Lunch Bunch



Picnic Directions and More

Directions: Driving the Beltway outer loop to Alexandria – Take Exit 177A-B, Alexandria / Fort Belvoir (the exit immediately after Telegraph Road). At the traffic signal go left onto Route 1 (north), moving to the right lane as you proceed. At the next traffic signal go right onto Franklin Street. Follow Franklin Street about 3 blocks to the traffic signal at its intersection with South Washington Street in Old Town Alexandria. Go right (south) onto South Washington Street, which becomes the George Washington Parkway, and follow the Parkway south for 5 miles; exit to the right at the sign marked "FORT HUNT ROAD/FORT HUNT PARK."

Nota bene: The area around the intersection of Exit 177A-B and U.S. Route 1 is under construction as part of the new Wilson Bridge project and thus is subject to change. Be aware that changes may occur to the route described here between now (early August) and the time of the picnic in late September.

Parking: Look for the signs indicating **Area A** (Pavilion) parking lot. There's parking for 150 cars and easy ground level pedestrian access from the parking lot to the Pavilion.

General Information: If the weather forecast on September 20 is for hot and humid conditions, consider bringing insect repellent and portable electric fans with you to the picnic. Also, we will be eating at park picnic tables with bench seats; for your comfort at other times you may wish to bring your own folding chairs. Because we have use of the large roof-covered Pavilion, the picnic will be held rain or shine.

Recognizing LLI Volunteers

classes throughout the past year. From the LLI
membership, NVCC faculty, Fairfax County
programs, the National Park Service and a variety of
other sources they searched for instructors who
would share their knowledge gratis with LLI.

Work on the Fall Program began in earnest in April when the committee started the intensive tasks of engaging instructors, working out class content and dates of presentation, and finally writing 36 course descriptions. Meanwhile Space Coordinator Clint Hall searched for classrooms with adequate size and technical capacity. He finalized agreements with thirteen different venues. By May the committee members had gathered the descriptive material for the catalog, which Gina Trapp and Sally Wise edited throughout June.

Meanwhile the committee was administering the current semester. They rescheduled or relocated a class where there was a problem and they contacted wait-listed people when there was an opening. They assured the speaker was present, the classroom was set up properly and the audio-visual aids were in place. They took attendance and distributed and reviewed the evaluations. All the while they continued to search for classes for the following session.

At the end of June the final draft for the fall session was sent to Al Brothers, the publications designer for LLI. The catalog was printed and mailed in late July. Now it is in your hands. While you thumb through its pages, think of all the long hours of work the Curriculum Committee puts into creating and administering the LLI programs. Better yet, join them. They are in need of people to help find courses and to act as room coordinators. Contact Paul Hopler to learn more about this volunteer opportunity.

This fall LLI is again fortunate to have several members sharing their talents as instructors.

LLI's Office Has Moved

The LLI office moved from the Schuler Building (room CS 238) to the Food Service Building (room CF 218) on August 10. Please continue to send your mail to the address on this newsletter until further notice. You can also drop mail off at our new office by placing your items through a mail slot just to the right of the office door if the office is not open.

Directions to the office from the parking garage: Go to the upper level of the Cultural Center (CE Building) and exit through the doors at the rear of the building which will take you out to a concrete plaza. You will see the Godwin Building (CG) directly in front of you. Walk on the right side of this building and proceed to the Food Service Building (CF). Enter the front doors of the CF Building on the right hand side and turn left at the corridor. The LLI office is on the right side at the end of the corridor (number CF 218). (NOTE: The "Annandale Campus Map" on page 4 of the Fall 2006 course catalog will provide you with an overview of where the Food Service Building is situated. It is designated as number 6 on the map.)

Membership Dues Increase

The Board of Directors has voted to increase the annual membership dues from the present \$100 to \$110. The dues increase will be effective for all dues paid after September 30, 2006. Members whose annual membership expires prior to September 30, 2006, are advised to pay their dues on time, as the higher rate will be applied to all dues payments received after that date. This modest increase, the first ever for individual membership, is necessary to meet the ever-increasing operating costs and stem the expenditure of our shrinking members equity (reserves) account.

President's Corner

LLI has now completed 10 years of operation, and I am pleased to report to you that LLI is well and is continuing to thrive. In July we had our annual LLI Retreat, during which we reviewed the current state of LLI in relation to the Strategic Plan, assessed our future well being and considered ways to ensure the membership's continued interest in our program. A summary of the retreat is presented elsewhere in this issue.

Major focus for this year is recruitment of new members, which now number below 350, and the need to reevaluate our dues which provide the primary funding for our operating budget. In spite of our best efforts, LLI's current annual income does not fully cover our projected expenses and budget. As much as the Board regretted doing so, we took the necessary steps to raise our annual dues to \$110, which is still a bargain for all that LLI provides. In addition, we will publicize LLI in several senior news papers and encourage our members to invite prospective members to our monthly Forums as a way to introduce them to LLI.

The Board and LLI could not operate without the volunteers who come forward to help in ways and projects too numerous to describe, but we always need more members to become active volunteers. Remember, LLI is a volunteer organization, and since you are a member, please lend a hand when asked to help out, or, why not volunteer without being asked.

Our tenth anniversary celebrations continue, and we expect to see everyone at the celebration picnic on September 20. Don't miss out on the fun!

Great Decisions 2006 Materials to Be Donated to NVCC

LLI will continue its annual donation to the NVCC-Annandale library of the tapes and books associated with the "Great Decisions" series. Members who took the "Great Decisions 2006" course last spring and have not turned in their books are invited to bring them to the August 29 Forum meeting. Lorin Goodrich will collect them for the library. Thank you.

Annual Board Planning Retreat

The Board held its annual planning meeting July 12, 2006, at Greenspring Village. In addition to Board members, Administrator Laura Charron, Assistant Treasurer Warren Hynes, and Travel Committee Member Louise Sousk participated.

Strategic Plan Review: Curt Kornblau presented the preliminary LLI Strategic Plan for July 2006-2008; the final plan will be available in the fall. The plan identifies five areas needing Board attention: (1) membership dues; (2) follow up with potential volunteers; (3) publicity of what is available to LL members on the NVCC campus (library, college courses, lectures, etc.); (4) Student Award/Scholarship Program and other ways to show we are supporting the college and its students; (5) Leadership of the Special Interest Groups.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Phil Runge provided year end reports, revealing that Operating Budget Net Income is negative \$888.40. Income from dues and interest income is lower than anticipated. The difference will come out of equity. As planned, the negative balance for the 10th Anniversary luncheon will be charged to reserves.

Financial Condition: Finance Committee Chair Dick DiBuono presented "Problem Statement and Considerations for Making Improvements." The 2006 budget was based on 360 members. We have only 328 paid memberships as of June 30, 2006. The budget for FY 2007 is based on 340 members. Spending retained earnings to meet operating expenses is a troubling pattern. The Board discussed multiple remedial actions proposed by the Finance Committee, finally agreeing to two immediate actions: (1) increase dues; (2) increase publicity to bring membership to 350. Annual dues will increase to \$110 effective for all dues paid after September 30, 2006.

Three financial questions require advice from an accountant. Lorin Goodrich has found an accountant experienced in non-profits. The Board will solicit this accountant to address the three issues: (1) the size of our reserves, (2) the Student Award Program, and (3) the status of contract services vs. employment.

Travel: Louise Sousk proposed and received Board approval for three trips in 2007: (1) the Hamptons of Long Island (May 22-25); (2) Bermuda Cruise (July 7 for 7 nights); (3) Williamsburg, Jamestown, Yorktown with Mary O'Day (Sept. 25-28).

Curriculum: Chair Paul Hopler reported on current committee projects addressing many administrative issues: class attendance, wait-listing, development of a data base, audio-visual capabilities available at various classrooms, revisions to the course proposal and evaluation forms, the coordinator checklist,

registration priorities, number of classes per semester, slack times, course categories, planning schedule, faculty handbook, faculty bookmarks, course attendance sheets, faculty feedback, and search for new Committee members.

The Board agreed that members who fail to send required course/trip fees with their registration forms will not be considered registered.

Classroom Space: Clint Hall provided a list of potential space sites for LLI classes, including contacts, capacity, AV equipment available, and cost. Notes on setup provisions will be added to further aid coordinators.

Membership: August is the biggest month for membership renewals. While some will not renew, fall typically brings additional members. Publicity for LLI's fall plans will be placed in the *Golden Gazette*. We also expect members to invite friends and acquaintances to join. In support of incentives to membership, the Trip Committee and Budget and Finance Committee will examine the idea of increasing the cost of trips for non-members.

Organizational Changes: Knox Singleton will remain President Emeritus but will no longer be actively involved with the Board. This is John Bogart's last year chairing the Lunch Bunch. Libby Burge, Volunteer Coordinator, will seek his replacement. Colletta Hammond and Liddell McLeod are seeking backups for Newsletter Mailing and Newsletter Editor, respectively. Norma Hughes will be added to the Outreach Committee list. Doris Balinsky is now Chair of the Student Award/Scholarships Committee. Doug Johnson is Chair of Study/Travel. Burt Greenstein will be added as Chair of the Office Relocation Committee. Board members will insure each has a job description.

Nominating Committee: Lorin Goodrich seeks members to be on the Nominating Committee, which begins its task in the fall. He also asks everyone to be on the lookout for potential Board candidates. The June 2007 election will be extremely important because we will elect a new President.

Campus Construction/LLI Office: Lorin reported that the renovated CN Building will be reoccupied in September; the next renovation is the CS Building. A new building will be built on the large surface lot parking area to house all campus support functions (Provost's Office, Student Council, etc.) in one location. The college plans for LLI to have an office in that new building. Until then, the Provost's Office find a temporary location for us. Don Reynolds volunteered for a task force to work on relocation with Burt Greenstein.

Volunteering: Libby Burge proposed two ways to acknowledge members who volunteer: (1) a Volunteer Poster at the Forums; (2) a monthly column for the newsletter. To aid in recruiting new volunteers Libby will set up a table at each Forum listing available volunteer positions along with job descriptions developed by Committee Chairs

Special Events: Detailed plans and a draft budget were reviewed for the 10th anniversary picnic, as well as information on the holiday party to be held on December 14. Further planning is needed to consider options for volunteer appreciation day next year.

Forums: Average attendance was 144 at 2005-2006 Forum meeting meetings. Plans are well under way for speakers in 2006-2007. Speaker assessments completed at each Forum have provided helpful suggestions as well as indicating enthusiastic response to the speakers. The Forum room will be used for 2007 meetings; the Theatre for 2008.

Special Interest Groups (SIGs): Libby Burge reported on existing Special Interest Groups and noted the characteristics of the ones that succeed: committed leaders, regular meeting times, narrow agreed-upon focus, willingness of members to participate, and advance planning. In response to a proposal by Mary Underwood, the Board agreed to initiate some new Special Interest Groups (SIGs). Volunteers from the Board and membership will organize three SIGs: Little Theatre; Art Galleries and Museums; Walking/Exercise.

Outreach: LLI is re-evaluating our scholarship award process. The Committee will address three issues: (1) MEC awards; (2) Number and amount of scholarships; (3) attracting applicants. Bruce Mann, Dean of Liberal Arts, who has responsibility for all financial aid programs for the college, has been consulted. LLI will reinitiate publicity in the Golden Gazette and encourage the use of the LLI Web Site. A Board member needs to coordinate with Sid Sachs to ensure he has information that is current and correct.


