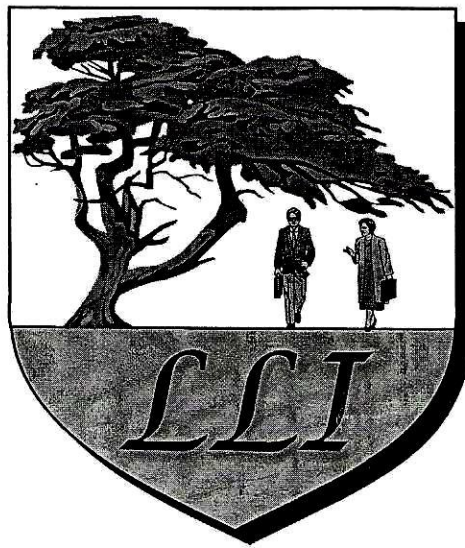

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How Are the Courses Organized?

Courses generally consist of one to ten 90-minute sessions, are informal, and frequently include group discussion. They are taught by outside faculty and by your fellow LLI members. Most courses are free to members, but some include assigned reading and purchase of a textbook, or require a small materials fee.

When Are the Classes and Where?

Classes are offered throughout the year, subdivided into Winter/Spring, Summer, and Fall semesters. They are typically held on weekdays between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. The courses are held on the NVCC Annandale campus and off-campus in churches, community centers and other suitable locations.

How Do I Become a Member and What is the Cost?

Complete the membership application form found on pages 27 and and mail with your check to the address shown. The current annual membership fee is \$100. The membership

period is for 12 months beginning with the month in which dues are paid.

How Do I Register for Classes and Tours?

Complete a class registration form found on pages 23 and 25, listing the courses you wish to attend *in order of preference*. Mail to the LLI office with a self-addressed stamped envelope and any applicable fees as soon as possible; *registration for classes closes January 3, 2005*. Registration forms received after that date will be considered only if there are spaces remaining in the courses you select. Your registration form will be mailed back to you in your self-addressed envelope shortly after the closing date, but in advance of the first class, indicating whether you have been accepted, wait-listed, or whether the class has been canceled. As a courtesy to other LLI members, please call the LLI office at (703) 503-0600 if you find that you will not be able to attend a course after you have been accepted. This will give members on a waiting list an opportunity to attend.

Registration for trips should be submitted on the separate forms provided. Please remember to sign the "Assumption of Risk and Acknowledgment of Responsibility" statement.

Monthly Forums

Members and non-members are warmly welcomed as guests to attend the Monday Speakers Program and Open House forum. The forums are held monthly (except during the summer) on the first Monday at 10:00 a.m. in the Richard J. Ernst Community Cultural Center (see map on next page) on the NVCC Annandale Campus. For more information, call the LLI office (703) 503-0600, and also see information in the LLI monthly newsletter, Golden Gazette and other local publications. Persons attending these forums should park in the Cultural Center lot near the front of the Ernst Center. Look for temporary signs reading "LLI Parking."

Class Cancellations

If there is inclement weather, LLI classes and other activities are canceled (**except for bus tours**) if the Fairfax County school system cancels school for the day, *regardless of the LLI class location and whether or not NVCC holds its regular college classes*. Listen for radio and TV announcements. LLI morning classes are canceled if the County announces a 2-hour delay in class openings. LLI afternoon classes are canceled if the County announces early dismissal. You will be notified of a schedule for "make-up" classes. For bus tours, please contact the tour leader (listed in the program booklet).

Directions to Class Locations — Winter/Spring 2005

Annandale United Methodist Church is located at 6935 Columbia Pike in Annandale.

Directions from the Beltway

Drive east on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Proceed through 5 traffic lights and go into the left lane. At the next traffic light (Backlick Road), which is at the intersection where Fuddrucker's restaurant is located on the left and a Mobil service station is on the right, take a left onto Backlick Road and bear right

immediately. You will go only a short block and after passing a Jiffy Lube, turn right onto Columbia Pike. Drive to the second traffic light which is at Gallows Road where you will see a small old white church on the right. Proceed just beyond the traffic light and turn right into the parking lot. Enter the brick church through the main entrance and look for signs.

Carlyle House, 121 N. Fairfax St., Alexandria.

Directions from the Beltway (I-495)

East on I-495 (which becomes I-495 East/I-95 North after crossing over Shirley Highway, I-395). Exit onto Rt. 1 North. Right onto King St. Left onto N. Fairfax St.

Chapel Square Center, 4401 Holborn Avenue, Annandale.

Directions from Little River Turnpike

Turn onto Wakefield Chapel Road and pass the NVCC campus to Toll House Road (third street on the left after passing the campus parking lot). Left onto Toll House Road to the first stop sign, Holborn Avenue. Left onto Holborn and go over a rise in the street. Chapel Square Center, a former elementary school, is on the left just beyond an athletic field. Park at the far end of the building or on Holborn Avenue. Enter through the main doors — Room 3 is the first room on the first left-hand corridor. Room 5 is the third room on this corridor.

Directions from Braddock Road

Turn onto Wakefield Chapel Road to the fourth right turn, Holborn Avenue. Continue on Holborn through the stop sign at Toll House Road. See directions above.

Claude Moore Farm, 6310 Georgetown Pike, McLean.

Directions from the Beltway (I-495)

Take Exit 44 (Georgetown Pike, Rt. 193) east toward Langley. Go about 2 miles and turn left onto Colonial Farm Rd. The Farm parking lot is the third left turn off Colonial Farm Rd.

Colvin Run Mill, 10017 Colvin Run Rd., Great Falls.

Directions from the Beltway (I-495)

Take Exit 47A (Leesburg Pike, Rt. 7) west 5 miles, past Tysons Corner, to a right turn on Colvin Run Rd. The mill is on your left. Turn left into the paved parking lot 500 feet beyond the gravel drive to the mill.

Fairfax Museum and Visitors' Center, 10209 Main St., Fairfax.

From the NVCC Annandale campus, proceed west on Little River Turnpike (Route 236), which changes name to Main Street in Fairfax City. The Museum is located on Main St. between the intersections with Locust Ave. and East St./Old Lee Hwy. next door to Gold's Gym and across the street from the new Main Street Market Place (Harris Teeter, TJ Maxx, etc.)

The Falls Church Presbyterian Church is located at 225 East Broad Street, Falls Church.

Directions from Beltway

Take Arlington Boulevard (Route 50) to Route 7 West at Seven Corners. Proceed west on Route 7, which is called Broad Street in the city of Falls Church. Drive several blocks to Fairfax Street North. Turn right and then left into the parking lot at the rear of the church. Enter door at back of the church.

FCAC, Channel 10, Merrifield.

Directions from the Beltway (I-495)

West at exit 50A, Arlington Blvd. (Rt. 50). Stay right and turn right onto Gallows Rd. Proceed to the third traffic light, getting into the left lane. (Crown gas station is on the right and U-Haul Rental is on the left.) Turn left just after the U-Haul onto Strawberry Lane (no street sign), which goes straight into the complex for the Arlington Blvd. Multiplex movie theaters. At the stop sign in front of the movie theaters, turn right. At the end of the parking lot, before the sign for the movie theaters and the center divider island, turn left onto the access road that parallels Lee Hwy. (Rt. 29). Turn left at the next street, Eskridge Rd. (There are tool rentals on both corners.) FCAC, Channel 10, is near the end of the street in the last brick building on the left. (There is a sign for Channel 10 high on the 2-story building.) Park in any YELLOW parking space marked either FPA or V. Carpool if you can.

Fred Packard Center, 4022 Hummer Rd., Annandale
(located in Annandale Community Park).

Directions from the NVCC Campus

East on Little River Tpke. (Rt. 236) to the first light INSIDE the Beltway, which is Heritage Dr. to the south and Hummer Rd. to the north. Turn left onto Hummer Rd. Go about two blocks, passing a townhouse development on the left. When you see a wooded area on your left, watch for a driveway into the park. Turn left into the park at that driveway (there is a large brown sign that says Packard Center) and follow the road to the right, up a hill to a parking lot in front of the Packard Center, a red brick building that looks like a house. Go straight through the craft gallery in the lobby and down the hall to the large conference room to your right.

Goodwin House West, 3440 South Jefferson Street, Falls Church
(across Route 7, Leesburg Pike, from the Skyline Center complex).

Since visitor parking is limited at Goodwin House West, you are encouraged to park behind the Giant Food Store located in the "Crossroads Place" Shopping Center.

Directions from Bailey's Crossroads (Intersection of Columbia Pike and Leesburg Pike)

East on Route 7, Leesburg Pike; left at the traffic light at South Jefferson Street. South Jefferson Street is located between the "Crossroads Place" and "Leesburg Pike Plaza" shopping centers. Go to the first traffic light and turn left into the parking lot of the "Crossroads Place Shopping Center" where there are several stores, including Burlington Coat Factory and Giant Food. Drive to the left side of Giant Food; turn right at the corner of the store and park in one of the spaces along a fence line. A gate with a "Private Property" sign will be unlocked. Go through the gate to the main entrance of Goodwin House West (a 12-story brick building). It is only a short walk!

Great Falls National Park, VA is located at the intersection of Old Dominion Drive and Georgetown Pike (Route 193).

You can choose one of two routes to the Park:

Directions from the Beltway (Route 495) and Old Dominion Drive.

Proceeding on the Beltway toward Baltimore (and the American Legion Bridge), exit onto Route 123 North (Dolley Madison Blvd.), Proceed through three (3) traffic signals to the intersection of Route 123 and Old Dominion Drive (the fourth traffic signal). Turn left onto Old Dominion Drive until you reach the intersection with Georgetown Pike (you will encounter one "fork in the road", at which you will bear left). The Park entrance will be directly in front of you. Proceed into the Park's entrance until you encounter a Ranger station. Once past the Ranger Station, continue driving in the same direction. Turn into the first parking lot on your right.

Directions from the Beltway (Route 495)

Take 495 toward Baltimore (and the American Legion Bridge) Exit at Route 193 West (Georgetown Pike) and proceed on Georgetown Pike to the intersection with Old Dominion Drive (on your left at the only traffic light since crossing over the Beltway). Turn right into the Park's entrance. Proceed until you encounter a Ranger station. Once past the Ranger Station, continue driving in the same direction. Turn into the first parking lot on your right.

NOTE: Georgetown Pike is a narrow, curvy (sometimes very much so) two lane road. Although it is also very scenic, you might be more comfortable taking the previous route.

Green Spring Gardens Park, 4603 Green Spring Road,
Alexandria.

Directions to the new park entrance from I-495 (the Beltway)

Take Little River Turnpike east 3.5 miles; turn left onto Braddock Road. Drive 2/10 miles and turn right onto Witch Hazel Road to the parking lots.

Greenspring Village, 7440 Spring Village Drive, Springfield.

Directions from Annandale

At the intersection of Little River Turnpike and Backlick Road, go south on Backlick Road. Follow Backlick Road for approximately four miles to the sign for Franconia-Springfield Parkway (Route 7900). Take the first right onto the Parkway, going west. At the first traffic light turn right onto Spring Village Drive. At the guard gate, inform the attendant that you are attending a "Lifetime Learning Institute" class. Park in a visitor's space at the "Hunters Crossing" complex, which is on the left of the Chapel.

Directions from Braddock Road

From Kings Park Shopping Center drive south on Rolling Road for four miles to the Franconia-Springfield Parkway (Route 7900). Exit left at the second traffic light for the Parkway south. Continue one mile; turn left at the traffic light onto Spring Village Drive. At the guard gate, follow the directions above.

Gunston Hall

Directions from the Beltway (I-495)

Take I-95 South to Exit 163. Turn left onto Lorton Rd. Turn right onto Armistead Rd. At the light, turn right onto Rt. 1 South. At the 3rd light, turn left onto Gunston Rd. (SR 242). The Gunston Hall entrance is 3.5 miles on the left.

Little River United Church of Christ, 8410 Little River Turnpike, Annandale.

Directions from the Beltway

West on Little River Turnpike (Route 236) to the second traffic light (you will see the NVCC campus on the left). Turn right at the light and follow the road to the church parking lot.

Directions from Wakefield Chapel Road

Turn right onto Little River Turnpike (Route 236) and get into the left lane. Turn left at the first traffic light and follow the road to the church parking lot.

Mason District Governmental Center, 6507 Columbia Pike, Annandale.

Directions from the Beltway

East on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Turn left onto John Marr Drive (next light after passing Giant Food on the left). Turn right at the next light, which is Columbia Pike. Go through several traffic lights. Following the traffic light at the intersection with Whispering Lane, there is a sign in the median reading "Fairfax County Police Station." Proceed a short distance and turn right into the parking lot of the Center.

Meadowlark Botanical Gardens located on Beulah Road, Vienna.

Directions from the Beltway (I-495 toward Baltimore)

Exit onto Route 123 South (Chain Bridge Road.); pass Tyson's Corner Center on your left and Tyson's II on your right. Continue on Route 123 to the intersection with Old Courthouse Road (traffic light), and turn right. Immediately move into the left lane and then turn left at the next traffic light where Old Courthouse Road turns left. Continue on Old Courthouse Road for 2.3 miles to a four-way stop sign and intersection with Beulah Road. Proceed straight ahead (which is now Beulah Road) for 0.8 miles to Meadowlark Gardens on your left; turn into Meadowlark Court and parking lot.

NVCC Campus Buildings

(Refer to campus map on p. 4.)

Parking for all Campus Classes and Activities: PLEASE PARK IN THE LOT RESERVED FOR THE CULTURAL CENTER (THE LOT WITH THE ARM-TYPE GATES). If the gate is closed, push the button in the yellow box for entry. You will receive a token at the class to be used for exiting, or the exit gate will be raised by the time the class session ends.

Ernst Community Cultural Center (CE), also called the NVCC Cultural Center, Annandale Campus, building marked "1" on the map. The Forum is the large open space (with fireplace) on the mezzanine level. Seminar rooms are on the mezzanine level adjacent to the Forum. The Dance Room is located on the first floor behind the elevator.

NVCC Food Service Building (CF), marked "6" on the map, Chestnut Hill Room. Enter on plaza level. Turn left through the Faculty Dining Room.

NVCC McDiarmid Building (CM), marked "2" on the map.

NVCC Shuler/Science Building (CS), marked "4" on the map. The LLI office is in this building (Room 238).

St. Matthew's United Methodist Church, 8617 Little River Turnpike, Annandale.

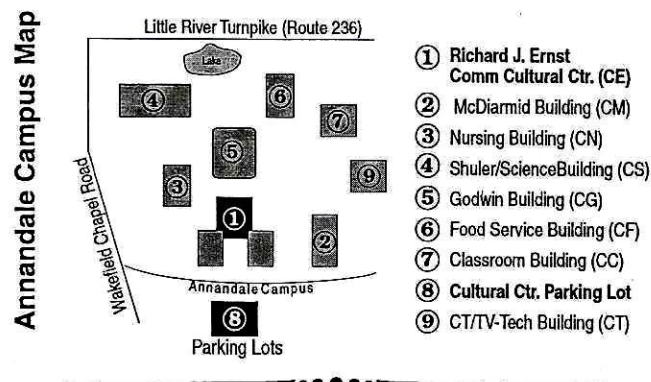
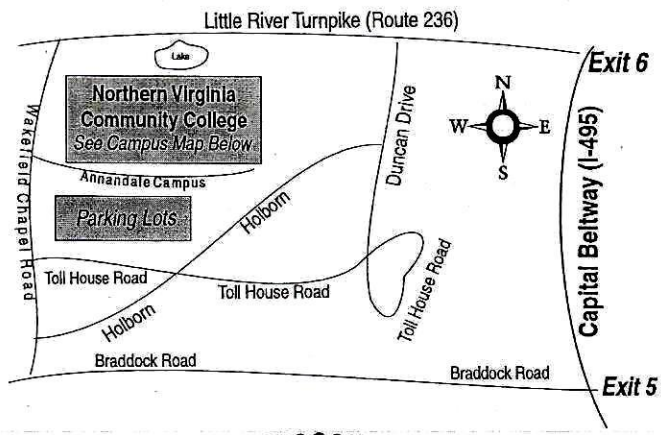
Directions from the Beltway

West on Little River Turnpike (Route 236). Pass the NVCC campus and Wakefield Chapel Road (second and third traffic lights). Take the next left (which does not have a traffic light) onto Wakefield Drive; immediately turn right and then left into the church parking lot. Park in spaces near the left-hand side of the church since you will be entering the building through a basement door on the left side.

Directions from Braddock Road going East

Turn left onto Wakefield Chapel Road. Continue for approximately 1.3 miles (passing NVCC on the right) and turn left onto Virginia Avenue. At the stop sign turn right onto Wakefield Drive and then turn left into the church parking lot.

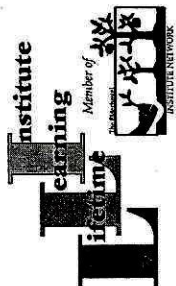
