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Central European Scholar to Be Featured at Open-House Program

embers of the Lifetime Learning Institute who attend the foreign-speaker program as part of our monthly open-house event on June 1 will be treated to a talk on a country that did not even exist as a state in its own right until just a few years ago. Distinguished scholar, historian, linguist, and writer, **Dr. Miroslav Musil** will relate in broad-brush treatment the history, culture, geography, and scenic hospitality of his homeland, Slovakia, whose people — resident in Central Europe — have experienced the depth of European history close-up, sometimes too close.

Dr. Musil, currently Counselor for Cultural, Educational, Scientific, and Slovak-American Affairs, was born in Slovakia's capital, Bratislava on the Danube River. Fluent or

near-fluent in English, French, Spanish, German, Russian, Czech in addition to his native Slovak, our June 1 speaker did his undergraduate work in England and France, graduate work at the Philosophical Faculty of the

Comenius University in Bratislava, and post-gradual research in Paris, Vienna, Madrid, Geneva, and in his hometown. He has gained international practice and experience in a number of the United Nations missions, commissions, and institutes.

Dr. Musil is an accomplished writer with many publications to his credit — as well as documentary films. One of the latter deals with "the Count and General Moric

Benovski, a Slovak King on Madagascar, who was involved in the American Revoution."

Please set aside Monday, June 1, to listen to Dr. Musil's talk, which he will illustrate with a

short video and hand-out literature. That's 10 a.m. at the Ernst Community Cultural Center in the Forum, on the first Monday in June. Maybe he will tell us about that Slovakia-Madagascar-American Revolution connection. It sounds intriguing!

The April/May issue of "Civilization," the magazine of the Library of Congress, is devoted to voices heard from Forum 2000 held in Prague last autumn. The forum brought together the "most brilliant minds and bravest souls; statesmen, historians, writers, scientists, justifiers of the ways of God with man" that could be assembled from Europe, America, Africa, Asia and Latin America. The forum was organized by Vacalav Havel, whose photo appears on the cover of the magazine. He was recognized by these international voices as "arguably the greatest man artist, anti-Communist, dissident, philosopher, statesman — of the last 50

In the article written by Havel, he poses the question and then answers, "What can change the terrible tendencies of today's civilization? Only this: A change in humankind's attitude toward the world." Northern Virginia Community College Announces New President

Virginia Community College System Chancellor Arnold R. Oliver has appointed **Dr. Belle S.**

Wheelan as NVCC's new president. Dr. Oliver said, "This action is based on the unanimous and enthusiastic recommendation of the NVCC Board, which is convinced that Dr. Wheelan is exactly the right person with the right vision and energy to take the reins of Virginia's largest community college and lead the College into the 21st century. He continued, "This is the first new president for the college in 30 years, filling a vacancy created by Dr. Richard J. Ernst after three decades of exceptional leadership."

Since 1992, Dr. Wheelan has been president of Central Virginia Community College in Lynchburg. Her previous positions have been, provost of the Portsmouth Campus of Tidewater Community College, and she joined VCCS in 1987 as dean of student development services for Thomas Nelson Community College in Hampton, Va. Prior to that, she was director of academic support services for San Antonio College in the Alamo Community College District in Texas, where she also held other administrative positions following 10 years as associate professor of psychology.

Dr. Wheelan received a doctorate in educational administration with a concentration in community college leadership from the University of Texas at Austin, a master's degree in educational psychology from Louisiana State University, and a bachelor's degree from Trinity University in 1972. Dr. Wheelan has served on the board of directors for the American Association of Community colleges and is currently a member of that association's National Council of Black American Affairs. She has received numerous awards in her distinguished career.

Newseum/Lunch/Pentagon Tour. Wednesday, July 15, 9:30 a.m.—4:00 p.m. A guided tour of the Newseum, the only inter-active museum on news, located in Arlington. The tour will take us behind the scenes to see and experience how and why news is made. There will be free time to explore the Newseum and nearby Freedom Park on your own.

Lunch will be at the Orleans House in Rosslyn. After lunch, we will enjoy a guided 1¾-hour tour of the Pentagon. The tour will include a film presentation on one of the world's largest office building. A photo identification for each person is required for admittance to the Pentagon. **Cost:** \$20.00 (lunch not included in cost).

Fredericksburg Trolley Tour / Lunch / Belmont

Tour. Tuesday, August 11, 9:00 a.m.—5:00 p.m. A guided trolley tour of the 40-block National Historic District where more than 350 original 18th and 19th century buildings and 35 monuments, markers and attractions will be highlighted. Lunch will be at the Kenmore Inn. After lunch, we will proceed across the Rappahannock River, to Belmont, the Gari Melchers Estate and memorial Gallery. Melchers, who spent his early adult life painting in Europe, purchased Belmont with his wife, Corinne in 1916, spent the last 16 years of his life at the 18th century estate. He continued to paint in his studio at Belmont and is recognized for his society portraits and impressionist-inspired landscapes. We will enjoy a guided tour through the house and studio. **Cost:** \$45.00 (includes lunch).
