When You Arrive

- Make your initial visit to any National Archives location, even those with extended hours
 - during weekday business hours
 - as early in the day as possible
- Archivists whose help is needed to begin research usually are not available during evenings or weekends. A late afternoon visit may not allow enough time for records to be identified and retrieved from the stack areas for use on that day.
- When you come to one of our locations to look at records, you will usually be issued a researcher identification card.
- During your research visit, keep good notes as to records consulted so that you can differentiate between multiple groups of records searched, and your steps can be retraced if necessary.
- Anyone can use the National Archives. You do not need to be an American citizen or to present permission from the Research Center Branch Chief and are accompanied by a parent or guardian. credentials or a letter of recommendation. Read about Regulations for using the National Archives.
- You need to be <u>14 years old to do research</u> at the National Archives, unless you receive permission from the Research Center Branch Chief and are accompanied by a parent or guardian. credentials or a letter of recommendation. Read about Regulations for using the National Archives.
- Read about <u>Security Procedures</u> at our Washington, DC and College Park, MD locations.
- New researchers at the National Archives Building in Washington, DC and the National Archives at College Park will view a PowerPoint <u>orientation presentation</u> before receiving a researcher card.

Military Records Holdings in Washington, D.C.

The National Archives Building in Washington, D.C., holds records relating to:

Military service performed by persons serving during an emergency and whose service was considered to be in the Federal interest, 1775 - 1902
Enlisted personnel, 1789 - October 31, 1912 Officers, 1789 - June 30, 1917
Enlisted personnel, 1798 - 1885 Officers, 1798 - 1902
Enlisted personnel, 1798 - 1904 Some officers, 1798 - 1895
Persons who served in predecessor agencies to the U.S. Coast Guard: the Revenue Cutter Service (Revenue Marine), the Life-Saving Service, and the Lighthouse Service, 1791 - 1919
Persons who rendered military service for the Confederate States government in its armed forces, 1861 - 1865
Claims files for pensions based on Federal military service, 1775 - 1916 and Bounty land warrant application files relating to claims based on wartime service, 1775 - 1855

Ordering Copies

To order military service records from Washington, D.C., <u>order online</u> or the <u>NATF</u> Form 86.

Copies of military pension claim files for military service from the American Revolution up to before World War I and bounty-land warrant applications for Federal military service before 1856 can now be **ordered online**, as well as through <u>NATF Form 85</u>.

The <u>National Archives Catalog</u> contains descriptions for NARA's nationwide holdings in the Washington, DC area; regional facilities; and Presidential Libraries. The catalog is a work in progress and currently contains descriptions for 79% of our records.

Keep in mind that the catalog does not contain descriptions for all files and items that include individuals' names; however, the National Archives still might have records about your ancestors.

The online catalog contains many descriptions of records of interest to genealogists and family historians, including:

- applications for enrollment in Native American tribes
- court records
- fugitive slave cases
- land records
- military personnel records
- naturalization records

How Do I Search in the National Archives Catalog?

The online catalog contains descriptions of records held by the National Archives. Researchers can conduct keyword searches and filtered searched in the catalog.

To perform a simple keyword search:

- a. Go to http://www.archives.gov/research/catalog/
- b. Enter [some keywords of your choice] in the Keywords box in the center of the

- page. For example: "bounty land"
- c. Press the **Search** button.
- d. When hits are returned for your search, the results will be grouped in categories online holdings and/or description only. Select "View all Online Holdings" or "View all Description Only".
- e. In either category, view the full result of your hit by selecting the Title link.

Tips for Searching for an Individual's Name

- Search on **the person's full name** in first name-last name order.
- Search on *the surname only*. The records might only include a first initial or a variant spelling of the first name.
- Search on variant spellings of the surname, for example: Luchetti OR Lucetti.
- Search on **variant spellings of the first name**, including "Americanized" versions, for example: Joseph Maggio OR Guiseppe Maggio.
- Keep in mind that the online catalog does not contain descriptions for all file units and items that include individuals' names. However, the National Archives still might have records about your ancestors.
