We are fortunate to launch our 2020-21 Monthly Forum series with a presentation by Northern Virginia Community College President Anne M. Kress. There could not be a better fit as we enter our 25th year of LLI/NOVA's founding *and* partnering with NOVA-Annandale.

Dr. Kress is the sixth president of the college, a role she began in January 2020. She has more than 30 years of experience in higher education, having served previously as a tenured faculty member in English, department chair, associate vice president, provost, and president at community colleges in Florida and New York.

She has served on the board of directors of the American Association of Community Colleges and the Presidents' Trust of the Association of

American Colleges and Universities. She earned two bachelor's degrees, a master's degree, and a doctorate from the University of Florida.

Northern Virginia Community College is the largest public institution of higher education in Virginia, enrolling more than 75,000 students at its six campuses and through the Extended Learning Institute.

In addition, Northern Virginia has a rapidly growing population of citizens 65 and older who are still seeking intellectual stimulation. We are interested in gaining insight on these issues along with the plans to address them. *Senior Citizens are eligible to take Non-Credit (CEU) Courses free of charge (through Workforce Development) regardless of income.*

But during this pandemic, there are many challenges for higher education affecting students, some of them financial. Public health requirements for masks, barriers, cleaning, and other health protections have added costs, as have investments in training and technology to improve remote instruction and online courses. On the other hand, soaring tuition at some universities has led many families to question the price of a diploma. Dr. Kress advises that NOVA is committed to follow all Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and Virginia Department of Health guidelines for COVID-19 safety, as well as the Commonwealth's guidance on both easing and reinstating public health restrictions as the situation changes.

Do not miss this opportunity to learn how our long -term NOVA partner is handling these issues. We may also get an indication of when we can anticipate returning to campus for in-person classes.

Favorite Books Club

In September 2002, LLI/ NOVA member Nan Liner held an organizational meeting to form a book club. It was decided that they would meet on the third Thursday of the month (excluding December, July, and August) from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Books would be chosen from a variety of genres -- novels, biographies, classics, contemporary literature, and others. Members would bring suggestions to the group for consideration and come to a consensus on what to read. There would be a "facilitator" for each book, helping to guide the discussion.

They met for the first time that October to discuss "The Red Tent" by Anita Diamant. And the rest, as they say, is history -- at least Favorite Books Club history!

As they say, "Books let you travel without moving your feet." Since that day in October 2002, the Book Club has "traveled" far and wide -- to Russia, with "A Gentleman in Moscow"; to China, with "The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane"; to post -Civil War Texas, with "The News of the World"; and to the 1936 Olympics with "The Boys in the Boat," an all-time favorite.

Over the years, our focus has expanded to include Young Adult novels, such as "The Book Thief"; Black History Month, "The Warmth of Other Suns"; and Women's History Month, "My Beloved World."

Highlights along the way:

June 2012: Connie Fullerton suggested that the meeting be devoted to members offering ideas for books to read over the summer hiatus, an

idea so popular that "Summer Reads" became a permanent addition.

June 2015: The Book Club began collecting children's books to donate locally, an activity that has become an annual event which now includes all LLI/NOVA members.

April 2017: The Book Club invited local author Urmilla Khanna to talk about her memoir "Boundaries of the Wind," which followed her journey from India, as she broke barriers and crossed boundaries to fulfill her dream of practicing medicine in America.

Eighteen years later, we're still here, thanks in no small part to the other coordinators who led the Book Club in the past. Kudos to Nan Liner, Libby Burge, Arlene Gribben (six years!), and the late Connie Fullerton.

We'll be meeting via Zoom on Sept. 17 at 11:30 a.m. to discuss "The Distance between Us" by Reyna Grande. Come join us!
