Coral Reefs: Their Importance, Their Challenges, and Possible Solutions

Half a billion people around the world depend on coral reefs for food, their livelihoods, and shelter from natural disasters. A quarter of all marine species depend upon coral reefs for food and shelter.

Yet coral reefs face unprecedented challenges and destruction due to climate change, acidification, pollution, and other factors. Our presenter, **Dr. Madhavi Colton**, will address these issues in a Zoom presentation from California.

Dr. Colton, who holds a PhD in Marine Ecology from the University of Melbourne, Australia, is an accomplished conservation scientist who is focused on helping the world's ecosystems cope with the effects of climate change.

She believes that coral reefs—one of the world's most threatened ecosystems —can be saved for generations to come. Through her research, she has developed a new approach to conservation that will help reefs around the world adapt to the effects of climate change.

As executive director of the Coral Reef Alliance (CORAL), Dr. Colton is turning this science into action by building alliances across environmental, scientific, and political sectors.

CORAL is a non-profit, environmental NGO whose mission is to save the world's coral reefs. It works collaboratively with communities worldwide to reduce direct threats to reefs in ways that provide long-term benefits to people and wildlife.



In parallel, CORAL is actively expanding the scientific understanding of how corals adapt to climate change and is applying this information to give reefs the best chance to thrive. CORAL's broad expertise uniquely positions it to rally the conservation community around scalable and effective solutions for coral reefs around the world.

As climate impacted reefs, CORAL realized that it had to do more to achieve its mission to save coral reefs; it had to start acting both locally and globally. CORAL launched a pioneering research project to define a science-based, global solution that would save reefs and preserve their benefits for people and wildlife. With knowledge from this research project, CORAL created an innovative approach called

Adaptive Reefscapes that optimizes environmental conditions to allow corals to adapt.

Dr. Colton says her personal mission is to help the world's ecosystems cope with the effects of climate change. To achieve this, she applies scientific expertise to discover answers to our biggest environmental challenges, and emphasizes communication skills and high emotional intelligence to build collaborations with conservation practitioners, resource users. managers, funders, and policymakers to implement durable conservation solutions. She launched and secured more than \$2 million in funding for a multi-institutional research program that is articulating what can be done to help ecosystems adapt to the effects of climate change. She has directed three multiinstitution, interdisciplinary research projects to improve resource management and deepened the field's understanding of evolutionary rescue and ecological resilience.



President's Message

Your LLI/NOVA Board convened for a full day on July 15 at our annual Board retreat. We decided to use a hybrid mix

of live and Zoom classes for our fall session. NOVA will be open for in-person classes, and we will follow all school, CDC and governmental guidelines. As of Friday, August 5, face coverings will be required on campus regardless of vaccination status.

We are still waiting to hear which of our offcampus class sites will allow us to offer programs. Because of our age demographic, we will respond conservatively to reopening in all of our class locations.

At the retreat, the Board also decided to create a Membership Outreach Committee. This committee will incorporate our publicity/marketing and social media (we now have Facebook and Twitter accounts) efforts. We brainstormed ideas for membership growth and retention; appointed committee chairs; reviewed our committee structure, membership and charts of work; and approved several board reports.

Another initiative that resulted from this year's Board Retreat is to recruit members onto our committees. Most of the programs and services that LLI/NOVA offers are made possible by the work of our committees. Participating on a committee not only enriches LLI/NOVA, but also provides wonderful socialization opportunities for participants. Please read on.....



Our selection this month is "Simon the Fiddler," a historical novel by Paulette Jiles. The setting is Texas, during the last days of the Civil War. Here we are








Social Hosts for Foreign Students at NOVA Needed Now!

Register no later than September 17, 2021

LLI/NOVA members have a unique opportunity to get to know 36 visiting students from 11 developing countries under the U.S. Department of State's Community College Initiative (CCI) Program, administered by NOVA. The students receive a full scholarship to spend up to one academic year at a U.S. community college.

The students hope to strengthen their English language proficiency and to immerse themselves in the culture and day-to-day life of Americans. They plan to participate in community volunteer service projects, thereby enhancing local host communities. They also will serve as leaders on their host campuses and make public presentations as part of International Education Week and other community engagement activities.

After completing the CCI Program, participants return home with a deeper understanding of U.S. culture and new skills, and are expected to contribute to the social and economic development of their home countries.

There are several opportunities for LLI/NOVA members to get to know these students on a personal level and to hear about the situations they faced for an opportunity to learn in the United States. This is a chance to engage with these students while their impressions of our culture are fresh. As Mark Twain said: "Travel is fatal to prejudice, bigotry, and narrow-mindedness, and many of our people need it sorely on these accounts. Broad, wholesome, charitable views of men and things cannot be acquired by vegetating in one little corner of the earth all one's lifetime."

LLI/NOVA's eight "Fireside Chats" will be held on Sundays from 7:00 – 8:30 p.m.; each session features a deep dive on the students' home country beginning with a country overview PowerPoint presentation by the students before the LLI/NOVA host opens the event for interactive discussion.
