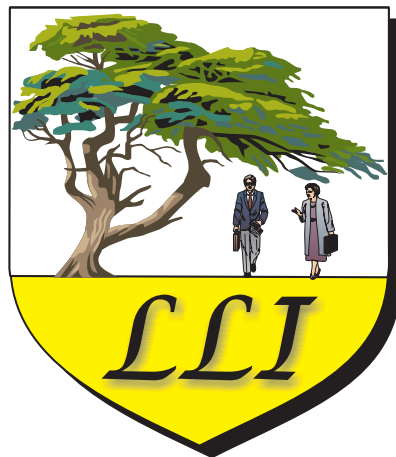

# General Information

## What Is LLI?

Sponsored by Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA), Lifetime Learning Institute of Northern Virginia (LLI/NOVA) is a non-profit, member-run organization dedicated to providing continuing educational opportunities to older adults of all backgrounds and income levels. LLI/NOVA is a member of the Elderhostel Institute Network (EIN) and benefits from the services EIN provides in program development.

LLI membership is especially attractive to individuals 50 years old or older (retired or semi-retired), who are interested in pursuing intellectual enrichment and enjoying social interaction with their peers.

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## How Are the Courses Organized?

Courses generally consist of one to ten 90-minute sessions, are informal, and frequently include group discussion. They are taught by outside faculty and by your fellow LLI members. Most courses are free to members, but some include assigned reading and purchase of a textbook, or require a small materials fee.

## When Are the Classes and Where?

Classes are offered throughout the year, subdivided into Winter/Spring, Summer, and Fall semesters. They are typically held on weekdays between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. The courses are held on the NOVA Annandale campus and off-campus in churches, community centers and other suitable locations.

## Benefits of Membership

## How Do I Become a Member and What Is the Cost?

Complete the membership application form found on pages 25 and 27, and mail with your check to the address shown. The current annual membership fee is \$110. The membership period is for 12 months beginning with the month in which dues are paid.

## How Do I Register for Classes and Tours?

Complete a class registration form found on pages 21 and 23, listing the courses you wish to attend *in order of preference*. Mail to the LLI office with a self-addressed stamped envelope and any applicable fees as soon as possible; *registration for classes closes June 1, 2010*. Registration forms received after that date will be considered only if there are spaces remaining in the courses you select. Your registration form will be mailed back to you in your self-addressed envelope shortly after the closing date, but in advance of the first class, indicating whether you have been accepted, wait-listed, or whether the class has been canceled. As a courtesy to other LLI members, please call the Leader/Coordinator listed in the specific course description if you will not be able to attend part or all of a course after you have been accepted. This will give members on a waiting list an opportunity to attend.

Registration for trips should be submitted on the separate forms provided. Please remember to sign the "Assumption of Risk and Acknowledgment of Responsibility" statement.

LLI courses are open only to those LLI members who have **registered and been accepted** into the course unless otherwise specified. **Please note** that if you are wait-listed for a course, you are not "accepted" unless notified. The next time the course is offered, you must re-register but will be given priority acceptance.

## Monthly Forums

Members and non-members are warmly welcomed as guests to attend the Speakers Program and Open House Forum. The Forum is held monthly (except December and during the summer) at 10:00 a.m. in the Richard J. Ernst Community Cultural Center (see map on page 5) on the NOVA Annandale Campus (see page 7 for schedule).

Center Drive next to the Ernst Center. There is a \$1.00 per hour charge to park in the garage.

## Class Cancellations

If the Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) cancel school for the day due to inclement weather or other emergency, all LLI classes, Forums, and other activities, (**except for Trips/Travel — see below**), are cancelled regardless of class location. LLI morning classes are cancelled if the FCPS announces a two-hour delay in class openings; LLI afternoon classes are cancelled if the FCPS announces early dismissal.

## Directions to Class Locations — Summer 2010

**Centreville, VA Historical Tour**, 5714 Mount Gilead Road, Centreville, VA

### *Directions from the Beltway*

Take the Beltway to I-66 West and drive on the Interstate to Exit 53A/Centreville. Take this exit onto Sully Road (VA-28). After driving on Sully Road for about 1 mile, take the ramp onto Lee Highway (US-29 North) toward Fairfax. After driving on Lee Highway for almost ½ mile, turn left onto Braddock Road. Drive on Braddock Road about 1/10 of a mile and turn right onto Mount Gilead Road. You will arrive at the "Spindle House" on the left after driving about 500 feet. Parking is available at the Spindle House property and on the other side of the road.

**Clifton, VA Historical Tour**, 7153 Main Street, Clifton, VA

### *Directions from the Beltway*

Drive west on Braddock Road (VA-620) to Burke Lake Road (VA-645). Turn left onto Burke Lake Road and drive to Ox Road (VA-123 North). Turn right onto Ox Road and drive to Chapel Road (VA-641). Turn left onto Chapel Road and drive about 3.5 miles into Clifton. Turn left on Main Street where you will arrive almost immediately at 7153 ("Canary Cottage") on the left. Please see course description for parking availability.

**Fairfax Public Access**, 2929 Eskridge Rd., Suite S, Fairfax, VA

### *Directions from the Beltway*

Take Exit 50A (Rte. 50 West) and turn right at Prosperity Avenue. At the next light, turn right onto Lee Highway (Rte. 29) and right again at the next light onto Hilltop Street. Make an immediate left onto the access road running in from the PNC Bank. At the next street, turn right onto Eskridge Road. Fairfax Public Access (FPA) is located in the last building on the left (it says Channel 10 on the top).

### *Directions from Rte. 66*

Take Rte. 66 to Nutley Street (South). Turn left on Lee Highway (Rte. 29) and right on Hilltop Street (just past the Merrifield Regional Post Office). Make an immediate left onto the access road

running in from the PNC Bank. At the next street, turn right onto Eskridge Road. Fairfax Public Access (FPA) is located in the last building on the left (it says Channel 10 on the top).

**Greenspring Village** is located at 7440 Spring Village Drive in Springfield.

*Directions from the Beltway*

Take exit 4 (South) and drive to the first exit on I-95 South which is the Springfield interchange. Exit to the right onto Old Keene Mill Drive and follow signs to Backlick Road South. Proceed on Backlick Road to the Franconia-Springfield Parkway (Route 7900). Take the first right turn to enter the Parkway. Proceed on the Parkway to the first traffic light and turn right onto Spring Village Drive. Advise the guard station attendant that you are going to be attending a "Lifetime Learning Institute" class. You will need to sign a guest register at the reception desk. The receptionist will give you directions to your classroom.

**Little River United Church of Christ**, 8410 Little River Turnpike, Annandale

*Directions from the Beltway*

West on Little River Turnpike (Route 236) to the second traffic light (you will see the NOVA campus on the left). Turn right at the light and follow the road to the church parking lot.

*Directions from Wakefield Chapel Road*

Turn right onto Little River Turnpike (Route 236) and get into the left lane. Turn left at the first traffic light and follow the road to the church parking lot.

**Mason District Governmental Center**, 6507 Columbia Pike, Annandale

*Directions from the Beltway*

East on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Turn left onto John Marr Drive (next light after passing Giant Food on the left). Turn right at the next light, which is Columbia Pike. Go through several traffic lights. Following the traffic light at the intersection with Whispering Lane, there is a sign in the median reading "Fairfax County Police Station." Proceed a short distance and turn right into the parking lot of the Center.

**Meadowlark Botanical Gardens**, Beulah Road, Vienna

*Directions from the Beltway (Route 495)*

Proceeding on the Beltway toward Baltimore (and the American Legion Bridge), exit onto Route 123 South (Dolley Madison Blvd.), and proceed through two traffic signals (past Tysons Corner Center on your left and Tysons II on your right) to the intersection with Gallows Road (the third traffic signal). Turn right onto Gallows Road, moving immediately into the left turn lane. The next intersection is with Old Courthouse Road (and another traffic signal). Turn left onto Old Courthouse Road and proceed until it intersects with Beulah Road on your left. Proceed **straight** through this intersection (you may notice that the road's name changed from Old Courthouse to Beulah even though you kept straight...only in Virginia!). Proceed on Beulah Road until you reach Meadowlark Gardens (and Meadowlark Gardens

Court) on your left. Turn into the Court and you will find parking on your left.

**NOVA Campus Buildings**

(Refer to campus map on p. 5.)

Parking for all Campus Classes and Activities. **PLEASE PARK IN THE PAY PARKING GARAGE NEXT TO THE CULTURAL CENTER. THERE IS A \$1.00 PER HOUR CHARGE TO PARK IN THE GARAGE.**

**Ernst Community Cultural Center (CE)**, also called the NOVA Cultural Center, Annandale Campus, building marked "1" on the map. The Forum is the large open space (with fireplace) on the mezzanine level. Seminar rooms are on the mezzanine level adjacent to the Forum.

**Potomac Overlook Regional Park**, Marcey Road, Arlington

*From NOVA*

Take the Beltway, 495 North, to I-66 East. Take I-66 to Exit 72 for Lee Highway (Route 29) and Spout Run Parkway. At the light at the end of the exit ramp, turn right and get into the far left lane. Turn left at the first traffic light onto Spout Run Parkway. Turn left at the first light onto Lorcum Lane. The second light on Lorcum Lane is Military Road. Turn right onto Military Road. Military Road will appear to come to an end at a point where you must turn either right or left – turn left and follow the signs to the Park. At Marcey Road, turn right and follow Marcey into the Park. You'll pass one parking lot on your left (Marcey Park). Keep going and enter Potomac Overlook Regional Park. Park in the lot that is actually a cul de sac/traffic circle. Walk approximately 300 yards down the service road to the nature center.

*From 395*

Take 395 North toward the 14th Street Bridge. Just before the bridge, take Exit 10C, which is a **left-hand exit**, for the George Washington Memorial Parkway/Memorial Bridge. Stay in the right lane, and bear right for I-66 West/Spout Run Parkway. You'll pass a sign for Theodore Roosevelt Island on your right. Get into the left lane after this sign and take the first **left-hand exit** for I-66 West/Route 29/Spout Run Parkway. Spout Run Parkway will split; bear right onto Lorcum Lane. The second light on Lorcum Lane is Military Road. Turn right onto Military Road. Military Road will appear to come to an end at a point where you must turn either right or left – turn left and follow the signs to the Park. At Marcey Road, turn right and follow Marcey into the Park. You'll pass one parking lot on your left (Marcey Park). Keep going and enter Potomac Overlook Regional Park. Park in the lot that is actually a cul de sac/traffic circle. Walk approximately 300 yards down the service road to the nature center.

**Providence Presbyterian Church**, 9019 Little River Turnpike, Fairfax

*Directions from the Beltway*

Drive west on Little River Turnpike. Cross Wakefield Chapel Road and Guinea Road. Church is on the left a short distance after Guinea Road. Turn into church and go all the way to the rear to park. Enter the large double doors and

immediately turn right. Go through the inside double doors and you will be in the classroom.

*Directions from Fairfax*

Drive east on Little River Turnpike. Cross Olley Lane and go through light at Prince William Drive. Church is on the right a short distance after Prince William Drive. Turn into church and go all the way to the rear to park. Enter the large double doors and immediately turn right. Go through the inside double doors and you will be in the classroom.

**Red Rock Wilderness Overlook Park**

From I-495, the Washington Beltway, take the exit to Rte. 7 (Leesburg Pike) going west; follow Rte. 7 to the exit for Rte. 15 North. Continue north to Edwards Ferry Road (Rte. 773) and turn right. The park entrance is 1.5 miles after you turn on your left.

**St. Matthew's United Methodist Church, 8617 Little River Turnpike, Annandale**

*Directions from the Beltway*

West on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Pass the NOVA campus and Wakefield Chapel Road (second and third traffic lights). Take the next left (which does not have a traffic light) onto Wakefield Drive; immediately turn right and then left into the church parking lot. Park in spaces near the left-hand side of the church since you will be entering the building through a basement door on the left side.

*Directions from Braddock Road going East*

Turn left onto Wakefield Chapel Road. Continue for approximately 1.3 miles (passing NOVA on the right) and turn left onto Virginia Avenue. At the stop sign turn right onto Wakefield Drive and then turn left into the church parking lot.

**The Virginian, 9229 Arlington Boulevard (Route 50), Fairfax**

*Directions from the Beltway and Little River Turnpike (Route 236)*

Drive west on Little River Turnpike to Pickett Road. Turn right on Pickett Road and drive to Arlington Boulevard. Turn right onto Arlington Boulevard and then turn right at the first traffic light which will take you into The Virginian's driveway. Follow signs for visitor parking.

*Directions from the Beltway and Arlington Boulevard (Route 50)*

Drive west on Arlington Boulevard. Turn left at the first traffic light\*\* after Nutley Street into The

Virginian's driveway. Follow signs for visitor parking.

Parking is permitted in any vacant slot that is not designated as employee parking.

\*\* Landmark at this traffic light: Stonehurst Drive is on the right. Be sure to take a left at the traffic light into The Virginian complex.

**Washington and Old Dominion Railroad Regional Trail — at Bluemont Park**

*Directions from Seven Corners*

Take Wilson Boulevard east for 2 miles and, at the bottom of a steep hill, make a sharp right onto Manchester Street. Meet in the parking lot immediately off Manchester Street at the end near the tennis courts. Seven Corners is located at the intersection of Rtes. 7 and 50 and Wilson Boulevard.

*Directions from Rte. 66*

Going east on Rte. 66, take Exit 71, Glebe Road/Fairfax Drive. Turn right on Glebe Road and go one block and turn right on Wilson Boulevard. Go approximately 1 mile on Wilson Boulevard to Manchester Street and turn left on Manchester into the Park. Meet in the parking lot immediately off Manchester Street at the end near the tennis courts.

**The Woodlands, 4320 Forest Hill Drive, Fairfax**

*Directions from the Beltway*

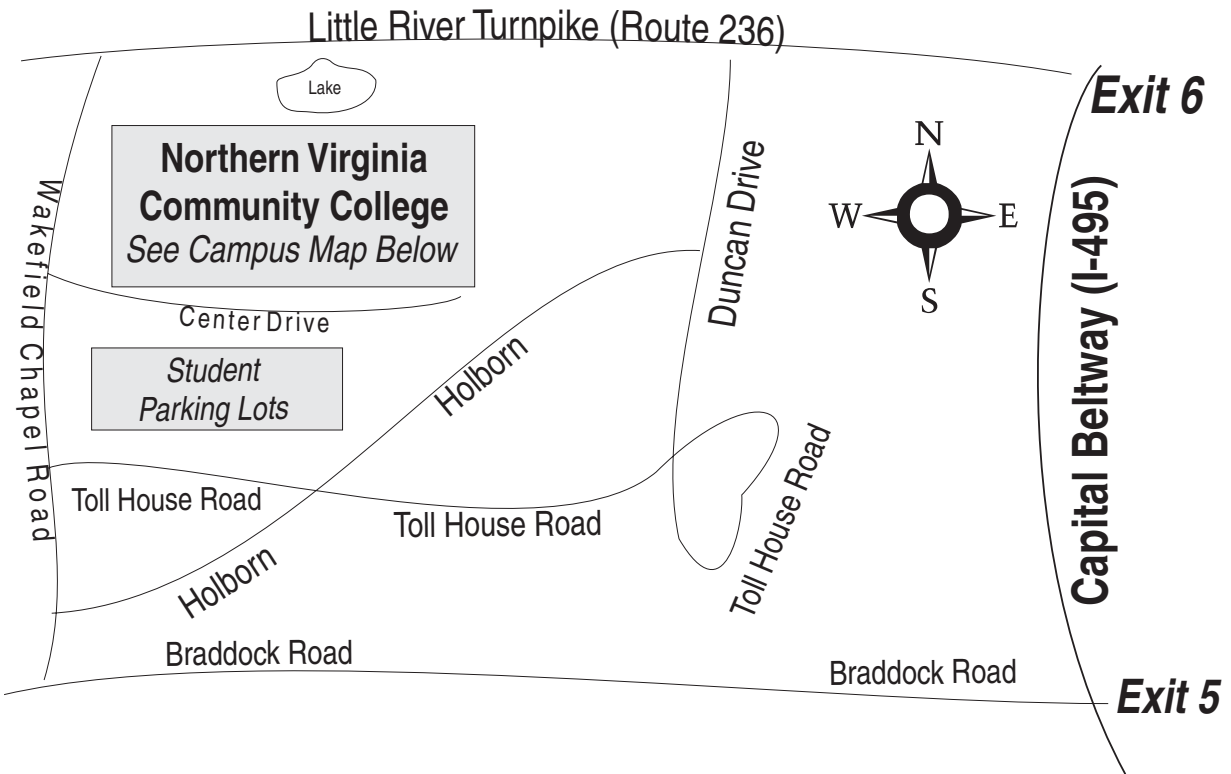
Take the Braddock Road West exit and go west on Braddock Road (approximately 7 miles) to Shirley Gate Road (Rte. 655). Turn right on Shirley Gate Road and proceed to the first traffic light at Lee Highway. Turn left on Lee Highway and then turn left at the next traffic light (Forest Hill Road). Continue to the second entrance on your right at The Woodlands sign.

Parking is permitted at The Woodlands as well as at the first building, The Gardens, next door. If both parking lots are full, street parking is permitted on Forest Hill Drive.

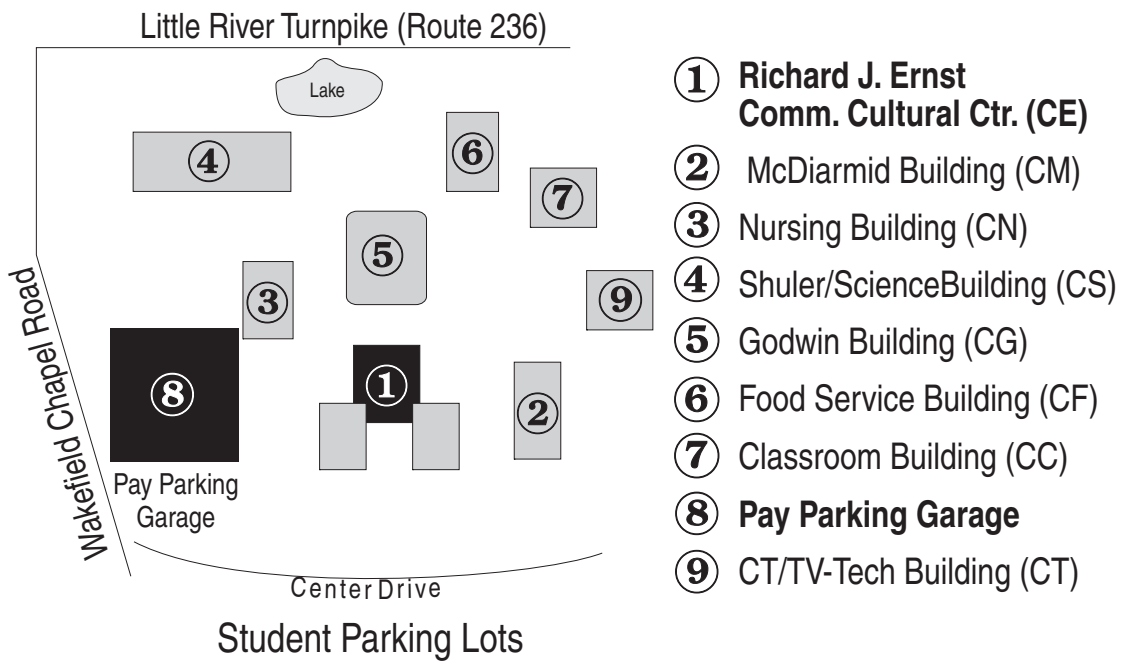
*Directions from Rte. 66*

Take Rte. 66 to the exit for Rte. 50 East (Fairfax). Go right at first traffic light (Waples Mill Road). Go right at Lee Highway, and turn left at first light (Forest Hill Drive). Take second entrance on right into The Woodlands on the left.

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### Course 10S02A Centreville, VA History (1 Session)

This tour of historic Centreville will begin at the Spindle House, a 1930's Sears Kit House. This site has been restored by the Fairfax County Park Authority and represents a largely unmodified house built in the 1930's. The fixtures, wallpaper and other details of the house date back to that era and represent a glimpse of life in Centreville. Parking is available at the site — 5714 Mount Gilead Road, Centreville, VA.

There are many other historic sites on County-owned land in Centreville. After touring the Spindle House we will visit selected sites, including a Civil War "earthworks." We will need to drive from the Spindle House to these sites where parking is limited.

Accordingly, it is recommended that carpools be arranged when driving to Centreville, or we can work out carpools for the second portion of the class and then return to the Spindle House to the cars that will remain there.

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### Course 10S04A The Pen is Mightier than the Sword: Abraham Lincoln and Walt Whitman (1 Session)

Shortly after the Battle of Fredericksburg, fought principally on December 13, 1862, Walt Whitman, author of *Leaves of Grass* (1855), would come to Washington, D.C., in search of his wounded brother Capt. George Whitman. He quickly would find his brother (who fortunately had suffered only minor wounds) but his stay in the Nation's Capital would last the next 10 years. Walt Whitman was changed profoundly by his experiences in Washington during the American Civil War. In *Specimen Days* (1892), Walt Whitman would write that "The real war will never get into the books." In many ways, he would spend the rest of his life trying to prove himself wrong and attempt to explain both in poetry and prose what the experience had really been like.

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**Course 10S12A “I Did No Wrong, But Right:” John Brown’s Raid** (4 Sessions)

Great compromises certainly gave life to the American Republic but they also nurtured it through six decades of growth. By the 1850’s, however, compromises over slavery satisfied few on either side and instead engendered sectional rage and inflamed partisan passions. Soon, violence forced its way into the territories and the halls of Congress where one politician warned of an “irrepressible conflict.” Extremists ruled the hour and voices of moderation went unheeded. Hear the sound of the “fire bell in the night” as abolitionist John Brown led his band of followers onto the streets of Harpers Ferry, Virginia. What caused him to enter the fray and how did his subsequent arrest, trial, and execution alter the course of American history? Was he a martyr to a cause, a dangerous fanatic, a reminder of the hidden evils of certain compromises, or, ominously, the harbinger of the bloodshed to come? Follow the pivotal events of the 1850’s that not only provoked John Brown’s Raid but also propelled Abraham Lincoln into the presidency and presaged the dissolution of the American Union.

Examples of the development of Army-Navy cooperation in the war will be presented, and the symbols under which the Navies fought will be shown.

## Day Trip

**DT 9-16-10 “Men Get Your Arms; We Will Proceed to the Ferry.” Harpers Ferry and John Brown’s Raid**

In July 1859, abolitionist John Brown rented a vacant farmhouse on the Kennedy Farm, on the Maryland side of the Potomac River, seven miles from Harpers Ferry, VA. Throughout that summer, Brown’s “Provisional Army” gathered at the farm, planning its strategy and preparing for a raid on the U.S. Armory and Arsenal at Harpers Ferry. Accompanied by Park Ranger Michael Kelly, we begin our trip with a visit to the Kennedy Farm, “where it all began.” At the farm, “Captain” South Lynn (historian and owner), who restored the farm to its 1859 appearance, will lead us through the summer days when Brown and his men repaired guns, studied maps, and passed the time as they waited for the date of the raid—Sunday, October 16, 1859. Leaving Kennedy Farm, we will travel country roads to Harpers Ferry for lunch at The Anvil Restaurant, overlooking the Lower Town of Harpers Ferry. After lunch, our bus will drop us off at the Harpers Ferry Visitor Center, where we will board shuttles for our walking tour of Lower Town. Ranger Kelly will lead us, taking us back in time as we tour the John Brown Museum, John Brown’s Fort, Arsenal Square, and other sites. You will have time to browse the Park bookshop as well as view exhibits detailing the history of Harpers Ferry, how it was

transformed from a wilderness into a booming industrial center with the 1790’s establishment of the U.S. Armory and Arsenal. After several hours in the town, we will board shuttles and return to our waiting coach at the Visitor Center. If time permits, we will visit Charlestown, WV, where Brown was tried and sentenced to death. We then will depart for home. **Keep in mind several of the buildings we will visit have steep stairs; additionally, there are uneven paths of cobble and brick throughout the Town.**
