




Science

is a systematic enterprise that builds and organizes knowledge in the form of testable explanations and predictions.





- ✓ It's published by a reputable journal.
- ✓ Relevant experience and qualifications
- ✓ It's part of a larger body of work (<u>RE</u>SEARCH)
- ✓ It doesn't promise a panacea or miraculous cure
- ✓ It uses a reasonable, representative sample size




Nature has space to publish only 8% of the 200 papers submitted each week. Its selection criteria are rigorous:

- Reach a conclusion of interest to an interdisciplinary readership.








- ☐ WASHIING HANDS IN HOSPITALS (1847)
 - Joseph Lister, pioneer of sanitary practices, toured the US in 1876,
 - five years before Garfield's assassination.

GOOD SCIENCE

- ☐ MMR VACCINE DISCOVERED (1971)
 - American microbiologist Maurice Hilleman combines the measles, mumps and rubella vaccines to create the first vaccine using live virus strains.
- ☐ COLD FUSION GOES COLD (1989)
 - Martin Fleischmann and Stanley Pons' alleged breakthrough on a nuclear reaction at room temperature and the hopes of cheap, renewable energy is debunked.

 BAD SCIENCE
- ☐ MMR VACCINE FALSELY LINKED TO AUTISM (1998)

British gastroenterologist Andrew Wakefield publishes a research paper falsely linking MMR to the autism. While his claims were discredited and he's since been banned from the UK medical register, the damage has been irreversible, as some parents still refuse to vaccinate their kids.







I Just Want to Believe



"Many people quite simply just want to believe," said Brian Cronk, a professor of psychology at Missouri Western State University. "The human brain is always trying to determine why things happen, and when the reason is not clear, we tend to make up some pretty bizarre explanations."

In a 2006 study, researchers found a surprising number of college students believe in psychics, witches, telepathy, channeling and a host of other questionable ideas.

A full 40 percent said they believe houses can be haunted. (Bryan Farha, Gary Steward, Jr.)


If you wonder why worldwide scientific consensus hasn't yet quashed climate change denial in the United States, a panel at Harvard Kennedy School (Feb. 2014) offered an answer: **It's the politics, stupid.**

Persistent efforts to cast doubt on a scientific certainty have their roots in philosophical opposition to big government and government regulation, expressed in a fierce, expertly managed, well-funded campaign, participants said.


Science denial is an **expression of identity** – usually in the face of perceived threats to the social and economic status quo – and it typically manifests in response to elite messaging.



"Xroad") are steadily being replaced by little pictures to make them internationally legible and incidentally to help those who know how to drive a

What shall we do about it?

We might begin by asking ourselves whether ignorance is so wonderful after all, and whether it makes sense to denounce "elitism."


I believe that every human being with a physically normal brain can learn a great deal and can be surprisingly intellectual. I believe that what we badly need is social approval of learning and social rewards for learning.

We can all be members of the intellectual elite and then, and only then, will a phrase like "America's right to know" and, indeed, any true concept of democracy, have any meaning.



People are so desperate for jobs they don't want to rock the boat. They don't want rules and regulations enforced that might cost them their livelihoods. For them, a job is precious — sometimes even more precious than a safe workplace or safe drinking water.








He has promoted pseudoscience, and alternative medicine, and has been criticized by physicians, government officials, and publications, including Popular Science and The New Yorker, for endorsing unproven products and non-scientific advice. The British Medical Journal published a study that found more than half of the recommendations on medical talk series including The Dr. Oz Show had either no evidence or contradicted medical research.

SERIOUS SCIENCE DENIAL

- ✓ AIDS AIDS denialism is the denial that the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) is the cause of acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS).
- ✓ COVID-19 Refers those who deny the reality of the COVID-19 pandemic or, at the very least, deny that deaths are happening in the manner or proportions scientifically recognized by WHO.
- ✓ Climate change ExxonMobil has contributed to "fake citizens' groups and bogus scientific bodies" that claim that the science of global warming is inconclusive.
- ✓ Evolution. Many fundamentalists teach creationism that include the belief in the global flood myth, geocentrism, and that the Earth is 6,000— 10,000 years old.
- ✓ Flat Earth Modern flat-Earthers dismiss all spaceflights and images from space as hoaxes and accuse organizations and private citizens of conspiring to "hide the truth".





- In brief, the central conspiracy theory of the antivaccine movement is that not only are vaccines dangerous (and, in many cases, ineffective) but that "they" are hiding the evidence of that harm and ineffectiveness.

- All done in an effort to protect the profits of these industries and the authority of governmental agencies and the medical profession.



- 1. Conspiracy theories: Propose that a complex and secretive conspiracy accounts for an overwhelming body of scientific evidence and consensus.
- **2. Fake experts:** Highlight views inconsistent with established knowledge, often complemented by denigration of established experts, including questioning credentials, integrity, and motives.
- **3. Cherry-pick data:** Draw on isolated papers that challenge the consensus view and neglect the broader body of research supported by hundreds of papers.
- **4.** Impossible expectations for research: Set unrealistic standards for data that invalidate an entire body of research.
- **5. Misrepresentation of opposition viewpoints**: Employ logical fallacies, including an appeal to personal freedom or other core values.

Decades of Science Denial Related to Climate Change Has Led to Denial of the Coronavirus Pandemic

- ☐ After the fossil fuel industry spent hundreds of millions of dollars attacking climate scientists it isn't hard to understand how pandemic denial happened.
- □ A 2016 survey by the Pew Research Center found that fewer than 30 percent of Americans understood that the vast majority of climate scientists and peer-reviewed studies support the conclusion that climate change is a human created threat.

Confirmation Bias

Tendency to search for, interpret, focus on, and remember information in a way that confirms one's preconceptions.

- **Backfire Effect**: Reaction to disconfirming evidence by strengthening one's previous beliefs.
- Continued Influence Effect: Tendency to believe previously learned misinformation even after it has been corrected.



Believe that the seasons are a result of the Earth moving closer to or further from the sun.

The real answer, scientists say, is that as Earth's axis is tilted with respect to its orbit, when on its journey it is angled inward, the sun rises higher in the sky, and that results in more direct sunlight, longer days, and warmer temperatures. Distance plays no role; we are actually closest to the sun in the dead of winter, during the first week of January.












Plot of different U.S. faiths and denominations based on their members' views about both the reality of specifically human evolution, and also how much they favor "stricter environmental laws and regulations."

Some US bishops discourage Catholics from getting Johnson & Johnson vaccine if others are available (3/3/2021)

- As officials and health experts race to get Americans vaccinated against Covid-19, some Catholic bishops have weighed in to discourage Church members from getting the latest, single-shot vaccine from Johnson & Johnson when alternatives are available.
- The US Conference of Catholic Bishops, as well as at least 6 other dioceses from across the country have released statements expressing "moral concerns" over the shot due to its use of lab-grown cells that descend from cells taken in the 1980s from the tissue of aborted fetuses.


No COVID-19 vaccine contains cells from aborted fetuses.

mRNA vaccines (Pfizer and Moderna)
are synthetic vaccines, sequenced on a computer in a lab,
and do not use fetal cell lines in their production.

The AstraZeneca/Oxford University vaccine makes use of cell lines replicated from an aborted fetus in 1973, but does not itself contain fetal cells.




We all self-justify as a way to protect against cognitive dissonance, whether positively or negatively.


Prejudices diminish under less economic competition, when truces are signed, when professions are integrated; basically when we are in a position to realize they aren't that different from us.




ClientEarth is calling on policymakers to ban all fossil fuel company ads unless they come with tobacco-style health warnings about the risks of global heating to people and the planet.

Its lawyers lodged a complaint in 2019 alleging that BP's advertising campaigns had misled the public by focusing on the company's low carbon energy products, when more than 96% of its annual spend was on oil and gas. In February 2020, BP withdrew the ads before the complaint was assessed. ClientEarth said it was now putting other fossil fuel companies on notice over greenwashing adverts.



- ☐ The scale of the oil and gas industry's advertising efforts has historically tracked with politicians' interest in taking action on the climate crisis.
- Spending shot up around 1997, when countries were considering the Kyoto Protocol, an attempt to set legally binding cuts on greenhouse gas emissions.
- ☐ The peak of oil companies' ad blitz occurred in 2010, when Congress was mulling over a national cap-and-trade program (that ultimately didn't pass).

Nicki Minaj sparked a social media storm on Monday night after she tweeted about her cousin's hesitancy to get vaccinated against the coronavirus, setting off a slew of critiques that she was spreading coronavirus misinformation. Minaj tweeted that her cousin in Trinidad, where the singer and rapper is from, "won't get the vaccine cuz his friend got it & became impotent. His testicles became swollen." Medical experts have said that claims about infertility linked to vaccinations are unsubstantiated. "There are stories out there on the Internet about how vaccination can lead to infertility. There's absolutely nothing to that," Francis Collins, director of the **National Institutes of Health, told The Washington** Post earlier this year.
