Senior Health and Welfare in Arlington

According to data analyzed in 2018 for its AARP Livability Index, both Arlington and Alexandria were highlighted for their attention to the health and welfare of seniors.

In addition, Niche, a website offering information on schools, workplaces and neighborhoods, selected Arlington as one of the best places to live and work in the United States in 2016.

Arlington excels with options to stay active whether at one of its many parks or trails or in senior fitness programs. However, housing is expensive, and opportunity and access to affordable housing can be a challenge for older adults.

At our March 3 Forum, a trio from Arlington County's Office of 55+ programs, the Aging and Disability Services Division, and the Housing Division -- Jennifer Collins, Michelle Thomas, and Eric Timar -- will be our featured presenters.

They will explain how Arlington balances the needs of seniors with the challenges of running a small, active and increasingly youthful county, as well as leveraging the experiences of seniors to support the county.

They also will discuss how the county is balancing the need for affordable housing options for seniors, as well as for seniors who wish to age in place. This includes efforts to maintain the safety, health and vitality of Arlington's senior community.



Jennifer Collins has been serving the 55+ community for more than 25 years. She has been the program manager for Arlington County's Department of Parks & Recrea-

tion, Office of 55+ Programs since 2015 and has worked for Arlington County's senior programs for the past 16 years. Jennifer holds a degree in therapeutic recreation from the University of Florida and is a Certified Parks and Recreation Professional through the National Recreation and Parks Association.



Michelle and her team coordinate with federal and state agencies such as the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, the Department of Medical Assistance Services, the Bureau of Insurance, the

Michelle deems it an honor to work closely with key stakeholders like the Commission on Aging and the Northern Virginia Regional Commission to advocate for older Virginians. She holds a Bachelor of Social Work from Bowie State University, a Master of Public Administration from Old Dominion University, and is a member of the Virginia Local Government Management Association.



Eric Timar is a compliance officer with Arlington County, working in the Housing Division of the Department of Community Planning, Housing, and Development. The Housing Division monitors most of the

8,000-plus Committed Affordable rental units in the county. He joined the Housing Division in 2007; prior to that, he worked for four years in Arlington's Department of Human Services, with the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher office. Eric has a B.A. from the University of Dayton and an M.S. from American University.

Previous work experience includes property management of public housing and a three-year term with Habitat for Humanity in Nicaragua. Eric also has served on the Housing Commission of the City of Falls Church, and volunteers with the EnEcoAction Arlington.

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COMMUNITY OUTREACH

In the February newsletter, we discussed the big-picture food need and asked you to consider helping Feed America, which supports vari-

This month, we highlight a grassroots local group, Koinonia, serving residents in the Franconia and Kingstowne areas.

Koinonia, a 501(c)3, was founded in 1966 by local faith communities to assist in their area. The agency offers emergency financial assistance, food and clothing to qualified residents.

The number of people requesting help has skyrocketed at least 50 percent since last March, when the pandemic began. Some who previously were donors now need assistance themselves. The need will continue beyond the pandemic, as they strive to get back on their feet.

President's Message



Current Discussions

This year, 2021, is LLI/NOVA's silver anniversary. We had planned a year-long celebration,

culminating in a luncheon in May at Springfield

Country Club.

But then came Covid-19.

The vaccines are arriving for some of us; however, herd immunity is not likely soon. These vaccines apparently are good at preventing disease but not necessarily so effective against transmission of the virus, which is key to herd immunity (i.e., 60-90 percent of our population). Further, a recent poll found that 15 percent of the population say they are not going to take the vaccine, thereby challenging the likelihood of herd immunity.

Nevertheless, LLI/NOVA is proceeding with a growth mindset. Our Board, committee and SIG chairs are planning for the remainder of 2021, and early 2022, during a plethora of unknowns. These unknowns range from how to present our meticulously planned silver anniversary celebration for May to practical concerns such as masks, wipes, sanitizer, and social distancing for possible in-person fall classes.

Even determining the appropriate balance between Zoom delivery and in-person classes is delicate. For example, last year our celebration was launched with special monthly newsletter articles, proclamations, a special logo, and a \$25,000 scholarship donation. But a year later, Covid-19 remains a deadly threat.

Bonnie Hopler and her anniversary committee are planning to ensure that we still have a safe silver celebration in May. That committee will make an announcement shortly, taking into consideration compliance with CDC, Commonwealth, and NOVA guidelines.

Similarly, Dick Robison and his Curriculum Committee, now completing the summer catalog, will begin working on our fall class offerings. Securing classroom space and instructors is exceptionally difficult in general, and especially so in the world of Covid-19. For example, NOVA-Annandale has yet to announce its autumn inperson operating status, and we are uncertain how other meeting places such as churches and libraries will treat "guests" such as LLI/NOVA.

At the same time, we need to canvass members and presenters regarding one's comfort level for attending in-person classes, events and Forums. Certain classes have a better fit for in-person delivery and many instructors and participants thrive on the energy that emanates from in-person sessions.

Two other pillars of LLI -- social and travel -- also need to be reassessed, along with some of the Special Interest Groups.

And we plan to pursue further links with the American Foreign Service Association, Executive Women in Government, and other statewide LLIs to enrich our offerings and activities.

As IBM's Thomas J. Watson said in 1911, "By THINK, I mean take everything into consideration." Thus, THINK became IBM's slogan. LLI/ NOVA is also thinking – and trying to take everything into consideration to build an interesting yet safe slate of offerings for our members.

Snippets from the Feb. 14 Colombia Fireside Chat

This chat was an extraordinary opportunity for cultural enrichment.

The Colombia session with our members was cohosted with NOVA's CCI Director, Megan Juneau, Program Coordinator, CCI Program, Office of International Education and Sponsored Programs, and was comprised of five students from distinct regions and subcultures within Colombia.

There was a lively Q&A session along with a professional quality PowerPoint the students produced. It included mini videos featuring beautiful parks, mountains, regional dances, and cuisine. Some of the points the students raised:

- Each of the featured regions has its own culture, cuisine and, often its own dialect.
- The dominant subgroups (i.e., Mestizo and White, 87.6%; Afro-Colombian including mulatto, Raizal, and Palenquero, 6.8; Amerindian, 4.3%; unspecified, 1.4%, as estimated in 2018) are unique with their traditional dances, festivals, and cuisine. It was a pleasure listening to each student proud-

- ly articulating his or her sector's unique qualities.
- Sixty percent of the population lives in the highland Andean interior region of the Andes around Bogota, Medellin, and Cali, where agricultural opportunities and natural resources are found. The vast, beautiful grasslands of the llanos/Amazon to the south and east, which make up approximately 60% of the country, are sparsely populated.
- Internet access in some very rural areas has stronger connectivity than what some are experiencing in their Annandale, Va., residence.
- Consensus was that their governmentprovided health care was as good or better than many private plans.
- Many learned and enhanced their Englishlanguage skills by listening to U.S. music and watching American movies.
- It was postulated that social and racial biases, including government subjectivities, are akin to those being addressed in many countries.
- Colombia is Latin America's fourth-largest oil producer and the world's fourth-largest coal producer, third-largest coffee exporter, and second-largest exporter of cut flowers.

Our selection for Women's History Month is "A Woman of No Importance," a biography by Sonia Purnell. In it, she uncovers the secret life of Virginia Hall, a Baltimore socialite who talked her way into the Special Operations Executive, the spy organization dubbed Churchill's "Ministry of Ungentlemanly Warfare." She became the first Allied woman deployed behind enemy lines -- despite her prosthetic leg --- and helped to light the flame of French resistance, revolutionizing secret warfare as we know it.

Photography



In October 2010, a new SIG for photographers was proposed by Peter Schwarzkopf. The first meeting took place in March 2011, was led by Buck Myers, and continues under his leadership today.

The group consists of 12 to 16 members with various skill levels and interests. It meets on the third Friday of each month at the Braddock District Government Center.

The original plan was to host monthly discussions topics, such as improving our picture-taking skills, gaining a better understanding of how to more effectively use our cameras, and how to download and edit digital pictures on a computer.

While this is still a large part of our meeting format, it has become so much more. Buck

introduced the group to training tutorials that helped improve our techniques in the use of lighting, composition, portrait, landscape, action photography, and other skills.

Each meeting has a theme. Members are provided with on-line sources of inspiration and instruction, and then assigned a photo theme to challenge and exercise new skills. There is so much to explore and learn in photography. As we improve, we immediately see satisfying progress in the quality of our photos and those of our group.
