education.

All attending the Forum will receive a brochure, "Science, Evolution, and Creationism," a report from the National Academy of Sciences for which Dr. Labov served as project director.

President's Message

Communication

These days, social media gives many people an audience and sense of belonging. Most professional, educational, community and social organizations have an active presence via Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, WhatsApp and similar platforms. . . . but we do not.

Yet through our excellent interactive Home page, LLI/NOVA has the capacity to communicate and share information quite easily and efficiently. We just need to use it. And we need to talk with one another.

Because we use email blasts minimally, mainly as class reminders, and because we do not post to social media at each LLI/NOVA class/event, it is imperative that we establish and maintain dialogue. Often immediately before or after a class or Forum, we may observe sub-groups chatting. Unfortunately, our "monkey mind" (the voice inside our head that always is speaking to us) tries to persuade us that "they" all know each other and that we are the outsider. Sometimes that is mainly because we haven't communicated. In many instances, I have asked someone about the person who sat near him/her for the past several sessions and found that no one knows the person's name, including me. What a wasted opportunity.

Often class members discuss the speaker's content, including suggestions for follow-on classes or a Forum topic. Some would like a way to continue sorting out ideas that were stirring during a class, perhaps via a social media blog or an invitation to the speaker to return for another session. As it is now, the richness of post-class discussion, gaining a personal rapport, and even cynical commentaries get lost. Most members commute to and from class solo, go home and never follow up.

Not all is lost, of course. By using our website, one can email directly to the Board, LLI/NOVA Admin, Newsletter Editor, Curriculum Committee, Class Coordinators and more. When members reach out, it is critical that the Board and Committee Chairs listen, treat them with dignity and provide feedback or respond. Occasionally, we receive emails suggesting future Forum speakers and classes. Sometimes we get comments that are not as friendly (i.e., remove the picture of the old man with the baggy pants from our Home page), but we work through them and are glad to hear from members.

By communicating our views and concerns while chatting with a member in class, at a Forum (including the post Forum Lunch Bunch) or at a SIG meeting, we can continue to build a sense of belonging.




LLI/NOVA Clothing Drive for NOVA's International Students

Living Artfully

Marjorie Merriweather Post lived a long, complex, and fabulous life as an heiress, philanthropist, businesswoman and serious art collector. Her last home on the East Coast was Hillwood Estate, Muse-

um and Gardens in Washington, D.C.

To study her life, LLI/NOVA offered an unusual five-part series: four classes on campus and a trek into Washington on a Saturday morning to visit Hillwood. Twenty-five members registered for the course and found the project enriching. About half of them overcame life's unexpected



hurdles and attended most or all of the sessions, then drove into the city for two tours, the 10:30 a.m. Garden Tour (most visitors miss the lower Japanese garden) and the 11:30 a.m. Mansion Tour.

Teaching the class was Tonia Rodgers, Associate Dean for Language at NOVA-Annandale and an Assistant Professor of English as a



Second Language. She grew up in St. Petersburg, Russia, and is a docent at Hillwood, where much of the art Post collected is Russian. After each class, Dean Rodgers promptly sent 30- to 60-minutes of video clips or podcasts, ensuring that class members were well-prepared when they visited the estate. In addition, she arranged for them to be given hand-held magnifying glasses so they could better examine the Faberge eggs, the wood overlays and other pieces of priceless art that Post collected.

This was a successful example of a multi-part class-plus-tour combination.

The VPA group toured the Embassy of Finland on Oct. 15. The beautiful Embassy of Finland is across the street from the Vice

President's residence on Massachusetts Avenue in the District.

The embassy's glass and stone architecture is phenomenal. The entire back wall is glass and looks out onto the picturesque landscape backing up into Rock Creek Park. There are a wood deck and catwalk out in the back area too. The inside of the building features lots of wood and natural light that shines into the large open reception area.

The Embassy of Finland, a "green embassy," was the first diplomatic mission in Washington,

D.C., to gain a gold-level LEED certification. In 2015, it received a platinum-level certification with 89 points. This year, in its second recertification, the embassy gained a whopping 92 points. Only two buildings in the United States have earned more than 92 points in their Existing Building certifications.

LLI/NOVA members who missed this SIG event can still register for our Dec. 12 class on Finland and hear Bruce Griffin discuss how Finland, which is slightly smaller than Montana, developed from one of the poorest countries in Europe to become the "Happiest Nation" in the world, according to the World Happiness Report.

Also, all LLI/NOVA members are invited to join us for a tour at the Library of Congress on Oct. 30 and/or the Textile Museum on Dec. 11.
