LOOKING FOR LIFE IN ALL THE WRONG PLACES: THE SEARCH FOR LIFE IN THE UNIVERSE

Dr. Harold Geller Explains It All at the February Forum

Martians invaded southern England in H.G. Wells' 1897 imaginative best-seller, "The War of the Worlds." Ever since, we have been on the lookout for green extraterrestrials. Does life exist outside of Earth? If so, what would life look like, and how would scientists discover and identify it?

Physicist Harold A. Geller might know. He'll let us in on his work at the February Forum, Wednesday, Feb. 5, at 10 a.m.

Since 2012, Dr. Geller has served as a Solar System Ambassador for the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory. Presently, he is Observatory Director and Associate Professor at George Mason University. He served as co-Investigator for the Vir-

ginia Initiative for Science Teaching and Achievement, the largest educational grant ever awarded Mason, from 2011 through 2015.

In 2008, Dr. Geller, who served as associate chair of the Department of Physics and Astronomy at Mason, received the university's Faculty Member of the Year Award.

In addition to teaching at Mason and at Northern Virginia Community College, Dr. Geller is president of the Potomac Geophysical Society; a tour guide and lecturer with NASA Goddard Space Flight Center; producer of educational multimedia CD-ROMs; a doctoral fellow of the State Council of Higher Education for Virginia; and a lecturer/operator at the National Air and Space Museum's Einstein Planetarium in Washington, DC.

He also is the author of books, contributed to edited volumes, and has published more than 90 papers in education, astrobiology, astrophysics, and biochemistry. Dr. Geller has been interviewed or quoted in the USA Today, The Washington Post, Huffington Post, The Arts and Entertainment Magazine, Astrocast TV, WTOP News Radio, Newschannel 8, and The Skeptic.

President's Message

Senior Fusion Within LLI/NOVA

Our membership is open to those age 50 or older; however, the aver-

age member age is 73, based on our 2018 survey. Over time as we "cycle through" and due to attrition, the age range of our 365-plus membership will be broader than the years of our work careers, presuming a 40-year work career from age 22 to 62.

At our February 2019 Forum, Stan Corey discussed his book *When Work Becomes Optional*, noting the four stages of retirement: 1) Go-go years; 2) Slow-go years; 3) No-go; and 4) Exit. Obviously, these stages are not dictated solely by chronological age. Health, finances, and personal preferences also help determine these stages.

LLI/NOVA members align under three core tenets: intellectual enrichment, travel, and social interaction. So, as we focus on formulation and delivery, this breadth of membership warrants special attention in the way we attract, recruit, and retain members. This is especially so in dynamic Northern Virginia, where retirees come from a multitude of backgrounds and with unique experiences and skills. We hope to display an attitude of openness and welcoming that, over time, builds community.

Go ahead and exhale . . . we are not about to launch a new major operating model. On the other hand, we are requesting all (top-down and ground-up) to share their skills, interests, and pastimes to ensure consideration and representation. Our LLI/NOVA website provides almost countless options for such idea sharing and member engagement in an innovative and flexible manner (e.g., general comments, class presenters, volunteering, travel and SIGs). Please use it so we can serve you better.

As we grapple with the dynamics of change, exploring why people resist and how to overcome that resistance, we recognize that a diverse membership warrants diverse events. Slightly more than one-third (120+/-) of our members have been with us less than three years! Many long-term members are open to meet-ups for coffee/snack or committee meetings. Yet many members in their early 60s prefer email/online communications. Conversely, things we did in the past -- member-hosted weekend meetups, for example -- may need to be revisited as well as trying new ways to commute to outings, such as trying Amtrak or carpooling for longer distances within three hours instead of hiring a van. Our options are many. Working together, we can embrace flexibility and informality.

Community Outreach

At the LLI/NOVA Forum on Feb. 5, the food collection will benefit NO-VA's Annandale Campus Student Food Pantry. (The Forum collection

for St. Mary's Catholic Church will be in March, due to cancellation of the January Forum.)

LLI/NOVA members are interested in assisting the NOVA Annandale students, so we asked Dr. Jacintha Jayatilake to tell us more. She is the faculty sponsor for the Rotaract Club, which focuses on the development of young adults as leaders in their communities and workplaces. Please read her interesting story.

"In 2015 the issue of 'food insecurity' among NO-VA (Annandale) students caught my attention when several students confided in me about their inability to buy food towards the end of the month. I took it to the table for discussion at one of our Rotaract club meetings where we identified food insecurity as an all too common problem for many students. After many discussions, the Rotaractors decided to do something to bring the issue to the attention of the college administration. After meetings with the Dean of Students, Annandale Provost and the College President, the club members decided to open the Annandale Campus Food Pantry.

"The college assigned us a closet next to the Student Life office, which had to be mopped, scrubbed, painted and cleaned in order to store canned food items. With financial assistance from the Annandale Rotary Club and donations from faculty, staff and students at the Annandale campus, we opened the Annandale Campus Food Pantry in the Spring of 2016.

"We have been maintaining the food pantry to the best of our ability. On average we serve about seven or eight students per week. The Office of Student Life assists us in the distribution of food. It is now part of the College Financial Stability

Program.

"Our aspirations are to serve at least one hot meal twice a week (breakfast) consisting of bagels, cream cheese, muffins, milk and orange juice. The most needed food items are cereal, peanut butter, jelly, tuna, pasta and pasta sauce, canned fruits, vegetables and soup.

"Thank you so much for your continued interest and donations to the Annandale Campus Food Pantry."

Success Story: LLI/NOVA Scholarship recipient Wesam Elhawabri

In April, 2019, LLI/NOVA's scholarship program awarded a \$1,000 Leadership Scholarship to Wesam Elhawabri, a second-year student at NO-VA.

Ms. Elhawabri moved from Egypt to Northern Virginia at age 18. She had graduated from secondary school in Egypt, focusing on science courses. As a young woman in Egypt, she was constantly reminded by relatives and friends that her path to happiness and success was marriage. Looking back, however, she reflects that "I found that being educated, being helpful in society, and being independent -- not relying on a man -- is my real target for success."

At NOVA, she initially had to concentrate on English as a Second Language courses, but moved on to a challenging course load including biology, physics, chemistry, psychology, and advanced mathematics. She earned a 3.84 grade point average. At the same time, she worked as a cashier in a local Ross store, tutored at NOVA in math and Arabic, volunteered in a hospital and dental clinic, and took leadership positions in the International Friends and Phi Theta Kappa organizations on the NOVA campus.

Ms. Elhawabri finished her two years at NOVA

shortly after receiving her LLI/NOVA scholarship and moved to Virginia Commonwealth University, where she is a Junior. She used her LLI/NOVA scholarship to help finance her first year at VCU. She is majoring in biomedical engineering with a pre-dental emphasis. Her career objective is to become a dentist and to be able to practice both in the United States and in Egypt. She is also hoping to demonstrate that an Egyptian woman can succeed and find personal satisfaction not just in the traditional marriage role but also as an educated professional.

Class Registration
