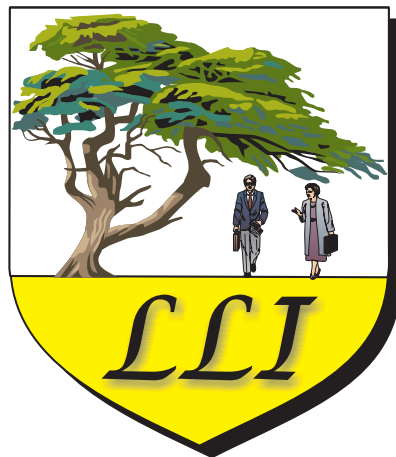




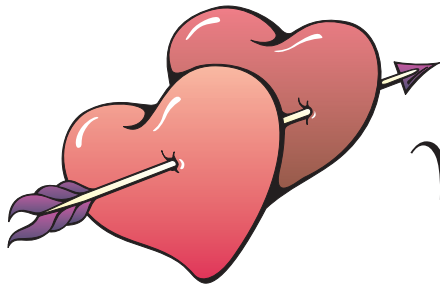

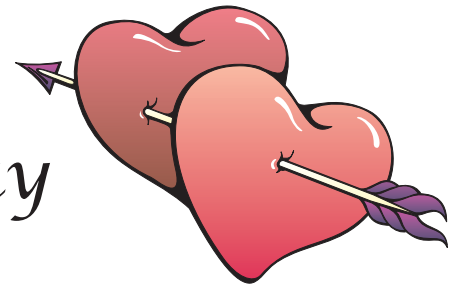

## General Information

### What Is LLI?

Sponsored by Northern Virginia Community College (NOVA), the Lifetime Learning Institute of Northern Virginia (LLI/NOVA) is a non-profit, member-run organization dedicated to providing continuing educational opportunities to older adults of all backgrounds and income levels. LLI/NOVA is a member of the Elderhostel Institute Network (EIN) and benefits from the services EIN provides in program development.

LLI membership is especially attractive to individuals 50 years old or older (retired or semi-retired), who are interested in pursuing intellectual enrichment and enjoying social interaction with their peers.

LLI:

- is governed and financed by members
- is supported by member-led planning, administration, and instruction
- provides non-credit, non-degree courses
- offers educational, cultural, and social events
- recognizes that physical and mental health are major elements of vital aging.

### What Do We Have to Offer?

- Participation in courses and special interest groups throughout the year, usually without charge.
- Participation in day and overnight trips at the special membership rate.
- Participation in the group overseas Study/Travel program.
- Attendance at social events such as the annual picnic and winter holiday luncheon.
- Monthly newsletter.
- And hopefully, new friendships.

In addition, affiliation with both NOVA and EIN means that, as a member of LLI/NOVA, you are entitled to a Community Patron card, obtained from the NOVA library by showing a picture ID. This entitles members to use the NOVA library, located on the third floor of the Godwin Building. Up to three books can be charged out for three weeks; they can be renewed online for an additional period. Go to <http://www.nvcc.edu/library> for more information. There is no cost for the card.

### How Are the Courses Organized?

Courses generally consist of one to ten 90-minute sessions, are informal, and frequently include group discussion. They are taught by outside faculty and by your fellow LLI members. Most courses are free to members, but some include assigned reading and purchase of a textbook, or require a small materials fee.

### When Are the Classes and Where?

Classes are offered throughout the year, subdivided into Winter/Spring, Summer, and Fall semesters. They are typically held on weekdays between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. The courses are held on the NOVA Annandale campus and off-campus in churches, community centers and other suitable locations.

### How Do I Become a Member and What Is the Cost?

Complete the membership application form found on page 27, and mail with your check to the address shown. The current annual membership fee is \$110. The membership period is for 12 months beginning with the month in which dues are paid.

### How Do I Register for Classes and Tours?

Complete a class registration form found on pages 23 and 25, listing the courses you wish to attend *in order of preference*. Mail to the LLI office with a self-addressed, stamped envelope and any applicable fees as soon as possible; **registration for classes closes December 22, 2010**. Registration forms received after that date will be considered only if there are spaces remaining in the courses you select. Your registration form will be mailed back to you in your self-addressed envelope shortly after the closing date, but in advance of the first class, indicating whether you have been accepted, wait-listed, or whether the class has been canceled. **As a courtesy to other LLI members, please call the Coordinator listed in the specific course description if you will not be able to attend part or all of a course after you have been accepted. This will give members on a waiting list an opportunity to attend.**

Registration for trips should be submitted on the separate forms provided. Please remember to sign the "Assumption of Risk and Acknowledgment of Responsibility" statement.

LLI courses are open only to those LLI members who have registered and been accepted into the course unless otherwise specified. **Please note that if you are wait-listed for a course, you are not “accepted” unless notified. The next time the course is offered, you must re-register but will be given priority acceptance.**

### What Is the Monthly Forum?

Members and non-members are warmly welcomed as guests to attend the Speakers Program and Open House Forum. The Forum is held monthly (except December and during the summer) at 10:00 a.m. in the Richard J. Ernst Community Cultural Center (see map on page 4) on the NOVA Annandale Campus (see page 5 for schedule). Persons attending these Forums should park in the garage on Center Drive next to the Ernst Center. There is a \$1.00 per hour charge to park in the garage.

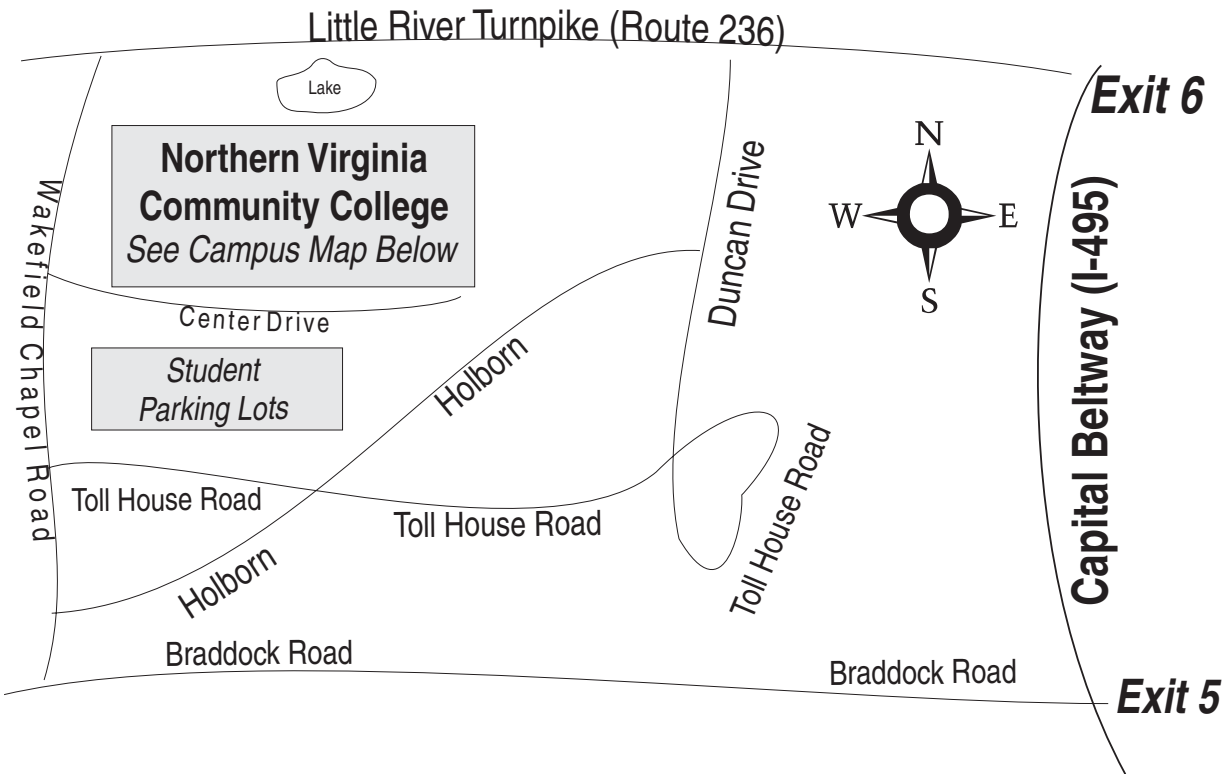

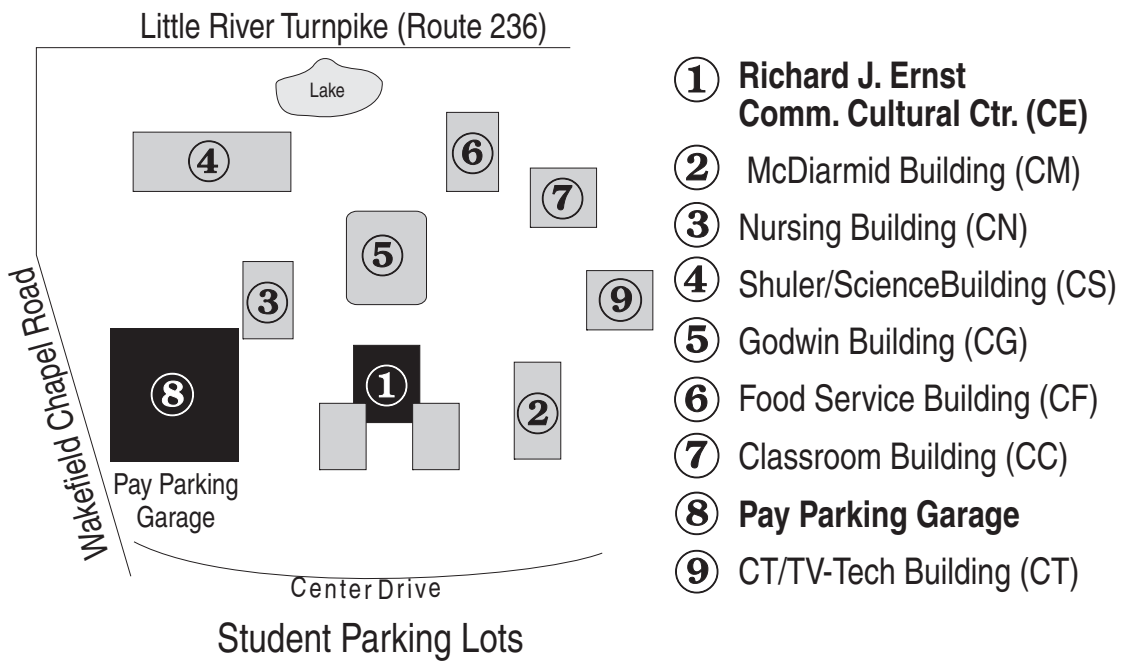

### Course 11W02A "A Splendid Little War" (8 Sessions)

In 1898, a mysterious explosion, a sea of media hyperbole, a vengeful Congress, and an excited populace pushed a reluctant American president into the Spanish American War. Just 33 years after the Civil War, old veterans of the blue and gray rallied beneath the Stars and Stripes of a reunited nation awash in patriotic fervor. Ambassador John Hay exalted in "a splendid little war" that extended the

American experiment into a new frontier called imperialism. In one of the faster and more glorious victories in military history, American Armed Forces vanquished the foe and elevated the United States to a global leadership role. This short war with its long shadow and unforgettable characters still generates debate and provides great insights into the American Nation as it entered its second century.

### Course 11W06A "Where Have You Gone, Joe DiMaggio?" (3 Sessions)

Once a game was played by unpampered unsophisticates who gained hero status with talent, not agents and strength-building trainers. See baseball when it was a game and remember your favorites as they are "Norman Rockwellized" by 8 and 16 mm home movies from players and family — movies taken between 1925 and 1965 and intended for those who remember heroes and those who want to. We will trace events bookended by the careers of The Babe (Ruth) and The Mick (Mantle). How did youth obtain its urge to spend pennies on baseball cards, save, swap and dream, and have the idea snatched by promoters?

**March 15** View the years of kids playing solo fantasy ball games on city streets and country lawns with stacks of baseball cards as reference. Big League baseball was not available west of Chicago and St. Louis. Hear excerpts from Don's hour-long 2010 interview with Hall of Fame pitcher, Senator Jim Bunning.

**March 22** Depression staggered baseball. Military service interrupted notable careers. Brooklyn integrated the roster, then moved to LA.

**March 29** Central Americans joined teams already integrated. Free agency enabled players to accept more money elsewhere but weakened fan loyalty. Baseball became an investment target and the original 16 teams were on their way to becoming the 30 teams we have today.

Have you ever thought of making a purchase on eBay but not known how to get started? Do you have treasures you would like to sell online but don't know where to begin? In four sessions, you can learn how to safely buy and sell on eBay. The course will provide an overview of eBay, the basics of getting started and registered as an eBay member, bidding and making a purchase on eBay, using PayPal as a secure way of exchanging money online, and preparing for and selling an item on eBay. You will learn how eBay works to provide a safe marketplace for buyers and sellers. You'll also be introduced to online and downloadable tools that can improve your use of the eBay website. **Note: This is the same class**

The Ragtime Years encompass 1896 to 1920. During this course, we will discuss the history, composers, pianists, and songs of this era. The course will be illustrated not only by lecture/CD, but also by samples of the music as played by our instructor on the piano! The course is based on the book *They All Played Ragtime* by Rudi Blesh and Harriet Janis. We'll also touch briefly on Ragtime today and present performers.

### Course 11W12P Papal History in a Nutshell (1 Session)

This one-session course gives a whirlwind tour of papal history through the eyes of one not a papal scholar. The subject will be treated from a historical—and not religious—perspective that paints broad themes. We'll figuratively meet popes great and small, holy and profane, brave and cowardly, and will get a sense of the circumstances of their time.

## Wednesday Mornings

### Course 11W13A Hitler's Atom Bomb—And Ours (1 Session)

In the decade between 1930 and 1940, the rise of fascism forced some prominent European physicists to flee to the United States. During World War II, in a race with Nazi Germany, these scientists were recruited to develop an "atom bomb," a course which

*The Railroad King! Conspicuous Consumption! World-famous Architects and Designers! Money with Significant Strings Attached!* Step back into the 1880's and hear the story of **the famous Garretts of Baltimore**, as told from the perspective of Mary Elizabeth Garrett, daughter of John Garrett, B & O Railroad magnate. Ms. Garrett was the wealthiest woman in America in 1884 and a woman well ahead of her time. Professional Tour Guide Mariann Millard, impersonating Ms. Garrett, will regale us on the bus ride from Annandale to Baltimore with stories of Ms. Garrett's father, her brothers and their wives, her friends, and the life she led as a wealthy, unmarried, and determined woman, starting as "Papa's Secretary" during the Golden Age of the Railroad.

In addition to driving by several sites in Baltimore connected with the railroad industry and the Garrett family, we will have docent-led tours of both the **Garrett-Jacobs Mansion** and the **Evergreen House**, two fabulous creations of the Garretts during the Gilded Age. The Garrett-Jacobs Mansion, located at Mount Vernon Square, was designed by architects Stanford White and John Russell Pope and vies for opulence with our own Indonesian Embassy (once the home of Evalyn Walsh McLean, which LLI visited two years ago). **A sumptuous buffet** will be served at

the Garrett-Jacobs Mansion featuring a chef's choice of hot entrees, starch and vegetable sides, as well as soups, salads, desserts, water, iced tea and coffee. After lunch, we will tour Evergreen House, on the National Register of Historic Places, which sits on 26 beautifully landscaped acres. This opulent 48-room, 19th Century Italianate mansion is filled with decorative art and rare books and includes works by Picasso, Degas, Dufy, et al., and contains much Tiffany art glass. **Note: Tour requires some stair climbing and multiple bus embark/debarkations.**
