Guest Speaker for April Program

LLI members will welcome back Dr. Isshan Wali on Monday, April 6, at our monthly open-house program when she speaks on Islam and the Role of Women at the Forum in the Ernst Community Cultural Center at NVCC (Annandale Campus).

Our guest is the Cultural Attaché of the Embassy of the Arabic Republic of Egypt to the United States. Dr. Wali is a widely recognized educator and scholar. She has served as a Lecturer of English on the faculty of Mass Communications at Cairo University and the Sadam Academy. For the last 16 years, prior to her taking up her Washington

assignment, she was Director of Education in the Egyptian National Commission for UNESCO.

Last year, as many LLI members may remember, she spoke at one of our open house programs on Ancient Egyptian Civilization. At her 10:15 a.m. talk on April 6 she will discuss a subject about which many Americans have lots of questions and probably no small amount of misinformation. Islam and the Role of Women is a topic on which she has spoken on several occasions in recent months, receiving enthusiastic compliments.

April Luncheon Selection


(Our 10th Luncheon Together)

Members of the LLI luncheon group will sample Korean foods, beginning at 12:15 p.m. on April 6, following the open-house program. Marjorie Clark and George Staten, who serve as the group's hosts, have found a pleasant place not too far from the college — about 4 miles. Called the Han Sung Oak, it is located on Columbia Pike at the Lake Barcroft Shopping Center between Annandale and Bailey's Crossroads.

The luncheons, most of them reasonably priced from \$5.95 to \$6.95, include soup, the entrée, a wide variety of side dishes including *Kimchi*, and a soothing pleasant liquid dessert. Better know dishes include *Bul Gogi* (grilled marinated beef), *Doeji Bul Gogi* (grilled marinated pork), and *Bibim Bab* (grilled marinated strips of beef and vegetables, topped with fried egg and spicy bean paste on the side). These are but three of some 21 luncheon specials.

The conference was hosted by the Christopher Wren Association / The College of William and Mary. Representing LLI was our President, Knox Singleton and LLI Board Members Phil Reeves, Louise Sousk, Ed McGuire and Martie Klee.

During the two-day conference, leaders and enthusiastic members from many diverse institutes discussed goals and obstacles and shared successful ideas and practical information. Sessions were planned to be informative and draw out different viewpoints, stimulate creative thinking and promote exchange of ideas.
