

LLI Board of Directors Hold First 2000 Meeting

On January 14 the LLI Board of Directors held its monthly meeting. It opened with the report from our Treasurer, John Manion, who told the 12 members in attendance that there is a \$12,023 balance in the checking account and a \$12, 441 balance in our investment account as of December 31, 1999.

The Board approved the establishment of an account with the T. Rowe Price Funds in order to earn a more

reasonable rate of return on reserve balances and promote flexibility and prudent management of LLI's financial resources. It was also reported that the legislative proposal to grant an LLI exemption from Virginia sales taxes has been filed with the legislature and referred to the Committee on Finance.

With a view to the Institute's June elections, the Board unanimously approved the appointment of members to the Nominating Committee. They are Jean Packard as chair, Martie Klee, Jack Barringer, Richard Risk, and Mary Davis.

Martie Klee announced that Elaine Waggener will manage the Spring Kickoff meeting scheduled for February 7. The format of the program will be similar to that of last year. LLI President Alan Mayer will act as master of ceremonies.

George Staten will introduce the instructors and say a word about the courses. Ted Krivoruchka will prepare programs and other materials for the membership and invitees. Laura Charron reported that about 2800 invitations have been sent to potential members.

Contributions to the LLI Scholarship Fund have not yet reached the goal of \$1000. More emphasis will be placed

on soliciting individual contributions.

The Board unanimously approved a memorial resolution to honor our beloved and recently departed member and instructor, Dr. Rudolph Hegmon. The Board's sincere condolences go to his widow — likewise a member and class leader — Dr. Doris Balinsky.

George Staten, who has been handling the editorial duties for our newsletter, *New & Views*, and is stepping down with the publication of this February issue, said he will work with his successor for a reasonable time.

Alan Mayer noted that 14 people have signed up for the Study/Travel group planning a trip to France. He asked that the need for additional participation be publicized. **If you'd like to go with the LLI group to France, consult the Spring Program 2000.**

Under new business, Martie Klee reported that there will be a regional conference of the Elderhostel Institute Network at Rutgers University in June 2000. John Manion announced that he will be working more closely with Gordon Hamlet to be sure that the Assistant Treasurer will be able to step in whenever the Treasurer is absent. They will work together on further development of the LLI financial system.

February 7 Is the Day Not to Forget

On the first Monday of February, our Institute will hold its Kickoff program for the Spring Semester in the Forum of the Cultural Center at the NVCC Annandale Campus. The program begins at 10:00 a.m. and concludes at 11:30 a.m. There is free parking at the gated lot across from the Cultural Center. Parking guides will be on hand.

The February 7 program will include a review of the courses and activities to take place during the period from February through June and an introduction of the instructors. There will be exhibits of LLI activities and announcements of local trips and overseas travel. Also on hand will be promotional literature and registration forms.

We expect a hundred or more guests — potential members to whom invitations have been sent. It is important, too, that members and instructors be present, for the semester Kickoffs are the truly big LLI events of the year. It's a time when we show ourselves off to the outside world unaware as yet of what a rewarding Institute we have. Please come on time. See you all at the Kickoff.


LLI extends its deep sympathy and condolences to Rudy's wife, Doris Balinsky, similarly an active member of our Institute as student, class leader, and committee participant.

As a general practice LLI does not refund membership dues. If there are extenuating circumstances prompting a request for a refund, LLI will consider the merits of the case, provided that the request was made in writing within 30 days of the member joining our Institute.

Change in Membership Period

The period of membership now runs for a 12-month period that begins in the month when you paid your annual dues. This means that qualified area residents can join LLI at any time during the year. If a membership expires while a member is attending a course for which he or she had previously registered, the member may complete the course. We hope, of course, that he or she will renew the membership.


With that in mind, may we at LLI suggest a few clubs that might interest our membership?

J. Knox Singleton Receives Award

On November 15, 1999, the Fairfax Area Commission on the Aging (COA) presented the Louis B. Wagner Lifetime Achievement Award to Knox Singleton — LLI's founder, first president, and still active member.

Among Knox's many accomplishments were the work he did during his 10 years of service with COA, including two years as chairman; the establishment and direction of the peer-helper program at the Springfield Information and Counseling Center for Older Adults; development of the "Vital Aging" concept; and, of course, the initiation of our own LLI, sponsored by the Northern Virginia Community College, serving as its president for three terms.

The award is given annually in memory of Louis B. Wagner, Braddock District representative to COA for eight years, who worked tirelessly as advocate for older adults. Mrs. Wagner and COA chairperson Fran McWhorter presented the award to Knox, as his wife Marjorie stood by.



Several new committees have been formed, **Martie Klee** reported at the December 10 Board meeting. They are Publications, Special Events, Mailing, and Tours.

Lorin Goodrich and **John Barringer** have developed procedures for notification of registrants when a course or class must be cancelled. The policy on class cancellation owing to inclement weather is published in the Spring Program 2000. It is the same policy as in the past.

Louise Sousk announced at the December Board Meeting that 60 people had attended the Holiday Luncheon on December 3, among them 13 instructors. The total cost was \$600, of which \$366 was received from members and their guests.

The New York City trip planned for the end of the year will be held on the first week of December 2000. That is the plan as of now.
