# April 4 Forum: An Update on U.S. Space Initiatives

The Federal government spends more than \$35 billion a year on military and civilian space activities. Marcia Smith, a Specialist in Aerospace and Telecommunications Policy with the Congressional Research service, will provide an update on government-funded space programs, focusing on President Bush's plan to send astronauts back to the moon and on to Mars, and on the fate of the Hubble Space Telescope. Commercial space activities, including the nascent "space tourism" market will also be discussed — are *YOU* ready to go?

The Forum room is located on the second floor of the Ernest Cultural Center, NVCC Annandale. Coffee and refreshments will be served at 9:30 a.m. and the meeting will begin promptly at 10:00 a.m.

Columbia are honored. The permit must be properly displayed and used only by the person or persons to whom it is issued.


#### **Lunch Bunch**




#### Mailing Address of LLI
