Inside the Udvar-Hazy Space Center

Colonel Scott A. Willey, USAF (Ret.), a long-time docent at the National Air and Space Museum's Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center, will provide an overview of the huge Smithsonian facility near Dulles International Airport.

He will focus on the five artifacts that, over the years, have generated the most awe: the Lockheed SR-71 Blackbird reconnaissance aircraft; the Anglo-French Concorde supersonic airliner; the Space Shuttle orbiter Discovery; Boeing's 367-80, the technology demonstrator for the 707; and the Boeing B-29 Superfortress Enola Gay.





A native Californian and a graduate of San Jose State College, Col. Willey began his

career in 1968 and served in a variety of command and staff positions from the squadron and system program office level through the Office of Secretary of Defense. As part of the Strategic Air Command, he spearheaded the inair refueling program for the KC-10 airplane.

Col. Willey started with the Museum as a docent at its storage and restoration facility in 1977. From 1996 to 2018 he also served as a volunteer restorer on projects including the historic Goodyear blimp control car, the Apollo Telescope Mount from Skylab, and the B-29 Enola Gay. He co-authored NASM Docent Guides on Aircraft, Space, Propulsion, and Armament.

Col. Willey holds a BS in Industrial Engineering; an MS in Systems Management; and is a graduate, former faculty member, and dean of the National Defense University. In addition to his teaching experience, he has authored several magazine articles, helped teach several courses at Colgate University (e.g., "Advent of the Atomic Bomb"), and for nearly 20 years has been the book review editor for the Air Force Historical Foundation's Air Power History journal.

LLI COVID-19 Policy

Effective immediately, all attendees at in-person LLI functions, including



classes, forums, and excursions must show proof of full vaccination (at least 14 days since the second shot of Pfizer or Moderna, or at least 14 days since the Johnson & Johnson shot) and masks shall be worn and must cover the wearer's nose and mouth for the duration of the event. Gators or face shields are not acceptable substitutes for a face mask. Exceptions to comply with local guidance where compliance with this policy would be impractical (i.e., "Foodies and Friends" and "Visual and Performing Arts") are permissible at the group leader's discretion.

Instructors/presenters are required to comply with the vaccination requirement but may remove their face mask while presenting. An empty row at the front of the classroom will be established to maintain additional distance from the presenter.



Foodies and Friends

Our Mom Eugenia, 2985 District Ave., Suite 185 Mosaic District, Fairfax



We're gastronomically headed to the sunny islands of Greece at Our Mom Eugenia, located in the Mosaic District on

Gallows Road. The owners proudly say this restaurant is named after their mother as a token of appreciation for everything she has done over the years. Head Chef Eugenia learned the secrets of Greek cuisine from her grandmother for whom she was named. She was most recently a chef at Nostos in Tysons Corner, where she worked since it opened in 2011.

Chef Eugenia's dishes have received glowing reviews from Tom Sietsema of The Washington Post and several food blogs. Tom says: "There are two more staples of the Greek kitchen I always look forward to: soft string beans in tomato sauce and crisp-tender roast potatoes, typically served as companions to entrees. The keys to nailing the latter are slow roasting and seasonings including oregano, rosemary, olive oil and lemon in particular. (Where would Greek food be without lemons?)."

The restaurant addresses the social climate abroad with a chalkboard quote in the foyer: "Despite the horrible inequities in Greece, charity, generosity, kindness, sympathy, spontaneity are virtues which Greeks as a whole possess to a high degree."

Free parking is available behind the restaurant in the enclosed ground level parking lot. Enter on Merrifield Cinema Drive.
