Ambassador John Dinger Gives Foreign Policy Briefing at LLI Forum

How does our State Department cope with the swirl of diplomatic, political, and economic crises around the world? How are foreign policies made and refined to bolster friendships and relationships? How are these plans and policies put into action? Ambassador John Dinger will discuss many current issues and events as he explains the making of U.S. Foreign Policy and answers your questions.

A career member of the Senior Foreign Service, Mr. Dinger is presently Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary in the State Department's Bureau for Intelligence and Research since December 2006. Other recent assignments include Deputy Coordinator for Counterterrorism from 2003 to 2005. He was Ambassador to Mongolia during 2000 to 2003, and has served in Johannesburg, Sapporo, Tokyo, Fukuoka, Rio de Janeiro, and London. Also among his numerous assignments, Mr. Dinger has been the Director of the State Department's Office of Press Relations. Ambassador Dinger will be prepared to respond to questions.

Directions:

From the Beltway: Driving the Beltway outer loop to Alexandria – take Exit 177A-B, Alexandria/Fort Belvoir (the exit immediately after Telegraph Road). Stay to your left on the exit ramp toward Old Town/Alexandria. At the traffic signal, go right onto Franklin Street. Follow Franklin Street to the next traffic signal at South Washington Street. Go right (south) onto South Washington Street, which becomes the George Washington Parkway, and follow the Parkway south for 5 miles; exit to the right at the sign marked "FORT HUNT ROAD/FORT HUNT PARK."

From Ft. Belvoir: Go North on Route 1 (Richmond Highway) and turn right onto Mt. Vernon Memorial Highway (across from the entrance to Woodlawn Plantation). When you get to Mt. Vernon, go around the circle onto the George Washington Parkway North. Approximately 3 miles from the circle follow the right exit to Ft. Hunt. At the second stop sign turn left toward the Park.

Parking: Look for Area A (Pavilion) parking lot (the first one you will see). There's parking for 150 cars and easy ground level pedestrian access from the parking lot to the Pavilion. There is handicapped parking up close to the Pavilion.

General Information: Because we have the use of the large roof-covered Pavilion, the picnic will be held rain or shine, barring a hurricane. If the weather forecast is for hot and humid conditions, consider bringing insect repellent, but we have found in past years that there is generally a good breeze which helps keep the temperature down, especially in the pavilion. Also, we will be eating at park picnic tables with bench seats; for your comfort, you may wish to bring your own folding chairs.

Something Spooky About Our LLI Picnic Grounds

esearching a Washington Post article, Oct. 6, 2007 by Petula Dvorak, we learned that regular interrogation of captured Nazi military, mostly submariners and scientists, was the business of this Nazi POW and scientist detention center known secretly as "P.O. Box 1142". This made sense since there were Nazi submarines captured along our Atlantic Coast, and many German scientists were whisked away from the possibility of being added to the Russian team.

More than 4,000 Nazis without good intentions for the USA were held and questioned at Ft. Hunt.

However, it is difficult not to suspect that Bonnie's 2007 "Spytacular" picnic theme was nothing more than a coincidence. More than 4,000 Nazis without good intentions for the USA were held and questioned at Ft. Hunt. Not unlike much of today's enemy prisoner handling, things weren't entirely Geneva Convention regulated, but the team of questioners claimed there was no torture, and much actionable intelligence was obtained via a game of ping pong and well intentioned "bull sessions."

The cadre of interrogators who kept these secrets for the last half of the 20th Century, to be disclosed only in 2007, were all naturally in their 80s and 90s when honored publicly last October. About two dozen of them returned to Ft. Hunt. Included was MIT physicist Henry Kolm, 90; Arno Mayer, 81, Princeton professor of European History and nuclear policy lawyer, Peter Weis, 82. The US interrogators naturally were chosen for their command of the German language and family roots; they all agreed their interrogation methods were humane.

While you're at the picnic, remember to visit the flag and historical plaque that reminds us all of the strategic background of World War II activity at Ft. Hunt. LLI Alaska Trip

wenty-two members of the Travel/Study Group recently returned from a wonderful visit to Alaska. Everything you hear about it, size, scenic splendors, cleanliness, *etc.*, is true.

We began our adventure by boarding the Holland America ship Zaandam in Vancouver on Sunday, June 8. We sailed the Inland Passage between British Columbia and Vancouver Island. Our first port was Ketchikan in the heart of the temperate rain forest where we took a guided walk through the woods. Saw lots of wildlife. Next was Juneau, the glacier-locked capital of Alaska, the Mendenhall Glacier and the Crystal Gardens. Then on to Skagway the jumping off point for the gold rush, where we boarded the White Pass Yukon railroad. You can't believe how they shoehorned the tracks along the narrow vertical canyons. The next two days we cruised Glacier Bay and College Fiord, generally surrounded by glaciers. We were told that many of the glaciers are retreating but some are still advancing. Altogether the cruise was very satisfying. The food was good and abundant, our cabin spacious and service from the staff excellent.

On Sunday we docked at Seward and took a small boat trip through Kenai Fiord. We saw orca, sea otters, sea loins and hundreds of birds. The cutest were the Puffins who gorged on so many fish that some of them couldn't even take off. Monday morning we toured Seward and their excellent nature museum. That evening we were in Anchorage. Tuesday we boarded the train the McKinley explorer for our trip to Denali Park. Holland America provided rail cars with domed seating for everyone upstairs with the dinning room underneath. We spent two days in Denali. On the first day we toured the visitor center. The next day we took a six-hour tour of the park. We boarded modified school buses and our guide drove us about 60 miles into the park. We traveled only half way to Mt. McKinley. It was a cloudy day, so like many

other visitors, we never saw the mountain but we did see wildlife. That afternoon we took the train to Fairbanks. On Friday we toured an old gold dredge place and panned for gold. That afternoon we took a three-hour river

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ruise on the Chena. We stopped at a dog sled training place and a native village. We had various native guides tell us about their culture. All told I think we traveled four miles on the river. It was very enjoyable. Saturday was June 21, the longest day of the year. In Fairbanks the sun actual set for about two hours. They have a huge street fair with crafts, music and food.

That ended the basic trip but the Huleys and Johnsons stayed on for four extra days. We took a nine-passenger van that followed the pipeline up to Prudhoe Bay. The road was mostly paved as it was the original construction road for the pipeline. We drove through spectacular scenery, especially the Brooks Range. The accommodations were the old construction trailers. Rustic but clean. We saw Dahl sheep, a musk ox, caribou, *etc.* Deadhorse, in Prudhoe Bay, is the operating town for the pipeline. Most of the wells are many miles from it and it serves as the supply center and start of the pipeline. All the drilling is down in winter, 40-60 below!! Now they were bringing in supplies and repairing the equipment.

We had a wonderful time in Alaska. It is a land of free spirits although they are very patriotic. The space is immense, the air is crispy clean, the people are exceptionally friendly and the scenery is spectacular. I could deal with all the daylight but I don't think I could handle the long dark winter.
