epublic of Macedonia Ambassador Ljubica Z. Acevska is the first Ambassador to represent her country to the United States. Macedonia, a former Yugoslav Republic, is located in the Balkans and has common borders on the east with Bulgaria, on the south with Greece, west with Albania and north with Serbia. Skopje is its capital.

This is a unique opportunity for LLI members and guests to learn more about this fairly new Republic. Macedonia gained its independence in September 1991 from Yugoslavia. Macedonia, which is landlocked, is slightly larger than the state of Vermont with a 2 million population. Several transnational issues are being addressed, such as bilateral agreements with Bulgaria on

nonrecognition of Macedonian



as a language distinct from Bulgarian, and resolving differences in delineating mutual borders between Macedonia, Serbia and Montenegro. Ambassador Acevska will present an overview of her Republic.



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
Lunch Bunch

Senior Safety

Continuing our series on Senior Safety tips from Louise Sousk, we focus on Car and Travel Safety.

- > plan your route and let other know it
- choose the safest and best lit route, do not choose it based on convenience or time
- ➤ fuel in a familiar, well-lit area
- keep your doors locked
- have your door key ready as you walk to your car
- ➤ have your house key ready as you leave your car
- > park in only well lit areas
- stop so you can see the pavement under the tires of the car in front of you
- keep a "help needed, call the police" sign that can be displayed from inside the car
- > check your car before each and every trip
- ➤ if stranded, do not open the door for anyone
- ➤ if someone comes, then open the window 1 inch and ask him or her to contact the police
- > keep a charged cell phone with you
- when traveling, know your destination and try to arrive before dark
- when traveling, let someone else know your destination, approximate time of arrival and contact that person when you arrive
- before you park your car, notice your surroundings

- ➤ Make up your mind to be happy learn to find pleasure in simple things.
