Perhaps, your being willing, we'll have a French déjeuner. Tuesday mornings — June 22; July 6, 20; August 3. Class leader: George Staten.

**Conversational Spanish.** Discussion of topics of interest in Spanish. Class presupposes basic versatility in the language. Tuesday mornings — July 6, 13, 27; August 3, 10. *Class leaders:* Y. K. Shirley Bounds and Nina Lawrence.

From the French Revolution to the 20th Century: Ideologies and Their Demise. Course includes discussion of revolution and revolt; Marxism to Maoism; Naziism and Fascism; and a new century of thought? Wednesday afternoons — July 7, 14, 21, 28; August 4, 11. Class leader: Yereth Knowles.
