The Belmont-Paul Women's Equality National Monument has played a significant role in the U.S. women's suffrage and equal rights movements. From this house, suffragist Alice Paul and the National Woman's Party developed strategies and tactics to advocate for the Equal Rights Amendment and equality for women.
