January 4: Join us on Zoom for a behind-the-scenes look at the life of a delegate to the Virginia House of Delegates. Fairfax's own Vivian Watts will give us a first-person account of what it is like to be a delegate to the House and the challenges of supporting her constituency and the interests of the commonwealth.

February 1: "4 Paws for Ability," an organization that trains service dogs, will describe how their work greatly enriches the lives of people with disabilities. They train and then appropriately place 11 different types of service dogs who perform a multitude of tasks to mitigate various disabilities, including Alzheimer's, autism, diabetic alert, and seizure detection.

Thanks to donations from LLI members, \$18,000 in LLI-funded scholarships will be awarded to NOVA students for the 2023-24 academic year. President Derick Malis presented the check to Kelly Persons, Executive Director of the NOVA Educational Foundation, on October 27.

The Scholarship Committee allocated the scholarships as follows:

- LLI Knox Singleton Leadership, \$3,000
- Lorin Goodrich Academic, \$3,000
- Three LLI leadership scholarships, \$2,000 each
- Three academic scholarships, \$2,000 each

Scholarship recipients are selected by the NOVA Office of Student Financial Aid and the scholarships are managed by the non-profit NOVA Educational Foundation. We can be proud that our long-standing LLI scholarship program provides financial support to NOVA Annandale campus students with financial need, high academic achievement, and leadership potential. Aracosia 1381 Beverly Rd. McLean

Aracosia McLean's classical recipes bring

the wisdom of their ancestors to today. The restaurant is known for its warm, kind service, large portions, and a trove of family recipes from Kabul-born owners Omar Masroor and his wife, Sofia. Aracosia McLean's menu caters to every diet from paleo to vegetarian. (Its sister restaurant, Bistro Aracosia, was voted one of the top 50 Best Restaurants in the United States for vegetarians by Forbes magazine and Aracosia McLean serves many of the same dishes.) Aracosia has a large selection of stews, including yeal and mushrooms in a velvety cilantro-laced gravy and Rumi's chicken, in a zesty, sweet tomato sauce. Aracosia's mantu, dumplings stuffed with minced beef and laden with garlicky yogurt, and aushak, meat- and leek-filled dumplings that bring to mind ravioli, are considered "don't miss;" but all dishes are brighter and more complex than your usual Afghan restaurant. Tom Sietsema (Washington Post's food critic) named Aracosia one of his eight favorite places to eat in February 2021. Do check out their menu here. Details: We will dine in Aracosia's heated outdoor seating area, at tables accommodating groups of four to six. One check will be provided per table, so please bring cash or a money-transfer app on your phone (e.g., Venmo) to pay your share of the check for your table. The entrance to the building's free parking lot is on Beverly Road. An elevator takes you to the restaurant level. The restaurant is totally accessible.

In Memoriam




LLI member Nan Peck passed away on October 26. During her four years with LLI, she made tremendous contributions: coordinating and teaching countless classes; liaising with NOVA

administration; recruiting current and retired NOVA professors as instructors; serving on the LLI Board of Directors and the Curriculum Committee; helping transition LLI to Zoom meetings and classes during the pandemic; and tirelessly promoting LLI/NOVA. For her tremendous contributions she was presented the LLI Meritorious Service Award in 2021. Nan had many friends and was known for her zest for life.

Nan was raised in Montgomery, Illinois, the fourth of 13 children. She received her bachelor's and master's degrees at Illinois State University and then worked on Capitol Hill and later became an associate professor at NOVA. She taught speech and communications and was known as a wonderful communicator and listener.

Nan volunteered for the Fairfax County suicide hotline for many years, where she was the director and training coordinator. She was also a very creative and talented stamper and card maker. Her cards were highly personalized and were considered works of art. Sports were a big part of her and her husband Paul's lives. Nan was both a participant and a spectator, and particularly loved volleyball and baseball. She served as a coach for youth volleyball teams.

A celebration of life for Nan Peck will take place on February 4, 2023. More information will follow.



The shortness of her name is **NAN** to the core — what you see is what you get, no less, no more!

Forward or backward, Nan's exactly the same — honesty by the score, principled to her inner core, with a dogged sense of right and wrong.

AND, she won't hesitate to speak out whenever she sees injustice or blatant ignorance.

If in life, you are confused about what to do, simply ask yourself "what would Nan do?"

First time I saw NAN she was playing racquetball, whipping the tails off three fairly athletic men. She fit in with the gym crowd from the very start, and though "one of the guys," she definitely stood apart.

That one of her competencies is communication was obvious when you saw her teaching, coaching, coercing, counseling, or just quietly NANing!
