Empower, Enforce, Educate:

Learn More About the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau and How It Helps America's Consumers.

Our Feb. 3 Forum speakers are Tonya Beres and Erin Scheithe from the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau. Tonya and Erin will discuss the structure and origins of the CFPB and how it helps America's consumers. They will walk us through their consumer complaint process, including the effects of the pandemic on complaints. They will share an overview of consumer education tools and resources that will help us and our loved ones navigate complex financial decision-making, products and services, as well as share information particularly relevant to older adults.



Tonya Chalou Beres joined CFPB in 2016 and serves as the Program Manager for the bureau's contact center. CFPB enables the public to obtain information on challenges they face in the marketplace, learn more about financial products and services, or file a complaint.

Prior to joining CFPB, Tonya was the Program Manager for the USAGov Contact Center, the official guide to government information and services. She earned her Social Work degree from James Madison University. Tonya is the daughter of LLI/NOVA members June and George Chalou.



Erin Scheithe joined the CFPB in 2017 and serves as the Content and Outreach Specialist for the Office for Older Americans.

Most of Erin's experience is in the field of financial education. She worked for both the American Bankers Association and North Carolina Bankers Association to develop programs to teach children and parents the basics of financial literacy and banking. She also worked for AARP, creating retirement security related content for the 50-plus population.

Erin earned both a bachelor's degree in English Language and Literature and a master's degree in the Social Foundations of Education from the University of Virginia.

Leveraging Our Resources

Our 2021 classes, forums, and even spring registration show just a slight downturn. More than half of our LLI/NOVA members are participating in our spring courses via Zoom.

Equally, or more importantly, Dick Robison and his Curriculum Committee often garner accolades from other regional LLIs about the quality of our



programs during the Covid pandemic. This is no small feat: Many members and NOVA faculty contribute countless hours preparing for and presenting our high -quality offerings.

This speaks volumes about membership engagement, whether as presenters and/or attendees. We appreciate all. This includes those participating in our offerings as well as those members who support our mission by occasionally participating until travel, SIGs, and day trips reemerge post-Covid.

We continue to press forward with our monthly Forums. In January, we had about 100 participants online for the "Patient Centricity in Pharma during the Time of Covid-19" discussion. Over the next several months, we have presenters committed to talk about consumer finance, aging nearby in other jurisdictions, future of energy transportation and the power grid, and more. The

Sunday Evening Fireside Chats are another stellar activity.

These opportunities largely emanate from our members. This happens when we speak up and come forth. New members and new ideas are just as relevant as those who recall the old days. For example, Loren Brandman and the 2021 Nomination Committee are completing a slate of new Board members/officers, most of whom have been members less than five years. This is a healthy mix. Conversely, we have many long-term members who operate the website, conduct special events, and provide wise coaching from the rear. It all works: Let us keep it going.

THE ANNUAL INFORMATION FAIR



LLI/NOVA sponsors an annual, when able, Information Fair showcasing our Special Interest Groups (SIGs) and Standing Committees. The fair is held in the adjacent seminar rooms, starting at 9 a.m. before one of the monthly Forums. SIGs and committees have evolved throughout our 25 years.

As you know, LLI/NOVA operates on a completely volunteer basis, so we rely on our members to be proactive and help out. We also rely on volunteers for new ideas or new ways of doing things. Volunteering does not take up much time, but it is the cog in the wheel that enables LLI/NOVA to operate smoothly.

In addition, by joining a Committee or SIG, you ensure that your particular interests are met and heard. SIGs typically meet once or twice a month and are comprised of people with similar interest in a specific activity. Currently we have nine SIGs: Bridge, Favorite Books Club, Financial, French Conversation, Foodies & Friends, Photography, Mystery Books, Tabletop Games, and Visual & Performing Arts. Members who are eager to start a new SIG can use the Information Fair to gauge and solicit interest from fellow members.

There are also many Standing Committees represented at the fair, all of which rely on volunteers. They include Administrative Review, Automation, Financial Review, Budget & Finance, Curriculum, Student Scholarship, Study Travel, and Trips.

The Study/Travel Committee provides members (and their friends and families) with the opportunity not only to participate in group travel worldwide, but also to learn about the area they are going to visit prior to the travel. Study sessions are included in the LLI/NOVA course offerings in the semester just prior to the travel.

The mission of the Trip Committee is to promote and provide access to the educational, cultural, and leisure offerings in this area and in nearby states to members (and their friends and families).

The Visual and Performing Arts SIG works closely with the Trips Committee to enable members to experience arts in a way that would not be possible within the confines of a classroom. Typical activities/events include a mix of meetings with films, speakers, and member research, as well as day/multi-day field trips that take advantage of the many museums, theaters, universities, galleries and artist studios in our area.

The Automation Committee was chartered by the President and Board of Directors to address the Interactive Website Upgrade Project. They are always looking for members knowledgeable and interested in info technology. The project consisted of replacing our former website with a new interactive website designed to meet LLI/NOVA's future needs and provide our members with a quality user experience. The committee continues to look at improvements and maintenance of the website.

The Budget and Finance (B&F) Committee was established in the LLI/NOVA Bylaws and is composed of a Chairperson, appointed by the President from among the members of the Board of Directors, the Treasurer, and at least two members appointed by the Chairperson. The B&F Committee prepares the annual budget for approval by the Board of Directors. The committee also reviews financial performance against the budget and reports its findings and recommendations to the Board of Directors, and attends to other fiscal matters as required.

The Financial Review Committee, an Ad Hoc Committee whose Chairperson is appointed annually by the LLI/NOVA President, performs the annual review (audit) of the LLI/NOVA financial condition as of the close of the previous fiscal

year (June 30), as required by Article VIII, section As with other aspects of 1, of the LLI/NOVA By-laws. The Chairperson customarily appoints two other members to serve on the committee.

The Nominating Committee is responsible for developing a slate of nominees for LLI/NOVA Board and Officer positions. The LLI/NOVA President appoints the Chairperson, who forms the Nominating Committee; the Committee consists of two additional Board members and two non-Board members.

The Curriculum Committee's task is to produce the course catalog. It secures a variety of presenters featuring a wide field of subjects, including history, technology, science, religion, philosophy, music, art, poetry, finance, and others that will be of interest to our members. Between 12 and 15 members produce course catalogs for three separate semesters: Winter/Spring, Summer, and Fall.

The Scholarship Committee awards financial assistance to outstanding students at the NOVA Annandale campus. The two types of scholarships, Leadership and Academic, are intended to be used by the recipients to pay for tuition and books as they continue their studies.

The history of these committees and SIGs is being described during 2020 and 2021 in special newsletter articles. The important thing to remember is that LLINOVA is a volunteer organization and relies on our members to make it run. Please consider joining us!
