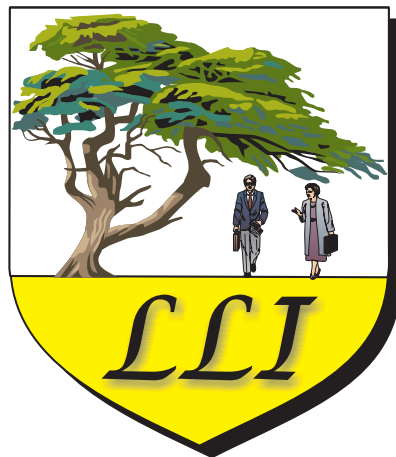

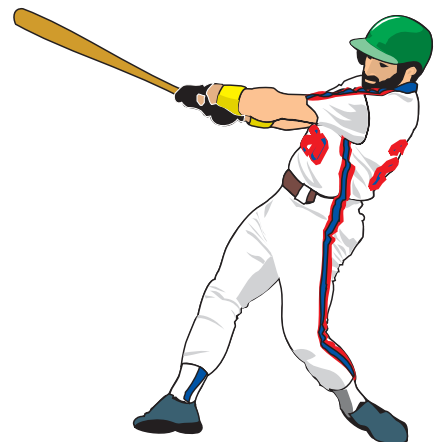

How Are the Courses Organized?

Courses generally consist of one to ten 90-minute sessions, are informal, and frequently include group discussion. They are taught by outside faculty and by your fellow LLI members. Most courses are free to members, but some include assigned reading and purchase of a textbook, or require a small materials fee.

When Are the Classes and Where?

Classes are offered throughout the year, subdivided into Winter/Spring, Summer, and Fall semesters. They are typically held on weekdays between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. The courses are held on the NVCC Annandale campus and off-campus in churches, community centers and other suitable locations.

Benefits of Membership

- Participation in day and overnight trips at the special membership rate.
- Participation in the group overseas Study/Travel program.
- Attendance at social events such as the annual picnic and winter holiday luncheon.

How Do I Become a Member and What Is the Cost?

Complete the membership application form found on page 19 and mail with your check to the address shown. The current annual membership fee is \$110. The membership period is for 12 months beginning with the month in which dues are paid.

How Do I Register for Classes and Tours?

Complete a class registration form found on pages 15 and 17, listing the courses you wish to attend *in order of preference*. Mail to the LLI office with a self-addressed stamped envelope and any applicable fees as soon as possible; *registration for classes closes June 2, 2009*. Registration forms received after that date will be considered only if there are spaces remaining in the courses you select. Your registration form will be mailed back to you in your self-addressed envelope shortly after the closing date, but in advance of the first class, indicating whether you have been accepted, wait-listed, or whether the class has been canceled. As a courtesy to other LLI members, please call the Leader/Coordinator listed in the specific course description if you will not be able to attend part or all of a course after you have been accepted. This will give members on a waiting list an opportunity to attend.

Registration for trips should be submitted on the separate forms provided. Please remember to sign the "Assumption of Risk and Acknowledgment of Responsibility" statement.

LLI courses are open only to those LLI members who have **registered and been accepted** into the course unless otherwise specified. **Please note** that if you are wait-listed for a course, you are not "accepted" unless notified and must register for that course the next time it is offered; you will be given priority when you re-register.

Monthly Forums

Members and non-members are warmly welcomed as guests to attend the Speakers Program and Open House Forum. The Forum is held monthly (except during the summer) at 10:00 a.m. in the Richard J. Ernst Community Cultural Center (see map on page 4) on the NVCC Annandale Campus (see page 5 for schedule).

Persons attending these Forums should park in the garage on Center Drive next to the Ernst Center. There is a \$1.00 per hour charge to park in the garage.

Class Cancellations

If the Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) cancel school for the day due to inclement weather or other emergency, all LLI classes, Forums, and other activities (**except for Trips/Travel — see below**) are cancelled regardless of class location. LLI morning classes are cancelled if the FCPS announces a two-hour delay in class openings; LLI afternoon classes are cancelled if the FCPS announces early dismissal.

Trip/Travel Cancellations: The person designated as the trip leader for a particular trip is responsible for the decision to cancel a trip.

Blenheim Property, 3610 Old Lee Highway, Fairfax

Directions from Beltway

Go West on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Pass the NVCC campus and continue toward Fairfax City. When the road splits, keep to the right and you will be on Old Lee Highway. Travel about ½ mile (St. Leo's Church will be on the left). Continue on Old Lee Highway until you see Heritage Drive on the right. Directly across on the left is the driveway entrance and a brick wall. Take the driveway up to the interpretive center.

Little River United Church of Christ, 8410 Little River Turnpike, Annandale

Directions from the Beltway

West on Little River Turnpike (Route 236) to the second traffic light (you will see the NVCC campus on the left). Turn right at the light and follow the road to the church parking lot.

Directions from Wakefield Chapel Road

Turn right onto Little River Turnpike (Route 236) and get into the left lane. Turn left at the first traffic light and follow the road to the church parking lot.

Mason District Governmental Center, 6507 Columbia Pike, Annandale

Directions from the Beltway

East on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Turn left onto John Marr Drive (next light after passing Giant Food on the left). Turn right at the next light, which is Columbia Pike. Go through several traffic lights. Following the traffic light at the intersection with Whispering Lane, there is a sign in the median reading "Fairfax County Police Station." Proceed a short distance and turn right into the parking lot of the Center.

Meadowlark Botanical Gardens, Beulah Road, Vienna

Directions from the Beltway (Route 495)

Proceeding on the Beltway toward Baltimore (and the American Legion Bridge), exit onto Route 123 South (Dolley Madison Blvd.), and proceed through two traffic signals (past Tysons Corner Center on your left and Tysons II on your right) to the intersection with Gallows Road (the third traffic signal). Turn right onto Gallows Road, moving immediately into the **left** turn lane. The next intersection is with Old Courthouse Road (and another traffic signal). Turn left onto Old Courthouse Road and proceed until it intersects with Beulah Road on your left. Proceed **straight** through this intersection (you may notice that the road's name changed from Old Courthouse to Beulah even though you kept straight...only in Virginia!). Proceed on Beulah Road until you reach Meadowlark Gardens (and Meadowlark Gardens

Court) on your left. Turn into the Court and you will find parking on your left.

National Gallery of Art, 6th and Constitution Ave., N. W., Washington, D. C.

Closest Metro station is Archives/Navy Memorial (on the green and yellow lines).

NVCC Campus Buildings

(Refer to campus map on p. 4.)

Parking for all Campus Classes and Activities. **PLEASE PARK IN THE PAY PARKING GARAGE NEXT TO THE CULTURAL CENTER. THERE IS A \$1.00 PER HOUR CHARGE TO PARK IN THE GARAGE.**

Ernst Community Cultural Center (CE), also called the NVCC Cultural Center, Annandale Campus, building marked "1" on the map. The Forum is the large open space (with fireplace) on the mezzanine level. Seminar rooms are on the mezzanine level adjacent to the Forum. The Dance Room is located on the first floor behind the elevator.

St. Matthew's United Methodist Church, 8617 Little River Turnpike, Annandale

Directions from the Beltway

West on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Pass the NVCC campus and Wakefield Chapel Road (second and third traffic lights). Take the next left (which does not have a traffic light) onto Wakefield Drive; immediately turn right and then left into the church parking lot. Park in spaces near the left-hand side of the church since you will be entering the building through a basement door on the left side.

Directions from Braddock Road going East

Turn left onto Wakefield Chapel Road. Continue for approximately 1.3 miles (passing NVCC on the right) and turn left onto Virginia Avenue. At the

stop sign turn right onto Wakefield Drive and then turn left into the church parking lot.

The Virginian, 9229 Arlington Boulevard (Route 50), Fairfax

Directions from the Beltway and Little River Turnpike (Route 236)

Drive west on Little River Turnpike to Pickett Road. Turn right on Pickett Road and drive to Arlington Boulevard. Turn right onto Arlington Boulevard and then turn right at the first traffic light which will take you into The Virginian's driveway.

Directions from the Beltway and Arlington Boulevard (Route 50)

Drive west on Arlington Boulevard. Turn left at the first traffic light** after Nutley Street into The Virginian's driveway.

Parking is permitted in any vacant slot that is not designated as handicapped or employee parking.

** Landmark at this traffic light: Stonehurst Drive is on the right. Be sure to take a left at the traffic light into The Virginian complex.

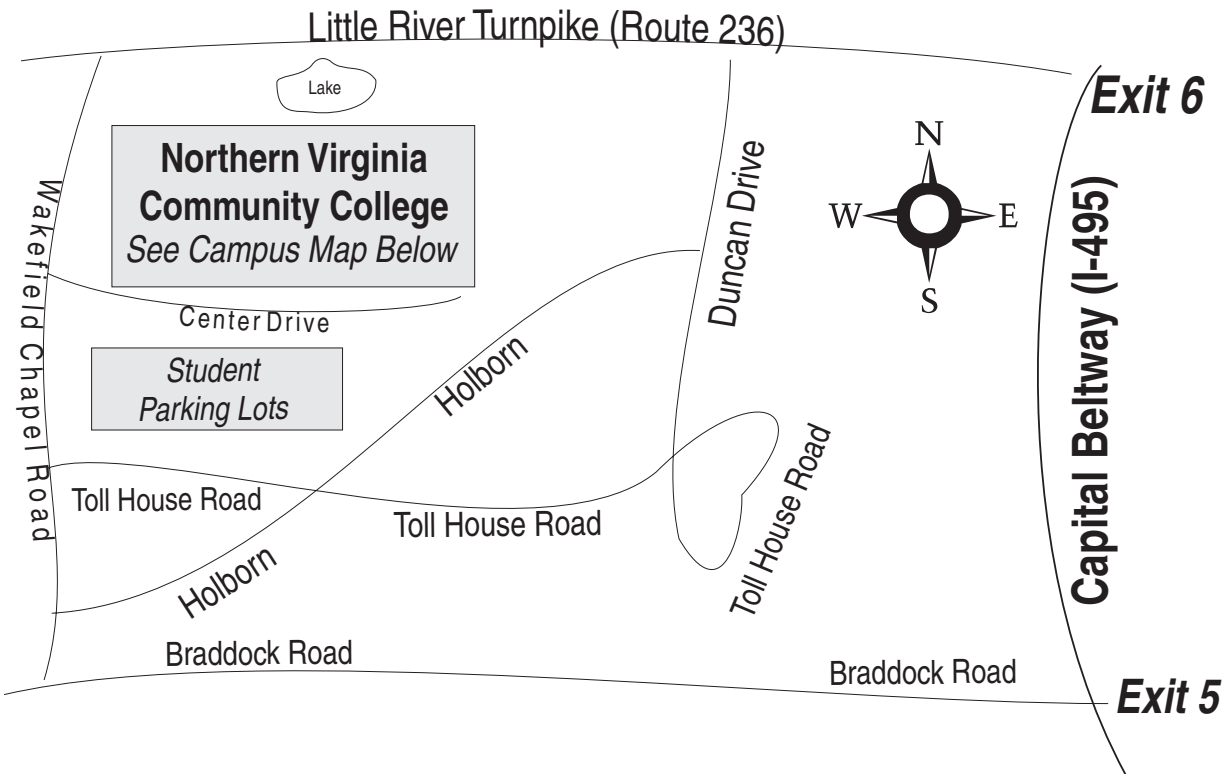
The Woodlands, 4320 Forest Hill Drive, Fairfax

Directions from the Beltway

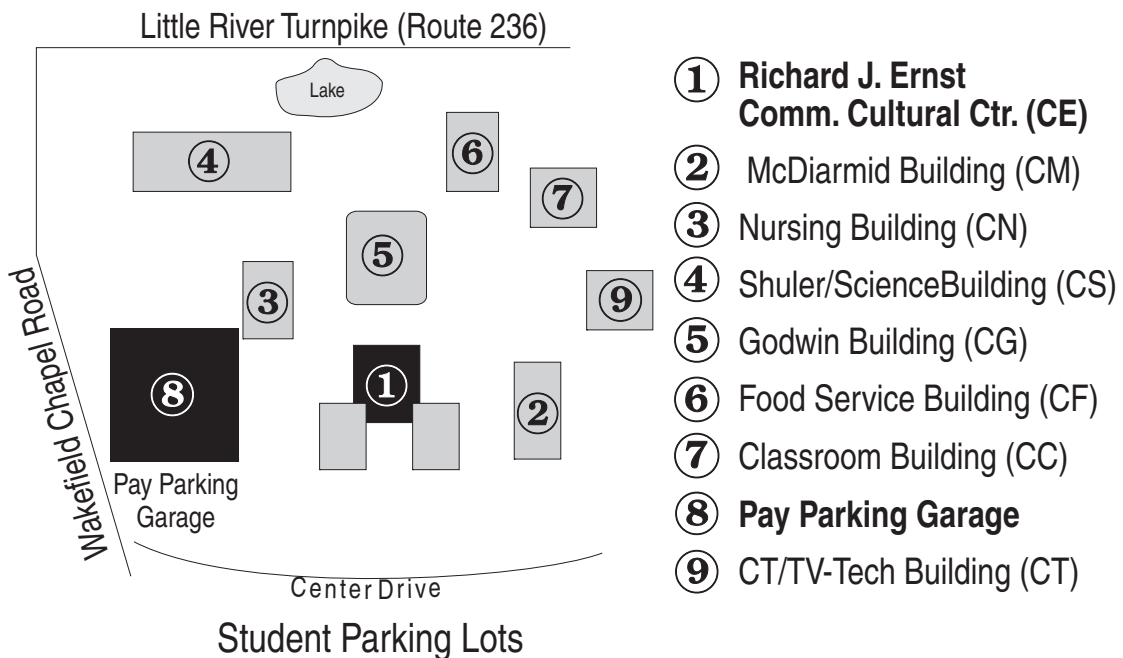
Take the Braddock Road West exit and go west on Braddock Road (approximately 7 miles) to Shirley Gate Road (Rt. 655). Turn right on Shirley Gate Road and proceed to the first traffic light at Lee Highway. Turn left on Lee Highway and then turn left at the next traffic light (Forest Hill Road). Continue to the second entrance on your right at the Woodlands sign.

Parking is permitted at the Woodlands as well as at the first building, the Gardens next door. If both parking lots are full, street parking is permitted on Forest Hill Drive.

Course 9S02A Swampoodle: The Tale of a "Lost" Neighborhood (1 Session)

Washington, D.C. possesses a wonderful array of curiously named neighborhoods, with Swampoodle as an outstanding example. An integral part of Peter L'Enfant's original street grid for the federal city, Swampoodle nevertheless failed to experience rapid development due to perceived unhealthy conditions.

Throughout the second half of the nineteenth century, Swampoodle became somewhat of a notorious slum where transient populations of immigrants and freed slaves sought to purchase or rent inexpensive property. Stories of both triumph and tragedy run through Swampoodle, as does a brief episode of America's national pastime. Urban renewal transformed the place into one of the national capital's more frequently visited areas. But, Swampoodle remains an accidental destination, as its tourists and commuters know little of its history and probably nothing about its intriguing name. Explore this colorful section of town through period maps, illustrations, stories, and music.

Course 9S03A Study Travel: Four Corners National Parks (2 Sessions)

In September, LLI's Study/Travel Group will be exploring the world's greatest concentration of American national parks and monuments known as the "Grand Circle" with an expert geologist. This journey includes the Grand Canyon, Zion, Bryce, Capitol Reef, Arches, Canyonlands, Lake Powell, Grand Staircase-Escalante, Dead Horse Point, Monument Valley, and Rainbow Bridge. Join us as the National Park Service provides us with background information on the parks we will visit. This will include a history of the National Park system and history and highlights of these parks in particular; flora and fauna in these parks and habitat restoration/preservation efforts; history of early pioneers in the region; relationship of these parks to Native American history and culture; and environmental issues facing these parks.

Course 9S04P Sustainable Energy Technology (2 Sessions)

The federal stimulus legislation includes a large amount of money for job creation and training, particularly “Green Collar” jobs. However, nowhere in the bill is the term “green” defined. For the State of Virginia, the money is close to \$600 million! Areas that fall under this category include not only wind mills, photovoltaic/solar cells, hydrogen fuel cells, smart transmission lines, and electric storage devices, but also new, efficient designs of nuclear and traditional power stations and all fundamental and basic technology surrounding these industries. The NVCC Department of Engineering has recently launched a new Sustainable Energy laboratory and has been able to acquire laboratory equipment for teaching renewable energy technology. Join us for these fascinating lectures that will cover global energy issues, demands, and solutions. Different aspects of renewable energy technology will also be covered.

Course 9S07A “We Are Met on a Great Battlefield:” The Enduring Appeal of Gettysburg (4 Sessions)

Few American towns possess more name recognition than Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. Beginning with the 1863 clash of the Blue and the Gray, the small Pennsylvania town has remained at the center of American thought, debate, fascination, commemoration, and devotion. Gettysburg, along with its adjacent fields and woods, has experienced the never-ending pilgrimage of Americans in search of some personal fulfillment. We will explore the mystique of Gettysburg by delving deep into the reasons why this battle occurred, analyzing the battle action, naming its heroes and heroines, challenging common misconceptions about it, debunking its pervasive myths, and developing its transformation into the American shrine that it is. While open to as many participants as possible, this course primarily serves as an introduction to the subject for those who may journey to Gettysburg National Military Park on Thursday, October 15, 2009.

Be among the first groups to tour this newly-opened public historic site in the City of Fairfax. Historic Blenheim is a 12-acre site, which includes the c.1859 Blenheim House and a new Civil War Interpretive Center. The house is on the National Register of Historic Places and is significant for its large volume of inscriptions and pictographs drawn by Union soldiers during the Civil War. Participants will be

given a guided tour of the new Interpretive Center's exhibits, including a replica of the inscriptions found in the house's attic, the first floor of the Blenheim House, and an interpretive landscape trail. Please wear comfortable clothing and walking shoes.

Course 9S14P Travelogue on Sardinia and Sicily, and How to Create a Travelogue DVD (1 Session)

In this "Two-for-One" program, LLI member Conne Rubinstein will first show her 37-minute DVD travelogue on a 2008 trip to Sardinia and Sicily, islands of Italy only a short distance apart but quite different in character. Conne and her husband Mark had a unique vantage point, as they traveled with their daughter and their son-in-law, who is a Sardinian native, to visit large cities and tiny villages, view the wonders of classical antiquity and nature, and, in Sardinia, visit some areas rarely seen by Americans.
