How Are the Courses Organized?

Courses generally consist of one to ten 90-minute sessions, are informal, and frequently include group discussion. They are taught by outside faculty and by your fellow LLI members. Most courses are free to members, but some include assigned reading and purchase of a textbook, or require a small materials fee.

When Are the Classes and Where?

Classes are offered throughout the year, subdivided into Winter/Spring, Summer, and Fall semesters. They are typically held on weekdays between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. The courses are held on the NVCC Annandale campus and off-campus in churches, community centers and other suitable locations.

Benefits of Membership

How Do I Become a Member and What is the Cost?

Complete the membership application form found on page 23 and mail with your check to the address shown. The current annual membership fee is \$100. The membership period is for 12 months beginning with the month in which dues are paid.

How Do I Register for Classes and Tours?

Complete a class registration form found on pages 19 and 21, listing the courses you wish to attend *in order of preference*. Mail to the LLI office with a self-addressed stamped envelope and any applicable fees as soon as possible; *registration for classes closes June 6, 2006*. Registration forms received after that date will be considered only if there are spaces remaining in the courses

you select. Your registration form will be mailed back to you in your self-addressed envelope shortly after the closing date, but in advance of the first class, indicating whether you have been accepted, wait-listed, or whether the class has been canceled. As a courtesy to other LLI members, please call the LLI office at (703) 503-0600 if you find that you will not be able to attend a course after you have been accepted. This will give members on a waiting list an opportunity to attend.

Registration for trips should be submitted on the separate forms provided. Please remember to sign the "Assumption of Risk and Acknowledgment of Responsibility" statement.

Monthly Forums

Members and non-members are warmly welcomed as guests to attend the Speakers Program and Open House Forum. The Forum is held monthly (except during the summer) at 10:00 a.m. in the Richard J. Ernst Community Cultural Center (see map on page 4) on the NVCC Annandale Campus (see page 5 for schedule).

For more information, call the LLI office at (703) 503-0600, and also see information in the LLI monthly newsletter. Persons attending these Forums should park in the garage on Center Drive next to the Ernst Center. There is a \$1.00 per hour charge to park in the garage.

Class Cancellations

If there is inclement weather, LLI classes and other activities are canceled (**except for bus tours**) if the Fairfax County school system cancels school for the day, *regardless of the LLI class location and whether or not NVCC holds its regular college classes*. Listen for radio and TV announcements. LLI morning classes are canceled if the County announces a 2-hour delay in class openings. LLI afternoon classes are canceled if the County announces early dismissal. You will be notified of a schedule for "make-up" classes. Directions to Class Locations — Summer 2006

Annandale United Methodist Church is located at 6935 Columbia Pike in Annandale.

Directions from the Beltway

Drive east on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Proceed through 5 traffic lights and go into the left lane. At the next traffic light (Backlick Road), which is at the intersection where Fuddrucker's restaurant is located on the left and a Mobil service station is on the right, take a left onto Backlick Road and bear right immediately. You will go only a short block and after passing a Jiffy Lube, turn right onto Columbia Pike. Drive to the second traffic light which is at Gallows Road where you will see a small old white church on the right. Proceed just beyond the traffic light and turn right into the parking lot. Enter the brick church through the main entrance and look for signs.

Colvin Run Mill, 10017 Colvin Run Rd., Great Falls.

Directions from the Beltway (I-495)

Take Exit 47A (Leesburg Pike, Rt. 7) west 5 miles, past Tysons Corner, to a right turn on Colvin Run Rd. The mill is on your left. Turn left into the paved parking lot 500 feet beyond the gravel drive to the mill.

Goodwin House West, 3440 South Jefferson Street, Falls Church (across Route 7, Leesburg Pike, from the Skyline Center complex).

Since visitor parking is limited at Goodwin House West, you are encouraged to park behind the Giant Food Store located in the "Crossroads Place" Shopping Center.

Directions from Bailey's Crossroads (Intersection of Columbia Pike and Leesburg Pike)

East on Route 7, Leesburg Pike; left at the traffic light at South Jefferson Street. South Jefferson Street is located between the "Crossroads Place" and "Leesburg Pike Plaza" shopping centers. Go to the first traffic light and turn left into the parking lot of the "Crossroads Place Shopping Center" where there are several stores, including Burlington Coat Factory and Giant Food. Drive to the left side of Giant Food; turn right at the corner of the store and park in one of the spaces along a fence line. A gate with a "Private Property" sign will be unlocked. Go through the gate to the main entrance of Goodwin House West (a 12-story brick building). It is only a short walk!

Greenspring Village, 7440 Spring Village Drive, Springfield.

Directions from Annandale

At the intersection of Little River Turnpike and Backlick Road, go south on Backlick Road. Follow Backlick Road for approximately four miles to the sign for Franconia-Springfield Parkway (Route 7900). Take the first right onto the Parkway, going west. At the first traffic light, turn right onto Spring Village Drive.

Directions from Braddock Road

From Kings Park Shopping Center, drive south on Rolling Road for four miles to the Franconia-Springfield Parkway (Route 7900). Exit left at the second traffic light for the Parkway south. Continue one mile; turn left at the traffic light onto Spring Village Drive.

IMPORTANT: At the guard gate, inform the attendant that you are attending a "Lifetime Learning Institute" class at Village Square or the Chapel.

James Lee Community Center, 2855 Annandale Road, Falls Church.

Directions from the Beltway

Take Arlington Blvd. (Rte. 50) towards Falls Church to Annandale Road. Turn left on Annandale Road (going towards the center of Falls Church) to a traffic light at James Lee Street. Turn right into the parking lot. Please enter the building on the parking lot side and take an immediate right to the classrooms.

Little River United Church of Christ, 8410 Little River Turnpike, Annandale.

Directions from the Beltway

West on Little River Turnpike (Route 236) to the second traffic light (you will see the NVCC campus on the left). Turn right at the light and follow the road to the church parking lot.

Directions from Wakefield Chapel Road

Turn right onto Little River Turnpike (Route 236) and get into the left lane. Turn left at the first traffic light and follow the road to the church parking lot.

Mason District Governmental Center, 6507 Columbia Pike, Annandale.

Directions from the Beltway

East on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Turn left onto John Marr Drive (next light after passing Giant Food on the left). Turn right at the next light, which is Columbia Pike. Go through several traffic lights. Following the traffic light at the intersection with Whispering Lane, there is a sign in the median reading "Fairfax County Police Station." Proceed a short distance and turn right into the parking lot of the Center.

National Gallery of Art, 6th and Constitution Ave., N. W., Washington, D. C.

Closest Metro station is Archives/Navy Memorial (on the green and yellow lines).

Parking for all Campus Classes and Activities.
PLEASE PARK IN THE PAY PARKING GARAGE NEXT TO THE CULTURAL CENTER. THERE IS A \$1.00 PER HOUR CHARGE TO PARK IN THE GARAGE.

Ernst Community Cultural Center (CE), also called the NVCC Cultural Center, Annandale Campus, building marked "1" on the map. The Forum is the large open space (with fireplace) on the mezzanine level. Seminar rooms are on the mezzanine level adjacent to the Forum. The Dance Room is located on the first floor behind the elevator.

NVCC McDiarmid Building (CM), marked "2" on the map.

Pope-Leighey House, 9000 Richmond Highway, Alexandria.

From Springfield:

Take I-395/95 South and exit at 116A (Fairfax County Parkway). Proceed on the parkway until you dead end at Rt. 1 - Richmond Highway. Turn left and go north to the intersection of Rt. 1 and State Road 234 (the 4th traffic light). Turn left into Woodlawn entrance.

From Washington, D.C./Mount Vernon:

Follow the George Washington Parkway to Mount Vernon through Alexandria. At the traffic circle at Mount Vernon, bear to the right and stay in the center lane. At the stop sign continue straight onto Rt. 235 South. Stay on Rt. 235 until it intersects

with Rt. 1 (approximately 3 miles) to the entrance to Woodlawn.

Providence Presbyterian Church, 9019 Little River Turnpike, Fairfax.

Directions from the Beltway

Drive west on Little River Turnpike. Cross Wakefield Chapel Road and Guinea Road. Church is on the left a short distance after Guinea Road. Turn into church and go all the way to the rear to park. Enter the large double doors and immediately turn right. Go through the inside double doors and you will be in the classroom.

Directions from Fairfax

Drive east on Little River Turnpike. Cross Olley Lane and go through light at Prince William Drive. Church is on the right a short distance after Prince William Drive. Turn into church and go all the way to the rear to park. Enter the large double doors and immediately turn right. Go through the inside double doors and you will be in the classroom.

St. Matthew's United Methodist Church, 8617 Little River Turnpike, Annandale.

Directions from the Beltway

West on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Pass the NVCC campus and Wakefield Chapel Road (second and third traffic lights). Take the next left (which does not have a traffic light) onto Wakefield Drive; immediately turn right and then left into the church parking lot. Park in spaces near the left-hand side of the church since you will be entering the building through a basement door on the left side.

Directions from Braddock Road going East

Turn left onto Wakefield Chapel Road. Continue for approximately 1.3 miles (passing NVCC on the right) and turn left onto Virginia Avenue. At the stop sign turn right onto Wakefield Drive and then turn left into the church parking lot.

Sully Historic Site, 3601 Sully Road, Chantilly.

From the Beltway (I-495)

From the Beltway take Rt. 66 West to Rt. 28 North (exit 53B). Turn right at the end of the exit ramp onto Rt. 28. Go approximately 4 miles north on Rt. 28 and turn right just past the Rt. 50 exit. (DO NOT TURN ONTO RT. 50, STAY ON RT. 28.)

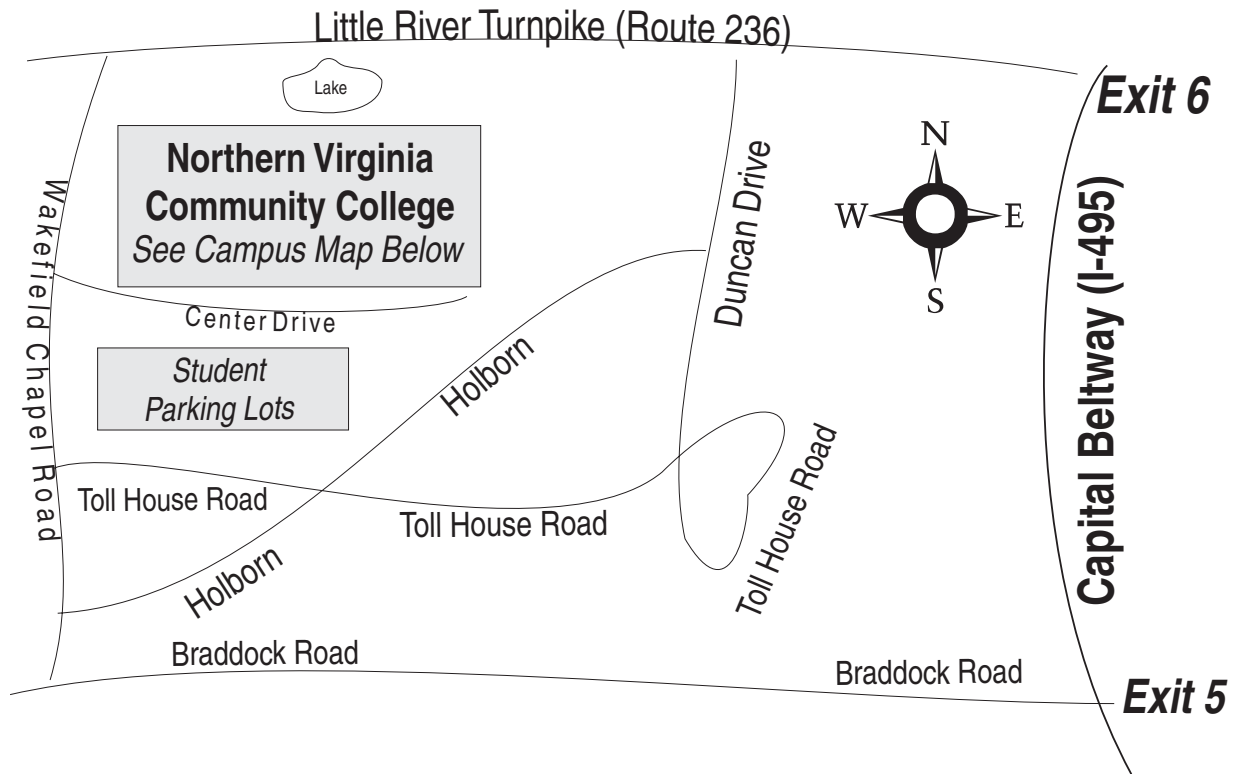
Alternate Route: Rt. 50 West all the way to Rt. 28. Go north on Rt. 28 less than one mile and turn right into the Sully Site.

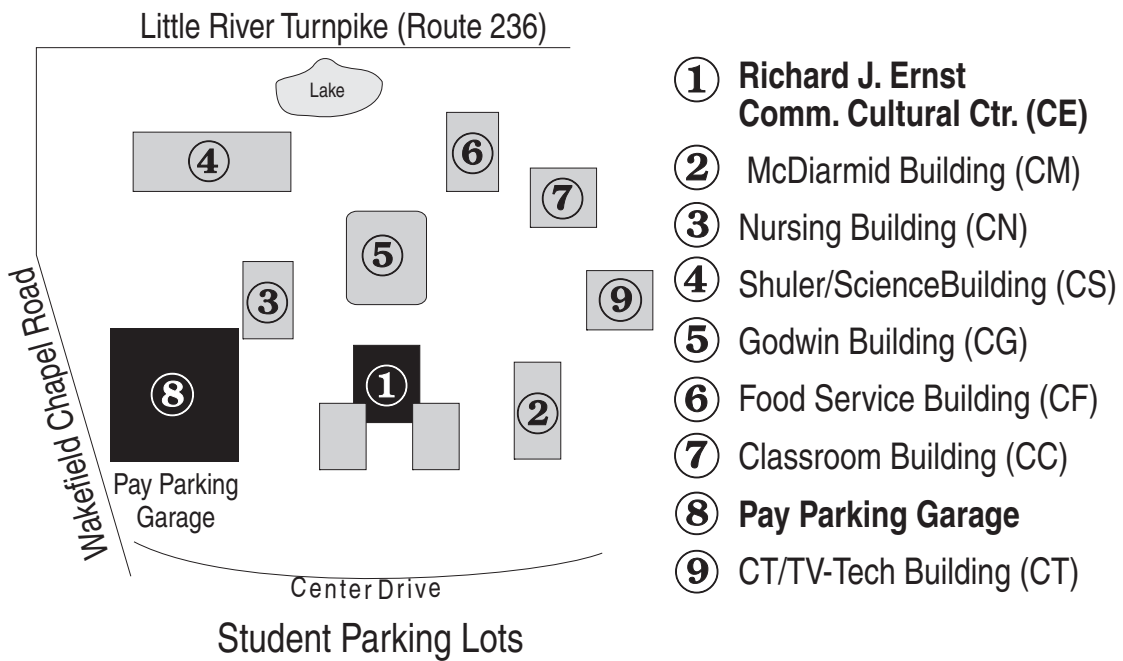
Directions from the Beltway (Route 495)

Go North toward Tysons Corner/Rockville to MD Route 97 South/Georgia Avenue (Exit 31B toward Silver Spring); turn a slight right onto Route 97/Georgia Avenue for 2.1 miles to Blair Road, NW, and turn left; turn left onto Oglethorpe St., NW.

Course 6S02A Kate and Kitty: Women of Substance (1 Session)

This illustrated talk will explore the lives of two extraordinary Virginia women, Dr. Kate Waller Barrett (1857-1925) and her daughter, Kitty Barrett Pozer (1886-1981). Dr. Barrett, a leading social activist and reformer, established Florence Crittenton Mission Homes across the United States. In 1923, Dr. Barrett purchased an early 19th-century house (now known as Ratcliffe-Allison House) near the Fairfax County Courthouse. Her daughter, Kitty Barrett Pozer, lived in the house from 1927 until her death in 1981, at which time the house was left to the City of Fairfax. Mrs. Pozer was a community activist and the gardening columnist for *The Washington Post* for over 30 years.

Course 6S05A Gilded Age Washington: Corruption, Bribery, and Falsehood (4 Sessions)

If remembered at all, the period of United States history from 1870 to 1910 remains forever tarnished by scandal, corruption, and intrigue. Unregulated economic expansion generated enormous fortunes controlled by an upper class that delighted in overt, lavish displays of their wealth. Meanwhile, beneath the "gilded" surface, distrust, dissatisfaction, and disease festered within a growing underclass

brutalized by oppressive working conditions and punishing poverty. Explore life and events in the Nation's Capital during this often overlooked era when the country's leaders reacted to explosive growth in industrialization, urbanization, and immigration. The transformation of United States architecture, culture, society, economics, business, politics, and government propelled the Nation forward and paved the way for its entrance onto the world stage, just as that world stood ready to blow itself apart.

Course 6S08P Energy, Climate and Ethics (2 Sessions)

United States energy policy affects all of us. An energy policy expert who retired from the U.S. Department of Transportation will discuss energy dependence, affects on climate and associated ethical issues.

Session 1 U.S. energy policy in the context of our absolute dependence on energy as the basis of civilization, arrayed against the severe societal costs associated with energy use, including climate change; military and geopolitical costs; economic impacts of oil shocks; and environmental pollution. Current U.S. energy policy will be described and contrasted with proposals for sharp changes in policy direction.

Session 2 A discussion of some ethical and philosophical issues that appear to be barriers to U.S. action on climate change. Climate change characteristics and the ethical questions they raise will be discussed, *e.g.*, man's relationship to nature, obligations to future generations, global equity, consumerism, and individualism. Guidance from tradition will be reviewed and the outlook for action will be appraised.

Our first session, The Proper Care of Quilts and Collectible Textiles, will discuss optimum safety practices and preventive measures to ensure the preservation of valuable family textiles, from bedcoverings and quilts to needlework or sentimental lace handkerchiefs and baby clothing. Recommended cleaning and storage techniques will be outlined along with practical tips for display or framing. Handouts to be distributed will include local textile conservators (for more extensive treatments) and lists of contacts and suppliers for the suggested materials necessary for proper care. Questions from participants on specific textiles with problems or issues will be addressed.

The second session, Caring for Your Family Heirlooms, will cover basic guidelines for the proper care and documentation of a variety of family treasures, including photographs, books, letters, furniture, collectibles, and fine decorative arts. These guidelines and practices are universally accepted by conservators and museum professionals and can be easily applied to the general preservation of the many types of items passed down through generations. Participants are encouraged to bring a small possession for examination and receive care recommendations.

Course 6S14A The Books of the Maccabees: Transitional Texts, Transitional Thought (4 Sessions)

The extant books of the Maccabees consist of four Jewish texts named for Judas Maccabeus, the hero of a successful Jewish uprising against the Seleucids in 175-164 BCE, and have varying positions of authority in both Jewish and Christian thought and scriptural canon. There are clear doctrinal trends presented within these texts that are traditionally thought to be more consistent with developmental Christianity than with Jewish thought. (The Roman Catholic practice of praying for the dead has its scriptural "proof text" in 2 Maccabees.) Given that the books date from the 1st century BCE through the 1st century CE, interesting issues emerge.

Perhaps, if viewed objectively, a close look at "the Maccabees" offers an indication that some doctrines of the early Christians were not entirely new and were strongly linked to a branch of developing Jewish thought which came to an abrupt halt after the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple in 70 CE. In this course, we will examine these four texts from the perspective of their Jewish roots and developing spiritual concepts in Christianity.
