# Waiting for the Raptor!

If you love watching Northern Virginia's eagles, owls, falcons, ospreys, and hawks majestically sweep and dive in the sky, then join us for our first inperson Forum of 2025. We will welcome Josefina (Jo) Doumbia, a certified Virginia Master Naturalist. She will talk about the spring return to our region of raptor birds of prey and the important role they play in our ecosystem. Raptors possess amazing hunting skills as they swoop to capture prey, including mammals,

reptiles, fish, and other birds. She will introduce us to different species of raptors in our area and how to identify them, and she will highlight the characteristics and skills of raptors that allow them to hunt other animals.

Jo is not only a Virginia Master Naturalist (Fairfax Chapter), but a Wildlife Sanctuary Program Ambassador, and an active volunteer at Hidden Oaks Nature Center and Plant NOVA Trees. After a 25-year career with the World Bank focusing on environmental sustainability,

she is now utilizing her global expertise as a



board member with various local environmental groups, including the Northern Virginia Bird Alliance, Nature Forward (formerly Audubon Naturalist Society), and Faith Alliance for Climate Solutions. A Colombian native, she is particularly interested in outreach to Spanish-speaking communities, where she thinks there is a particular need for more information on the natural environment. She lives with her husband and two sons in Annandale where she cherishes the native plant sanctuary she has created in her backyard.

**After-Forum Lunch:** The after-Forum lunch will be at Pho Hot, a Vietnamese noodle restaurant that has been doing business for 20 years at 7442-A Little River Turnpike, Annandale (Little River Shopping Center). Before I continue to highlight our Special interest Groups (SIGs), I want to tell you about the delightful CCI Cultural Fashion Show that I attended March 7 at the Annandale Campus. The Community College Initiative (CCI) is sponsored by the

U.S. Department of State, bringing exchange students from underserved areas and underrepresented groups to the U.S. for a year of study and cultural exchange. This non-degree academic program builds technical skills in applied fields, enhances leadership capabilities, and strengthens English language proficiency. It also provides opportunities for professional internships, service learning, and cultural exchange through community engagement activities.

This event began with an informal lunch with the students from **11 countries** and continued with a diverse student presentation showcasing their cultures through their colorful native dress,



poems, songs, dance, and brief narratives and videos about their country. LLI member Anna Dixon was a cosponsor and, in the absence of the Provost, I was asked to open the program.

Over lunch, I talked with two Brazilian students about their country and their pride in being selected from among hundreds of applicants. The students' presentations were energizing and were received with unabashed enthusiasm by the attendees. Hopefully, this event will

continue next year with a new crop of students. If it does, do come and enjoy!

# Zoom Class Links are MOVING — Affects All Zoom Classes — Please Read

Due to recurrent problems with members accessing links to Zoom classes, the Curriculum Committee has developed a modified way to access the Zoom class links **beginning April 1**. Administrator Janice Viola will continue to send out two email notices prior to each class, but rather than give a link to the class itself, she will provide a link to "Online Class Materials" where you'll see a box for "Zoom links." You will be prompted to login, and will then see Zoom links for classes, which will be available at least three weeks in advance of each class. This new system will allow access to the Zoom class links in the event that a member doesn't get a notice from Janice, loses the link, or forgets to register for the class. Also, you will be able to copy the link and add it to your home e-calendar. Therefore, in addition to solving the "lack of link" problems, this modified approach will have other benefits.

There will also be a link on the LLI/NOVA website (<u>llinova.org</u>) home page entitled "Recorded Classes and Zoom Links" which will take the member directly to the "Online Class Materials" section. Again, login is required. Prior to April 1, recorded Zoom classes may be accessed <u>here</u>.

# Bristoe Station Battlefield Heritage Park Tour – Free

LLI members and guests are invited to join us for a guided tour of the Bristoe Station

Battlefield Heritage Park, a 140-acre historic site in western Prince William County. Federal and Confederate soldiers fought the Battle of Kettle Run in 1862, and the Battle of Bristoe Station in 1863. For each of the two battles, the corresponding walking trail is about 1.25 miles. This can be shortened if need be.

**Trillium Hike – \$26** (divided among participants) Thursday, May 1, 8:30 a.m., Richard Thompson Wildlife Management Area, Linden, VA

LLI members and guests are invited to join Mary Alexander, LLI instructor/member and a Virginia Master Naturalist, on an organized walk at the Richard Thompson Wildlife Management Area (TWMA). We will look for trillium, spring beauties, trout lilies, showy orchids and other spring flowers.

The drive to TWMA takes about 65 minutes. We will caravan and car pool. We will meet at the

Hidden Oaks playground parking lot (separate from the Hidden Oaks Nature Center) at 8:30 a.m. and divide up into fewer cars.

At TWMA, we will walk one to two hours on an uneven dirt trail on the eastern slope of the Blue Ridge Mountains. The trail slopes gently downhill, with a few narrow footpath detours to see yellow lady slippers. We can return the same trail or take an alternative more uphill return for the last half mile to complete a loop. Learn more about the Trillium Hike <a href="here">here</a>. Bring snacks, water, hat, bug spray, notebook and pencil, a flower identification guide, and binoculars (if interested in birding).

After the walk, we may travel to <u>The Apple House</u> for a late lunch. Anyone who still has energy and interest may also stop at one of the many wineries in the area. Register <u>here</u> for this event.
